there, she was fitted for corset, had splits and braces and made wonderful progress, due to the excellent treatments she was receiving from Physical Therapist, who told me that they had never seen a patient quite like her, because she smiled while getting her treatments, even though they knew they were painful and it made them feel so insignificant, but were very proud of her determination to get well.

She was sitting in her wheelchair on my first visit to see her and she looked wonderful and happy, had even gained weight. The soreness had just about left her muscles and her treatments did not hurt her anymore. She was the happiest I had seen her in months. She began telling what a wonderful place the Foundation was, how much she had improved and just loved being there. She was so excited about the fun they

will walk again.

Tiajuana makes the remark, "this is home". She enjoys every minute there because they provide entertainment for them. She sings in the choir, and goes to Chapel every Sunday morning. She realizes she is improving exceptionally well and owes her life to the iron lung, which was bought by the March of Dimes, and also the help of God.

Each time I go down to visit her, she has something new to show me that she can do, such as sitting up by herself on the bed, of course she wears a corset to brace her back, and moving her legs more and her hands and shoulders getting stronger.

She stands up on her legs once a day for five minutes with someone holding her up. She wears braces on her legs and can use her hands almost normally.
