What matter that snake-eyed old Tatanka Yotanka had a cordon of his hard-case Hunkpapa squatting around the scene of my farewell. It has always been the business of the medicine man to hedge the bets of the warrior.

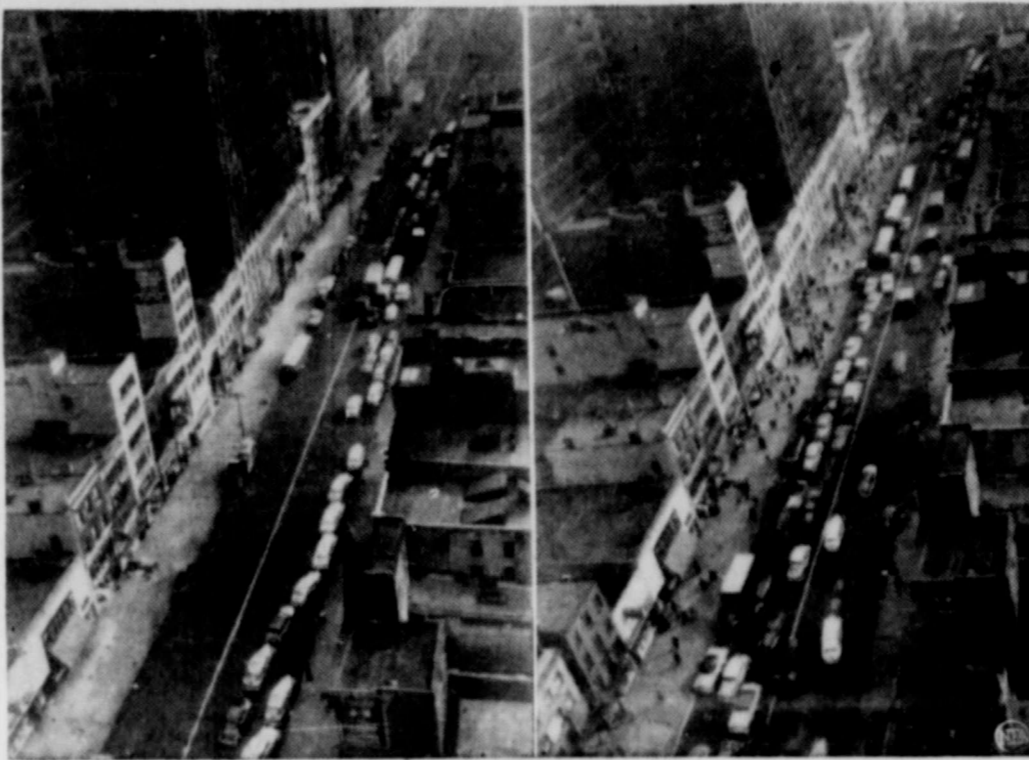

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AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE SALE AND FIRING OF FIREWORKS WITHIN THE FIRE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF RANGER, TEXAS. SETTING OUT THE BOUNDARIES OF THE FIRE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF RANGER, TEXAS. PROVIDING FOR PENALTY, AND CLERINAG AN EMERGENCY.

Section 1. The fire limits of the City of Ranger, Texas, which have been duly set by ordinance heretofore, and which said limits have been incorporated into this ordinance are as follows:—Beginning at the intersection of Elm and South Commerce Streets; thence in a northerly direction along South Commerce Street to the intersection of North Commerce Street and Cherry Street; thence in a Westerly direction along Cherry Street to the intersection of North Marston and Cherry Streets; thence in a southerly direction along North Marston Street to the intersection of West Main Street; thence in a westerly direction along West Main Street to the West Boundary line of lot 4, in Block 1 of the Hodges-Young-Rawls Addition; thence in a southerly direction along the West boundary line of said lot 4, Block 1 of the Hodges-Young-Rawls Addition to the alley between West Main and Pine Streets; thence in an Easterly direction along said alley between West Main and Pine Streets to the intersection of South Marston Streets; thence in a Southerly direction along South Marston Street to the intersection of said South Marston and Pine Street; thence in an Easterly direction along Elm Street to the intersection of said Elm Street with South-Commerce Street, the place of beginning. This area to comprise lots 1 to 4 of Block 1 of the Hodges-Young-Rawls Addition, the North One-half of Block 5 of the Original Town, and all of blocks 11, 12, 13, 14, 19, 20, 21, 22, 27, 28, 29 and 30 of the Original Town of Ranger, Texas.

Section 2. Hereafter it shall be a violation of this ordinance for any person or persons, firm, or corporation to sell or offer to sell, or to have stored upon their premises within the fire limits of the City of Ranger, set out hereinabove, any fireworks of any character. The term fireworks within the scope of this ordinance to include fire-crackers, torpedoes, pin-wheels, roman candles, sky rockets, screaming minnies, or any fireworks not herein named, save and except that it shall not be illegal to sell caps for use in toy cap pistols.

Section 3. Any person, firm or corporation hereafter offering for sale fireworks from a location outside the fire limits of the City of Ranger, Texas, shall first secure a permit from the City Secretary of the said City of Ranger, Texas, which permit shall state the name and address of the purchaser, the location from which sale or sales are to be made, and shall pay to the City of Ranger, Texas, a fee of \$5.00 for said permit.

Section 3. Hereafter it shall be a violation of this ordinance for any person or persons to throw, light, ignite, or in any manner set off, or help to set off fireworks of any character within the fire limits set out hereinabove.

Section 4. Any person or persons violating any of the provision of this ordinance shall upon conviction thereof, be fined in any sum not less than one dollar, nor more than One Hundred Dollars.

Section 5. The passage of this ordinance is for the immediate preservation of life and property of the Citizens of the City of Ranger, and there is hereby declared to exist an emergency and it said ordinance shall therefore be in effect from and after its passage.
