

Farmers in areas where the wheat has failed are urged to consider the planting of grain sorghums, Martin L. Simpson chairman of the county PMA committee stated today.


"We don't want any farmer to plant grain sorghums at the expense of cotton because cotton is vitally needed in our defense effort. However, where growing cotton is not feasible the planting of grain sorghums will help out greatly in our drive for needed feed grains."

B. F. Vance, Chairman of the state PMA committee, has already announced that two statemeetings have been scheduled by the Texas Agricultural Mobilization Committee to highlight the need for increased production of grain sorghums.
