





My parents remained in Estonia and I do not know anything about them."

Following the war's end in Europe, Parnaste spent a year in a prisoner-of-war camp and in the spring of 1946 was given his "disbandment" papers and thus became a D.P.

"I do not want to go back to Estonia because of the Communist dictators and the Russians' violence in that country," he as-
