John Bridges, Hart 4-H Club boy exhibited the Grand Champion Barrow over all breeds at the Ft. Worth Fat Stock Show. The Barrow, a medium weight Hampshire, was champion of the Boys Division before competing against the open show champion a light-weight Berkshire of Oklahoma.

In winning the honor the barrow was champion over some 500 entered in the Ft. Worth Show. The barrow sold to Swift and Company for \$3.00 per pound. Total prize money was \$175.00.

Besides the Grand Champion, John also exhibited the 1st place heavy Hampshire barrow, 10th place light Hampshire, 2nd place light Chester White, 3rd and 4th place medium Chester Whites and 2nd place heavy Chester White, 22nd and 32nd place Southdown lamb.

Jay Boston who farms northwest of Dimmitt, was breeder of the Grand Champion Barrow and John was breeder of the Chester Whites and lambs. John is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Bridges and is vice president of the Hart 4-H Club.

Castro County 4-H Club exhibited 29 head of pigs and six lambs in the Ft. Worth Show. All placed except 1 lamb and 3 pigs. Others who exhibited included, Bill Hill who placed 2nd and 10th in the Hampshire class, Kenneth Acker 3rd and 6th in the light and medium Chester White class, Truman Swopes, 5th and 7th in the Chester White class and 7th in the light Duroc class, Floyd Acker 6th and 10th in the Light Chester White class, Jack Acker 5th and 8th in the light Chester White class, Tom Acker 4th and 7th in the light Chester White class, Robert Lacy 3rd and 10th in the Light Poland China Class and 2nd in the Medium Poland China class, Darrell Lacy 6th in the Light Poland China Class, and 3rd in the medium Poland China class. The Castro County 4-H Club boys also placed 1st in the Carload lot of 25.

EDITORIAL

This editorial has been postponed from week to week, month to month, and year to year, in the hope that the move for a new grade school building would originate from some other source. A policy of hush, hush, seems to have been adopted in the district regarding the matter until an attitude of resignation on the part of the public has been created. The need for a new grade school building has been a major problem of the local school district for a number of years, but to date has been quietly and thoroughly by-passed and overlooked. Not wishing to assume the role of a crusader but earnestly desiring to see an adequate school plant in our district, the News does now, and has for the past several years, believe that the pressing need for a new and properly equipped grade school building should receive the immediate attention of the School Board, and interested patrons of the district. Whatever the reasons for delaying the grade school building program, if any, should be made public, and the building policy should be governed by public opinion in the district. With the rapid growth of population in the district, the alternative of temporary housing facilities for grade school children can produce nothing but ill effects. Handicapped as they are, the efficiency of the teaching staff can't help but be impaired, which in turn penalize the students throughout their entire school life. School districts everywhere have been building new buildings, meeting approved standards, in order to care for increasing scholastics and to offer the children of their districts modern facilities during their early years in school when proper facilities are most needed. There probably is not a school in the district who believe that the present grade school building, and the barracks behind the high school, are adequate for the district's needs.

Business firms in Dimmitt, almost without exception, have in the past few years, either built new buildings or extensively renovated their old ones. The Dimmitt public school is probably the largest business in our town, and certainly should keep abreast of other public and private enterprise. The school's customers (children) certainly are the most important group in the district. There may be some bonded indebtedness in the school district, if there is it is a carryover from a depression era, when the people of the district could ill afford to build but did, because the need justified the venture. Surely with the increased wealth of the district, gained both through healthy growth and increased values, a building program, badly needed, would be as advisable now as when the outmoded buildings, still in use, were constructed. The structure now being used for a grade school building brings back fond memories to alumni that have long since passed the prime of life. This same building has seen the passing of the horse and buggy, the Maxwell, the Model T, and muddy streets. Today it brings to the young students of our district the advantage of an out-moded facility that has long since been discarded by all other school districts. If this area is to continue to progress our school plant must be modernized, it is bordering on mockery for paved streets and modern lighting to bound the type of structure that is housing the grade school children of the Dimmitt Independent School District. Something should be done now, not next year or two years from now, but this spring and this summer, if possible at all the little kids of this school district should start to school in a new building this fall.

Dimmitt has a knotty school building problem. The News would not presume to recommend type of structure or location, but we do believe that an advisory board made up of members from the various service and civic organizations in Dimmitt and clubs from the rural communities of the district, should assist the school board by giving it the mass opinion of the patrons of the district.

The News cordially invites the patrons, school officials, or anyone interested in the educational facilities of the district to submit letters, pro or con, regarding the matter of a new grade school plant, and all letters, so far as possible will be published. Unsigned letters, of course, will be discarded.

Local Coach Is Member Sports Trail Century Club of Chicago

The honorary organization is open to all college and school coaches whose athletic teams have won 100 or more contests in any sport.

William Matthei, coach at Bayview High School, Milwaukee, received the first award—a framed certificate. He qualified by coaching cross-country teams that have won so far a total of 100 meets.

Local School Health Program Complete

An extensive school health program has been completed in Castro County through the cooperation of the local medical staff and county officials, and Parent-Teacher associations. It has been said:

The chamber of commerce is not a fair-weather organization. During extremely trying periods of war, inflation and depression chambers of commerce in general and the local chamber of commerce in particular have demonstrated the important place they occupy in the business and economic, as well as the civic world.

Results of Field Tour Demonstration Conducted June 2, 1949
Ed Mauks Farm:

Plot 1—Wheat on Vetch land, 40 bushels per acre. This plot had vetch growing in the wheat which would reduce yield.

Plot 2—Wheat on Potato land. Commercial fertilizers had been used the year before.

Plot 3—Summer fallowed land 37½ bushels per acre.

