Jimmy Bridges' spectacular display of basketball playing in racking up his forty-one points for the night had the fans, opposing coaches at the meet, and the referee in a high pitch of excitement. Bridges would take the ball and come blasting through defenders and make normally impossible shots, from over his shoulder, behind the basket, or just any place he could get shooting room.

Sunday morning services will be held as usual with Sunday school at 10:45 and the morning worship beginning promptly at 11:00.

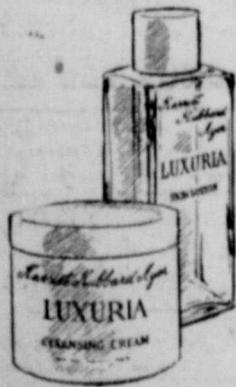
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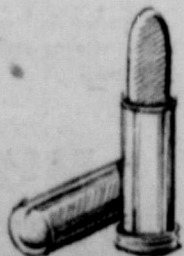
