Eastland Boy Coming Home After 5 Years With The Marine Corps

Sgt. Donald W. Branton, son of Mrs. M. E. Bibb of Woodson, and the late Garland Branton, former county treasurer of Eastland county, is enroute home from Korea. He should land at San Diego harbor. He will be processed and discharged at the Marine Corps base in San Diego.

Don has been with the 1st Marine Division since 1944. He was discharged in February 1950 as a sergeant, and was called back for service in Korea in October of the same year. He has been in Korea since November 1950.

Attendant Shot Over Parking Fee Of 35 Cents

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Dec. 7 (UP)—Police searched today for a man who shot a parking lot attendant here because he thought a 35-cent parking fee was too high.

The victim, Curtis Jones, was in serious condition at Kansas City General Hospital suffering from a wound in his right side.

Jones told police two men and a young woman drove into his station yesterday and parked their car. They asked the price he said, then stated an argument containing the charge was too high.

The 33-year-old Negro said one of the men pulled a .25 caliber automatic pistol from his pocket during the argument and fired, then ran down the street with his two companions.

Fraud Warrant Out For Mexican Cattleman Today

SAN ANTONIO, Dec. 7 (UP)—A bench warrant was out today for the arrest of a wealthy Monterrey, Mex., cattleman accused of masterminding what immigration officials called "the biggest fraud case" in history along the U. S. Mexico border.

The bench warrant was issued yesterday at Brownsville by Federal Judge James V. Alford.

The cattleman, Salome Quintanilla, 54, was due to appear in Judge Alford's court yesterday on charges of selling Mexican natives fraudulent birth certificates, marriage licenses and other papers they needed to get entry in the U. S.

Quintanilla was out on \$10,000 bond but failed to appear. Judge Alford immediately increased bond to \$25,000 and issued the warrant.

John W. Holland, director of the San Antonio Immigration district, said "several hundred" Mexicans had bought the licenses. He also quoted an alleged confederate of the missing man as saying they had "3,000 clients" which would mean a million-dollar operation.

Holland said it may take "several years" to track down all the Mexicans who have entered on fraudulent papers, unknowingly.

Morals Ordinance Contested After Osteopath Caught

LOS ANGELES, Calif., Dec. 7 (UP)—A Hollywood osteopath charged today that a county ordinance prohibiting unmarried couples from resorting "for the sole purpose of sexual intercourse" is unconstitutional because it interferes with the "pursuit of happiness."

William B. Peebles, 39, arrested recently for allegedly resorting with an 18-year-old girl in his office, filed suit in superior court yesterday demanding that the 1916 ordinance be invalidated on constitutional grounds.

The ordinance makes unlawful "conduct which is inherently normal, lawful and commonplace," the osteopath said, and interferes with a person's liberty to entertain someone of the opposite sex on his own premises.

County vice squad officers said the ordinance makes it unlawful for "any person to resort to a car, motel, room or any place for the sole purpose of sexual intercourse with a person to whom he or she is not married."

Peebles contended in his suit that such conduct was practiced by "an overwhelming majority of the adult, unmarried population" and demanded a writ of prohibition to prevent enforcement of the law.

Douglas Won't Run

SAN LEANDRO, CALIF., Dec. 7 (UP)—After a speech here last night by Sen. Paul Douglas (D-Ill.), a local bank official remarked, "Senator, I've been guarding your hat during the talk. Should I throw it in the presidential ring?"

"No," the Senator replied. "I think I am the only member of the United States Senate who is not a prospective presidential candidate."

Volunteer Firemen To Sponsor City-Wide Clean-Up Campaign

One of the most thorough clean-up campaigns ever attempted in Ranger will be sponsored by the Ranger Volunteer Fire Department, according to Virge Johnson, chief of that organization.

This was decided at a meeting of the organization Thursday night, which no doubt was prompted by the fact that many towns in Texas, and especially the city of Odessa, where several cases of polio have occurred, in some instances of epidemic proportions, have taken steps to clean up the town, and stop the spread of the dread disease.

The volunteer fire boys have called a general meeting for Monday night at 7 o'clock at the fire station, and is asking the Chamber of Commerce, the Jaycees, the Lions club, the Rotary Club, the Civic League and any other organization that wishes to have a part in the cleanup drive to have representatives at the meeting Monday night.

