 job. The president's endorsement assured McKinney's election.  
 McKinney confirmed in a statement issued at Indianapolis that he agreed two days ago to accept the chairmanship. He did not specify whether Mr. Truman had offered him the job personally.  
 The 47-year-old banker, whose highest previous political post has been treasurer of the Indiana State Democratic Committee, said he has "voluntarily agreed" to give up some business interests which might be criticized because they involve dealings with the government.  
 Some Southern party leaders have been reported to oppose McKinney because he does not satisfy their demands for an "outsider" who never has been involved in dealings with a federal agency. However, Mr. Truman's ap-

proval of McKinney was considered the last word.  
 McKinney is a director and stockholder of the United States Pipe Line Co., which has requested a government certificate to get 100,000 tons of scarce steel. But he said he has "voluntarily agreed to resign" as director and to "dispose of all my stock in the company along with other interests."  
 "The only interests I am retaining are my radio interests and my banking interests," McKinney said.  
 McKinney also pledged that while he is Democratic chairman, "no company with which I am affiliated or interested will ever enter the door of a government agency or bureau requesting considerations, concessions or favors."  
 Boyle and Republican National Chairman Guy George Gabrielson recently appeared before the Senate's Permanent Investigating Committee which is looking into charges of "influence" in the Reconstruction Finance Corp.

**Dredging Lake Might Prove A Costly Project**

The term acre-foot of water may not be completely understood by a large number of people. A lake or tank exactly one acre, or 43,560 square feet, in area and one foot deep could hold one acre-foot of water. An acre-foot of water is approximately 326,000 gallons of water.  
 Although a lake could be built simply by digging a hole in the ground and moving the dug earth away from the site, it is not done this way usually because the same amount of water storage can be gained with less cost by using the dug earth to construct a dam or levy.

Dirt moving is estimated in cubic yards, or "yard" in the vernacular, so lets reduce this to "yards". The one acre-foot dug tank requires the removal of 43,560 cubic feet of dirt of 1613 yards of dirt.  
 If you wanted to dig a hole large enough to store 1000 acre-feet of water, you would have to remove 1000 times 1613 yards, or 1,613,000 cubic yards of dirt.  
 The prices quoted on dirt moving vary widely and depend somewhat on the distance the earth has to be moved. At the low figure of 10 cents a yard for moving this amount of earth, the cost would be \$1,613,000. And, you would have a lot of dirt to get rid of.

The present city lake can be increased in size a little by the removal of silt. The problem is similar to building a new lake by the hole digging method, except that the cost per yard of earth handled might be higher due to the terrian and to having to avoid possible cutting through the present natural clay seal. Of course if this seal was opened, some seepage through the gravel strata would occur.

**Ryan Makes Try To Save Position With AFL Union**

NEW YORK, Oct. 30 (UPI)—Joseph P. Ryan moved today to save his tottering "lifetime" leadership of East Coast AFL Longshoremen by ordering loyal dock hands to end the 16-day-old waterfront strike.  
 Ryan, president of the International Longshoremen's Association (ILA), told his followers to shape up (at 8 a.m. EST) on each of the 123 idle piers and be ready to begin loading \$400,000,000 worth of commercial cargo piled up on the docks.  
 He figured his strategy to cover the waterfront would force 20,000 rebel members of his union to spread their pickets and weaken their resistance.  
 John (Gene) Sampson, leader of the insurgent fraction, promised last night that his men would lead 17 idled army ships if Civil Service battalions withdrew.  
 Sampson emphasized that his truce with Brig. Gen. Edward Lastayo, New York Port of Embarkation Commander, did not mean the wildcatters were angling for an end to their dispute with Ryan.  
 Ryan, however, interpreted Sampson's agreement with the Army as a sign that the rebels' defense was weakening. He predicted the "strike will be over in a day or two."

**Small Change Is Problem In U.S.**

Minneapolis, October 30 — No wonder small change is so scarce there's not enough phones, parking meters, vending machines and retail stores—there is only a little over \$10 worth of coins for each person in the United States today, or the same amount as there was per capita in 1900.  
 Meanwhile the amount of paper or "folding money" in circulation per capita has increased from \$17 in 1900 to \$170 in 1951, says the family economics bureau of Northwestern National Life Insurance company.  
 A century and a half ago, in 1800, there was only about \$5 in money for each person in the United States to buy and sell and rent with; \$2 out of every \$3 was in hard coins, and \$1 was paper, the bureau reports.  
 By 1850 there was \$12 in circulation per capita; nearly two-thirds of it — \$17 was paper. Today there is slightly over \$180 of currency in use per capita, only 1-18 of it coin and 17-18 paper.  
 Historically wars have ballooned the money supply, the report points out. Printing greenbacks to help finance the Civil War was the main factor in nearly tripling total currency in circulation — from just under \$450 million in 1860 to \$1.2 billion in 1865.  
 World War I boosted the amount of currency in circulation from less than \$3 1-2 billion in 1914 to nearly \$5 1-2 billion in 1920.

