CAIRO, Egypt, Nov. 28 (UP) -Infuriated Texas oil heir Shep-pard (Abdullah) King threatened to sue his mother today on the eve of his scheduled wedding to Egyptian shimmy dancer Samia

King instructed Houston lawyer John J. Herrera to prepare a \$200,000 suit against his mother Mrs. Bonner King, for "defamation of character."

The family quarrel concerned the disappearance of a valuable string of pearls from the King home in Houston. Police there said Mrs. King asked them to have her son questioned about the

King exploded upon learning of the 'request. He said it was a "veiled accusation" against him.
"I'm really mad," he said. "For God's sake, what would I want with a pearl necklace? It just flabbergasts me. I've never been accused of such a thing before."

King declared he had a letter in his pocket from the Houston police chief showing a clear record. The letter was required under Egyptian law for his Moslem narriage to Samia.

The tall, red-haired Texan said his mother gave all her jewels amy to his sister Patricia last

"I figure Pat lost the necklace and my mother blamed it on me,' be'said.

For once, Samia did not figure directly in the mother-son quarrel-over his international romance. After King met the Egyptian beauty in a Paris nightclub and launched a torrid romance, his mother threatened to cut him out of her

The argument appeared to have second time. King said then that his mother had been reconciled to the Moslem marriage and he planned to return to Houston with



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