As yet the doctors do not know just exactly what causes polio, but everyone knows that a clean city is not as likely to have an epidemic as towns that have poor sanitation. At the meeting Monday night, Chief Johnson stated that a thorough organization will take place and that if the campaign is to be a success it will be necessary for every club, lodge and civic organization and each individual to take an active part and get the job really done.

NEW ORLEANS, La., Dec. 7 (UP)—Six federal judges will sit in back today to hear arguments in the appeal of \$240,000,000 in damage suits resulting from the Texas City, holocaust in April, 1947.

The case before the U. S. 5th Circuit Court of Appeals is a composite of more than 300 claims by 8,500 claimants for death, injury and property loss by fire and explosion. Federal District Judge Thomas M. Kennerly has already ruled that the government is liable.

Odessa Mayor Says Help Has Not Been Refused

ODESSA, Dec. 7 (UP)—Odessa has not refused state help in its fight to stem the polio outbreak which has claimed nine lives this year, Mayor C. W. McCollum said yesterday in answer to a charge by Dr. George Cox, State Health Officer.

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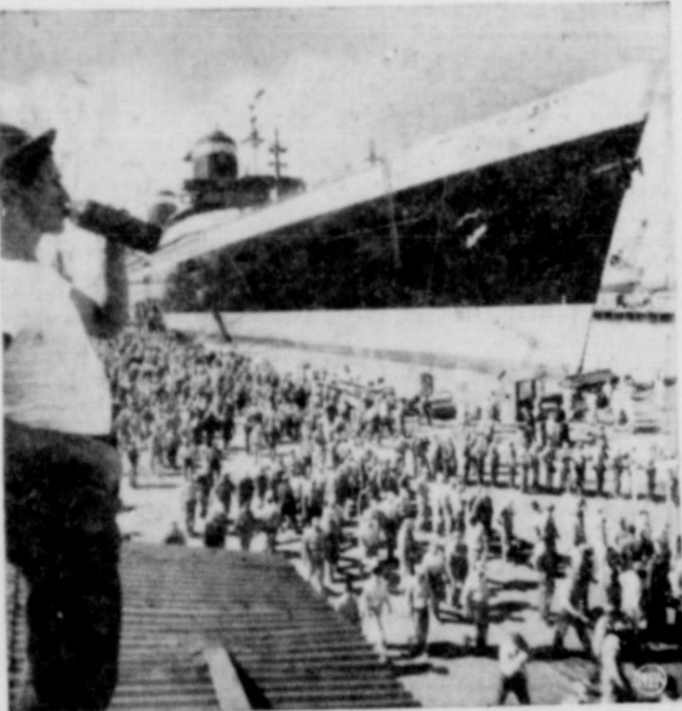

Former Japanese Prisoners Meet

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 7 (UP)—The civilian workers captured on Wake, Guam and Cavite in 1941 by the Japanese are dying at the rate of about one a month from the effects of their imprisonment, it was announced today.

Mrs. Mary H. Ward, wife of one of the survivors and the president of "The Workers of Wake, Guam and Cavite," an organization formed of the "forgotten" men, disclosed the death rate at the group's seventh annual convention here.

She said only 850 survivors are now left of the original 1334 Naval installation workers captured by the Japanese.

Britain Building Canal Zone Road

CAIRO, Egypt, Dec. 7 (UP)—Britain tomorrow will begin building a vital road in the Suez Canal Zone under guard of a brigade of paratroopers, the British command disclosed today.

The route will link a water filtering plant with the British garrison at Suez City, an area where the British and Egyptians fought gun battles early this week.

Lieut. Gen. Sir George Erskine, British Military commander, said construction of the road was a "military necessity" and would entail demolition of several Egyptian mud hut villages.

Bum Steer Two Reds Held For Sabotage

BALTIMORE, Dec. 7 (UP)—Stephen Sandbeck called a policeman when Edward Roe handed him a card which read: "I am deaf and dumb. Please help me."

Sandbeck explained that he is a deaf mute and realized Roe was a phony when he failed to answer his sign language.

Roe was fined \$15 for panhandling.

Fourth Victim Of Iranian Riot Dies

TEHRAN, Iran, Dec. 7 (UP)—Police Col. Nuri Shad, who received head injuries from stones thrown by demonstrators in yesterday's rioting, died in a hospital today, the fourth victim of the fighting with Communists.

Police said 50 other policemen still were hospitalized with serious injuries received in the clash.