### Bordeau Angling For Lemon And Hegan From Old Position

NEW YORK, Oct. 30 (UP)—Manager Lou Bordeau of the Red Sox is angling to acquire ex-teammates Bob Lemon and Jim Hegan from Cleveland, it was learned today.

Bordeau reportedly has advised Boston general manager Joe Cronin to turn over anything "within reason" to land the two players for the Indians.

In exchange for pitcher Lemon, who posted a disappointing 17 and 14 record last season, and catcher Hegan, who batted .239 while catching 132 games for the Indians, Boston apparently is willing to trade Ted Williams.

Hank Greenberg, Cleveland general manager, already has admitted the Indians would welcome Williams but said the asking price appeared too high.

According to a source close to Bordeau, the new Red Sox manager still considers the 31 year-old Lemon the outstanding pitcher in the American League.

"When Lou was managing at Cleveland," revealed the source, "Lemon usually was his first choice in any vital ball game. 'Here's your ball game.' He'd say to Lemon, 'You pitch it for me.'"

"And Lemon admires Bordeau both as a manager and a player. They're great friends. Remember, it was Lou who was responsible for converting Lemon from a third baseman into a pitcher.

"As far as Hegan is concerned, Bordeau is convinced that Jim is the best catcher in the League, not the best hitter, by any means, but the best catcher."

Bordeau already has admitted Boston's number one weakness is its catching and pointed out that he would do every thing possible to deal for a first class receiver.

The Indians, on the other hand, have indicated they might be willing to part with one of their front line pitchers — they have four in Bob Feller, Early Wynn, Mike Garcia and Lemon—in exchange for long ball hitters.

Lemon, whose six-year big league career with Cleveland flourished under Bordeau, was a 20-game winner in 1948, 1949 and 1950 and pitched the Indians to two world series triumphs against the Boston Braves in 1948.

Hegan, also 31, started with Cleveland in 1941, did not reach first string status until five seasons later and has never batted better than .249 in the big leagues although he is regarded as

a defensive Marvel. The Indians recently bolstered their catching staff by acquiring big Joe Mottalvo from Seattle of the PCL.

In seeking Lemon and Hegan, Bordeau is continuing a policy of ever letting old acquaintances be forgotten.

His first move upon succeeding Steve O'Neil as Boston manager eight days ago was to hire Oscar (Spinach) Melillo, who worked under him at Cleveland, as a coach for the Red Sox.

Then Bordeau attempted to hire another of his ex-coaches, Bill McKechnie, but McKechnie has indicated he will serve as a pitching coach for Boston only during spring training.

### H-SU Will Meet Cincinnati In Home Game Sat.

Hardin - Simmons University Cowboys will perform before home fans for the first time this season Saturday, Nov. 3, when they meet the University of Cincinnati Bearcats in an inter-sectional contest.

The two teams, meeting for the fourth time on the gridiron, will play under the lights of Abilene's Fair Park Stadium at 8 p.m.

Coach Sid Gilman's high flying Bearcats, undefeated, untied and for the most part unextended in six games, met another Border Conference team, Texas Western, last Saturday, while the Cowboys were going against another loop foe, West Texas State in Canyon.

The Red and Black warriors from the Ohio city have added up a total of 220 points as compared to only 42 for their six opponents.

Closest any team has come to stopping the Bearcats was Tulsa, and they trailed by a margin of two touchdowns, 47-35.

Other Cincinnati wins were posted over VMI, 26-7, Kansas State, 34-0, Hawaii, 34-0, Louisville, 38-0, and Western Reserve, 41-0.

The Cowboys went into their contest with the Buffs with a three won and two lost record, having posted victories over Trinity, 20-6, Midwestern, 32-21, and Arizona State of Tempe, 39-14, and lost to College of the Pacific 33-7, and University of Houston, 35-27.

Best the Cowboys have done against the Bearcats was in 1948 when the two teams battled to a 7-7 tie. In 1949 Cincinnati won, 27-21 and last year 19-7.

### McMurry Indians Facing Mighty Carswell Bombers

Considerably bolstered by their 19-7 victory over Austin College last week-end, the McMurry Indians travel to Ft. Worth Saturday to meet the Carswell Air Force Bombers.

Head Indian Chief Coach Wilford Moore figures it will take more than even the Indians with tomahawks could offer to beat the famed Bomber squad, that's composed of former All Americans and all-conference men from the Southwest.

Though not anticipating a win, the Indians will be putting forth their best efforts to at least make a good showing against the famed service eleven, said Moore.

This will be the Bombers and Indians' initial meeting, and it's the first time since 1942 that McMurry has played a service group. That year Lubbock Army Air Field took the Indians 13-7.

It will be the first day game of the season for the Indians, as the tilt is scheduled for 2 p.m. at Farrington Field.

The Bombers, undefeated and untied this season with the recent victory of 27-13 over Brooke Medical Center behind them, boast a star-studded squad composed of such names as Bud McPadin, once of Texas and Louis Schaufele and Dub Graves.