Plot 4—Wheat on wheat land 15 bushels per acre.

Hunter Brothers Farm:
Plot 1—Wheat on Alfalfa land. This alfalfa had been plowed up 5 years ago. 50 bushels per acre.

Plot 2—Wheat on wheat land. 28 bushels per acre. Definite results could be seen on this farm when droppings where cattle had grazed showing need for nitrogen. Jay Boston Farm:

Plot 1 and 2—Clover and Sudan turned under in August with good growth and watered to speed decaying of organic matter yield per acre 56 bushels.

Plot 3 and 4 and 5—Clover and Sudan cut for hay instead of turning under yield per acre. 44 bushels.

Plot 6—Clover and Sudan turned under when dry same as plots 1 and 2 except no moisture available yield per acre 47 bushels.

Earl Cole Farm: All plots irrigated:
Plot 1—No fertilizer. 25 bushels per acre.

Plot 2—50 lbs amonium nitrate per acre. 32 bushels per acre.

Plot 2—100 lbs ammonium nitrate per acre. 37 bushels per acre.

From the results of this tour, crop rotation using legumes, and commercial fertilizers we can increase our yield of crops as well as keep our land productive.

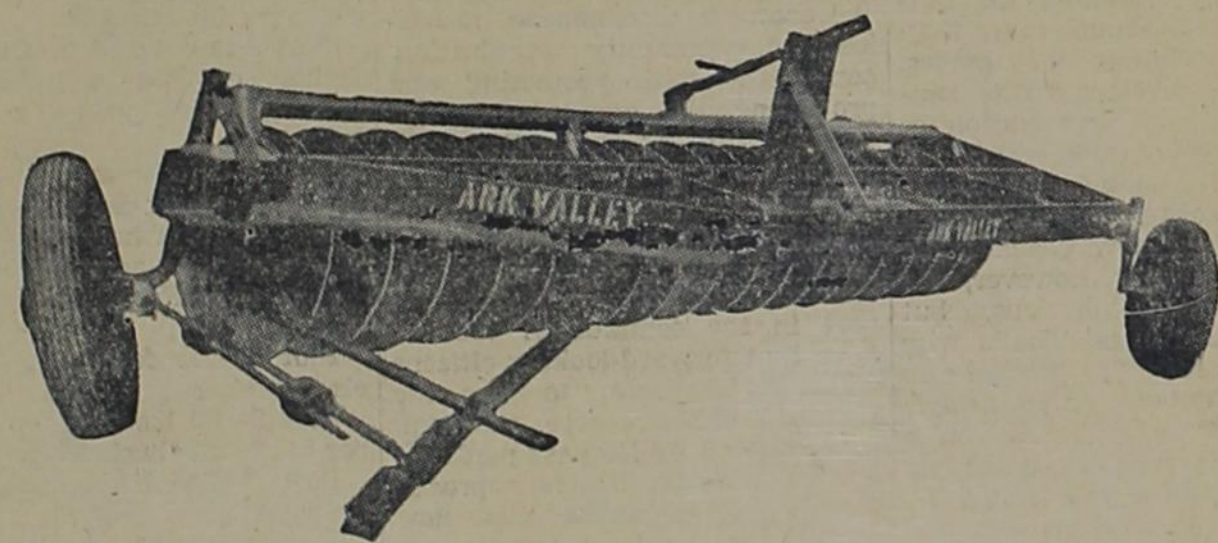

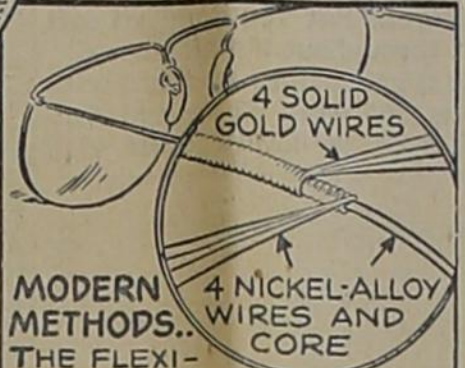

DIMMITT BOY HELPS BRING D. P. TO McMURRY COLLEGE

Abilene, Feb. 4.—A young displaced person from Estonia possessing an exceptional knowledge of English and German languages and desiring to study the liberal arts will enter McMurry college next fall.

He is Lehton Parnaste, a 21-year-old youth now in a German D. P. camp, whose trip to Abilene will be financed by the McMurry student council of religious activities. The student drive for expense funds is to begin on the McMurry campus early next month, according to Joe Harrison, of Dimmitt, who is council chairman.

Explaining the project's purpose, Harrison declared, "The average student at McMurry has little conception of the handicaps endured by European students. Our hope is to take such a student 'under our wing' and give him opportunities equal to our own." "This," he continued, "is going to be a campus-wide project and we hope the entire student body at McMurry will be challenged by this undertaking."

Harrison revealed late Friday that the McMurry administration has agreed to pay the tuition and fees of the European student.

In a personal letter containing biographical data, Parnaste wrote "I was born on 31st of August, 1928, at Deasvere, Estonia. My parents run a farm there. Having finished the elementary school I entered a secondary school at Ranvere, Estonia in 1942.

"I continued to learn in the secondary school until March, 1944. All schools in that district were closed then because of the advance of the Russian troops. In September, 1944, I was compulsorily conscripted and some days later I embarked for Germany. My parents remained in Estonia and I do not know anything about them."

Following the war's end in Europe, Parnaste spent a year in a prisoner-of-war camp and in the spring of 1946 was given his "disbandment" papers and thus became a D.P.

"I do not want to go back to Estonia because of the Communist dictators and the Russians' violence in that country," he asserted.

E.
