You May Get A Deferment, Though It Will Likely Cost You In The End; Might Extend Your Age Limit

AUSTIN, Dec. 8 — Young men of draft age who now ask for and get deferments under certain conditions automatically extend the time during which they may be drafted by nine years.

This was pointed out here in a statement today by Lt. Col. Morris S. Schwartz, deputy state Selective Service director in clarifying recently received regulations on extended draft liability.

"The president on June 19th signed into law a draft amendment providing that all men 'now or hereafter deferred' can be drafted up to their 35th birthday," Col. Schwartz said. "The regulations now spell this out."

Col. Schwartz pointed out that the man who does not get any of the deferments mentioned in the draft regulations cannot be drafted upon reaching his 26th birthday.

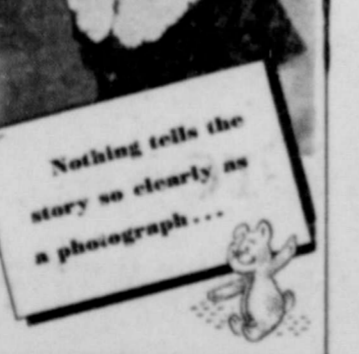
He pointed out the following types of deferred men who have their liability for service extended until age 35:

1. Men who enlist at any time in the National Guard after February 1, 1951, before attaining the age of 18 years and six months.
2. Members of the ROTC and other officer training programs.
3. Accepted aviation cadet applicants.
4. Students deferred to go to high school or college under requirements of law; college students deferred under authority of the local board.
5. Men left at home to pursue civilian employment considered to be in the national interest.
6. Men deferred to farm.
7. Men who maintain a bona fide family relationship in their homes with their children, or because of extreme hardship and privation to dependents. (This does not include a man with a wife alone.)
8. Any man who might be deferred because he is governor of the state any other official chosen by the voters of the entire state, any member of the legislature, or any judge of a court of record in the state.
9. Men classified as mentally, physically, or morally deficient or defective.

"All men under 26 years of age on June 19th who have one of these deferments, or who since that time got one before he was 26, will be liable for service until he's 35," Col. Schwartz emphasized.

"It's possible under this provision of law," he said, "for such deferred men to become disqualified for deferment anyway, age 34 that happens, they can be drafted."

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

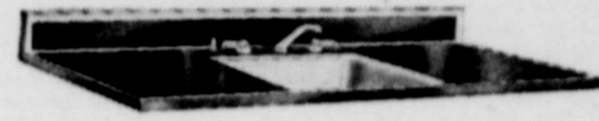

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"Texas Ike" May Lead Ticket In This State If He Is Nominated; Most Newspapers To Support Him

SAN ANGELO Dec. 8 — A survey of the daily newspapers of the state conducted by the Standard-Times reveals that a preponderance of Texas newspapers will support Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower for President if he is the Republican candidate next year.

By almost the same majority these newspapers believe if the election were held today General Eisenhower would carry their own county and the state as the Republican standard bearer.

There are 98 daily newspapers in Texas. All of those with circulation over 5,000 (50) were sent a questionnaire by the Standard-Times. To date 49 have replied. They represent more than 80 per cent of the newspaper circulation of the state.

HOPED BYRD WOULD RUN
Only one newspaper with circulation of more than 100,000 in the state failed to answer the questionnaire. At least one major newspaper in each of the four large cities in the state said it would support Eisenhower. In two of the major cities all the newspapers said they would support him on the Republican ticket.

In one city of over 200,000 in population the support for the general would have been unanimous had it not been for the fact that one paper hoped Sen. Harry Byrd of Virginia might be the Democratic nominee. With Senator Byrd out of the way it appears the newspaper would support Eisenhower.

There are eight Hearst, Scripps-Howard and Holes newspapers in Texas. Only one of these editors answered the questionnaire. In view of the traditional attitude of all three chains there appears to be little doubt who these newspapers will support.

When the Dallas Times-Herald came out for Eisenhower, it seemed to us that this indicated a trend which might mean something big in Texas politics.

We are enclosing a questionnaire which we wish you would fill out and return to us.

If we get enough answers to form the basis for a comprehensive story we will prepare one, place a Sunday release date on it and get it into your office at least 24 hours before publication date.

The effect of government spending, The Standard-Times said, seemed to have tempered the freedom of expression of some editors. In cities where exceptionally large government spending is under way there was a tendency toward timidity. Some of these news papers either wrote letters saying they could not say at this time what they would do in 1952 or telephoned the Standard-Times explaining why they did not want to answer the questionnaire.

TEXAN FOR PRESIDENT
No reference to the fact that General Eisenhower was born in Denison, Tex., was made in the questionnaire. During World War II the Denison Herald sponsored a program which resulted in the purchase of the home in which the general was born and the creating of an Eisenhower Museum. In one of his early visits to Texas after his return from Europe, the general visited his old home.

There is no estimate expressed as to the pulling power of a "native son" as a candidate for President in any of the comments on the race by any newspaper. Texans have a state pride which is no holier-than-thou of other states often have been expressly bored by it. The Eisenhower shrine at Denison could fan the flames of Texas enthusiasm for a native Texan should the General be a candidate for President in 1952.