Pitted opposite these former Collegiate Greats now playing for Carswell will be McMurry's claim to fame in Texas Conference circles, Sabin Hendrickson, who's top ground gainer in the TC, and Carl Jewell, second to the highest in the pass-tossing department. Stephen Brock, playing in the wing-back slot last week against Austin College and taking top honors in the rushing department that night, will also be in the line-up.

### Mombo King To Resume Tour

KAUFMAN, Oct. 30 (UP)—Mombo King Perez Prado plans to resume his national tour Thursday or Friday although one of his nine band members hurt in last Saturday's bus crash still will be unable to travel.

Twelve members of the Cuban orchestra were injured in the wreck and 19-year-old Delia Romero, a singer, was killed. Nine still are hospitalized, but all except Ramon Santamaria are expected to be released soon.

Santamaria suffered fractures of the pelvis and right ankle when the band's chartered bus skidded off the pavement and hit a low bridge abutment during a rain-storm.

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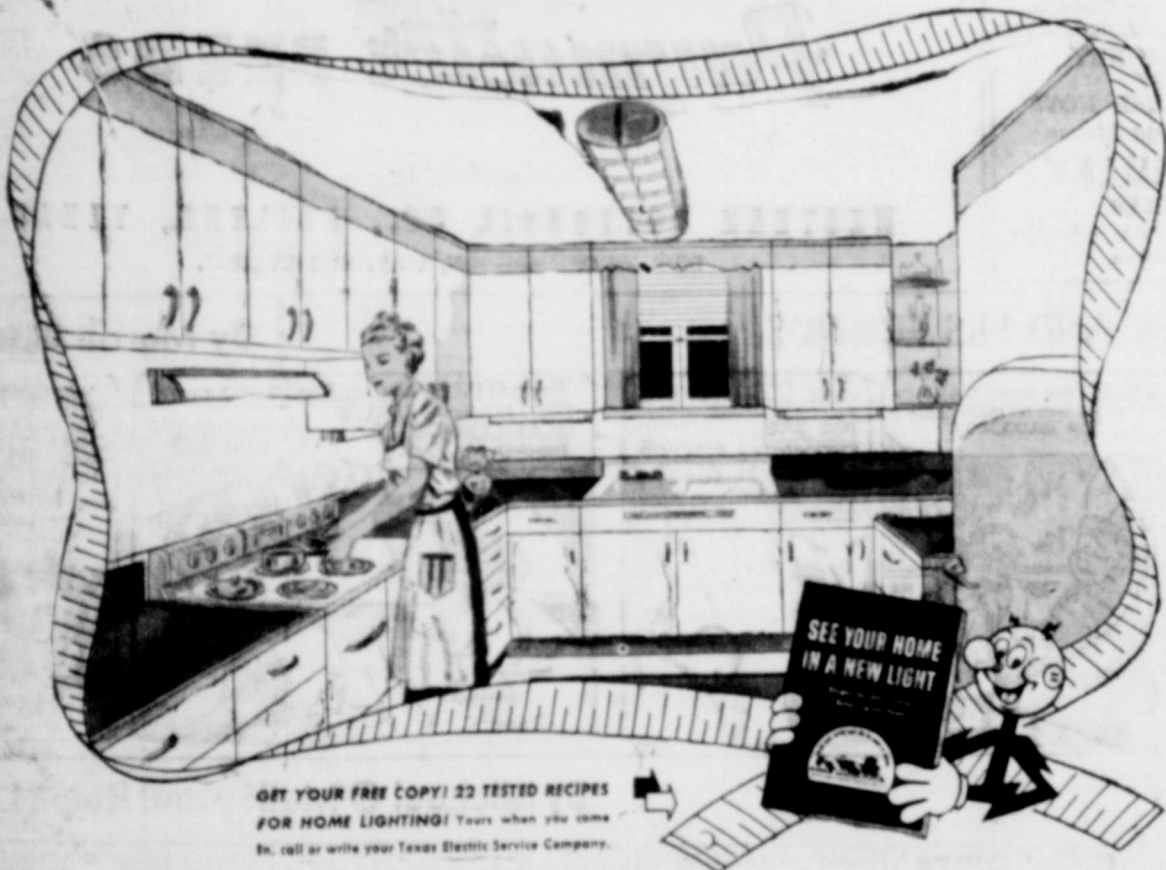

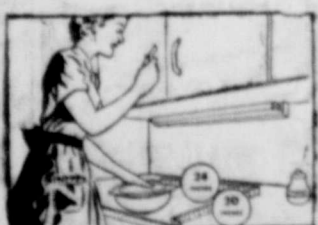

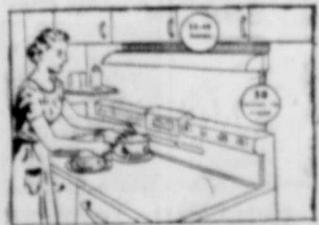