Casualties among the demonstrators were not known. Reports yesterday put the injured total at more than 200 with 141 demonstrators arrested.

More than 3,000 Communist students were estimated to have taken part in the running battle with 2,500 police, troops and anti-Communists.

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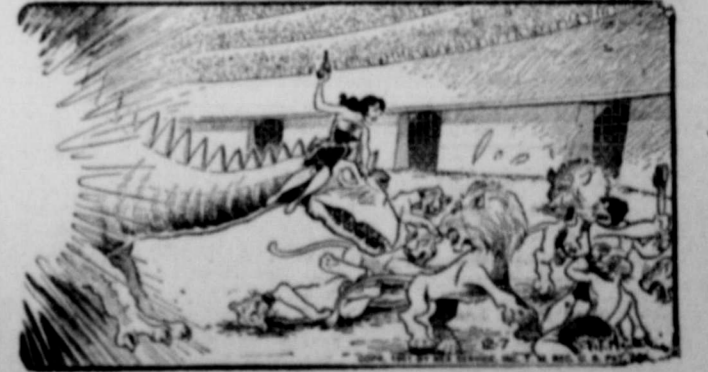

H-SU And Tulsa Clash In Late Game Saturday

ABILENE—The Golden Hurricane of Tulsa and the Cowboys of Hardin-Simmons University will have a delayed finish for the 1951 football season when they meet Saturday afternoon at Tulsa. The Tulsa eleven is ready to establish a new national and total offense and rushing record. Their present mark of 4,744 is only 4 yards short of the one made a year ago.

For Hardin-Simmons it will give Dunny Goode, the nation's second leading ground gainer, a chance to add to his total of 1,375 yards.

The game was scheduled only this week after Villanova cancelled its contest with Tulsa because of the death of Nick Liotta.

Tulsa, by signing Hardin-Simmons to replace Villanova, has been able to keep faith with the holders of 5,100 season tickets purchased in advance.

One of the basis of their tilts with common foes, Tulsa figures to be stronger than the Cowboys. Both teams have played Houston, Cincinnati, and Texas Tech.

Tulsa defeated Houston, 46-27, while Hardin-Simmons lost to the Cougars, 35-27. Tulsa won over Texas Tech by a touchdown, 21-14, while the Red Raiders needed out Hardin-Simmons 28-21 for the Border Conference championship and an invitation to the Sun Bowl.

Cincinnati beat Tulsa by two touchdowns, 47-35, while the Bearcats nosed out Hardin-Simmons, 13-12.

In other games this season, Tulsa whipped Marquette, 27-21, Hawaii, 58-9; Wichita, 33-9; O. Aggies, 35-7; Kansas State, 42-26. They lost to Arkansas of the Southwest Conference 24-7. The Hurricanes have scored 338 points their opponents 166.

Hardin-Simmons concluded its practice for the game Thursday with a workout on its own field. The team stopped in Wichita Falls Thursday night and was to be in Oklahoma City Friday noon, reaching Tulsa some time Friday afternoon.

Ranger Teams Take Two Games

The Ranger High School Girls and boys basketball teams made another clean sweep against Strawn last night in their double header at the Recreation Building.

The girls, led by Betty Pounds and Cynthia Hull defeated the Strawn girls 41-14. Pounds was high with 21 points and Hull right behind with 13.

Jimmy Cole racked up 20 points last night to lead the Bulldogs in scoring against Strawn followed by Tommy Hinds with 10.

The outstanding defensive work of Hinds was evident in his controlling the ball off both backboards and defense of the goal. Strawn was limited to 5 points for the game.

The final score was Ranger 38 and Strawn 5.

Shoeless Joe Jackson Dies

GREENVILLE, S. C., Dec. 7 (UP)—Funeral services will be held here Sunday for Joseph W. (Shoeless Joe) Jackson, 63, key figure in baseball's infamous "Black Sox" scandal of 1919 and considered by many the "greatest natural hitter" in the sport's history.

Jackson died of a heart attack at his home here Thursday night.

TV Association Plans Reforms

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7 (UP)—A woman isn't a broad and she can't wear low necklines either. Swear words are out, too—at least on television.

The television board of the National Association of Radio and Television Broadcasters gave final approval last night to a code of self-regulations designed to raise necklines and eliminate obscenity and profane language.

The code, effective March 1, applies to 72 TV stations and two networks which are members of the association.

Junior College Basketball Game Tonight
