And that were you in their place you would be in favor of someone giving a pint of blood for one of your buddies.

For an example of that, Paul Bullock, a linotype operator at the Ranger Times gave a pint of blood for his father a few weeks ago. Now that two months has not passed he will not be able to give blood upon the visit of the bloodmobile here. Although he would have been able, maybe he understands a little better than someone else of the need for blood.

You can fill out one of these pledge cards by getting one from the Chamber of Commerce office, First Sergeant Jess Cole of the Texas National Guard, one of the local preachers, cooperating in this drive, or at the Times office.

Don't delay, get that card in now so that they may make an appointment for you on the dates the unit will be here, March 4-5. Persons between the ages of 18 and 60 are eligible; although if you are under 18 you must have the permission of your parents, or if you are married, your husband or wife, whichever the case may be.

## Students For Young School Safety Patrol

Young School has announced final results of an election held to determine who would act as safety patrolmen for the school, under the Lions sponsored Safety Program for the Ranger Schools.

David Warden, Mike Hall, Tommy Sawyer, Linda Plumley, and Bennie Galley were elected by their sixth grade classmates to fill these posts.

Under the backing of the Ranger Lions Club there has been inaugurated a Safety Program in which signs, safety films, and belts for patrolmen were furnished by the Lions Club.

The Patrolmen of the various schools will be stationed at dangerous points during the hours that the students are coming and going from school to insure their safety and remind motorists of the part they must play.

Chief of Police W. G. Pounds earlier stated that any instance of a traffic violation reported by one of the patrolmen at the school would be honored by the police department, and they would take action to insure against recurrence of a dangerous act by a motorist.

The degree of success of the Lions program depends upon the reaction of the individual reaction of the motorists of Ranger. Without the cooperation of the operators of the motor vehicles their program will be doomed to fail before it gets started.

**Electric Co. Lists "Don'ts" For Kite Flyers**

Five "don'ts" for boys and girls who fly kites were outlined today by Al Larson, manager for Texas Electric company, in anticipation of the opening of the 1952 kite flying season.

As explained by Al Larson, the five "don'ts" in order of their importance are: First, don't fly kites near electric lines. Second, don't use wire or metallic cord for kite strings. Third, don't use wire or metal in the kite frame. Fourth, don't fly kites in the rain, as even wet kite string could become a conductor of electricity if it was wet, and Fifth, don't attempt to remove a kite from electric poles or wires. Texas Electric Company's office and a lineman will come to rescue it if at all possible.

"Observing the first two 'don'ts' could have saved the life of a Texas youth who was fatally shocked while flying a kite last September," Al Larson said. "This boy was flying a war surplus weather kite which had braided copper wire for a string. The kite fell on a power line and the lad was killed instantly."

"Local youngsters who fly kites have been very careful in the past about where or when they flew their kites," Al Larson stated. "We had a perfect record last year with not one boy or girl being injured and only a few kites demolished. This year, I fully expect that even number of kites lost will be reduced because it seems that every year, our boys and girls listen more carefully to our warnings and cooperate better in making kite flying safe."

**5 Dead; Twelve Injured In B-50 Crash In Nebraska**

OMAHA, Neb., Feb. 26 (UP)—Five men were killed and 12 others injured today when a B-50 medium bomber on a "classified" mission from Hawaii lost a wing while landing, then crashed and burned.

Both the circumstances of the crash and the purpose of the flight were mysterious.

The Strategic Air Command plane was destroyed by flames on the runway at Offutt Field here.

One of the 12 injured men was in "very serious condition" at the base hospital.

Public Information Officer Wayne Bradley said the bomber was approaching the field in clear weather about 2:30 a.m. (CST) when one wing suddenly ripped from the fuselage. The plane was only about 20 yards from the runway.

The four-engine ship plunged into the runway, bounced briefly into the air again, then dropped a second time and burst into flames.

Bradley said the plane was enroute from Hickam Field, Honolulu, to Omaha. It flew by way of Sacramento, Calif., Bradley said.

**PROCLAMATION**

Greetings:

History teaches, and many recent examples in various parts of the world have demonstrated with startling clarity, that freedom such as we cherish cannot long exist without popular understanding and appreciation of individual responsibility.

One of the basic institutions upon which we rely for the furtherance of our American ideals is the public school system. Public schools, by enabling every child to gain a liberal education regardless of station in life, promote recognition of the responsibilities of citizenship and constitute a major bulwark against subversive doctrines.

We in Texas are proud of the school system that has been developed in our state. Its success has been due to many factors—the interest of mothers and fathers in their children, the cooperative efforts of state and local officials, and the energy and determination of those public spirited men and women who are devoting their lives to the teaching of our children.

The continued progress of our school system requires increased public understanding of the importance of education and the greatest possible encouragement and support of our teachers. To this end, I, Allan Shivers, Governor of Texas, do hereby designate the period March 2-8, 1952, as PUBLIC SCHOOL WEEK in Texas, and I urge that during this week every citizen visit a public school and become personally acquainted with the work and activities of our public school system.

**Abortion Ring Exposed By Dallas Officers**

DALLAS, Feb. 26 (UP)—Police promised today to crack a widespread abortion ring uncovered yesterday by the arrest of an osteopath, his chief nurse and two other suspects.

The four suspects were charged with abortion by use of drugs in Justice court yesterday. They were identified as Dr. Winton L. Welch, 35, operator of the Southwestern Clinic; Mrs. Evelyn Savage, 32, head nurse at the clinic; Arthur Ray Smith, 41, a grocer, and Mrs. Minnie Gass, 49.

Detective Capt. George Lumpkin led the raid which resulted in the four arrests. He said other suspects were to be taken in custody.

"We have only just begun on this case," he said.

Assistant District Attorney Pete White said his office had information that one of the largest abortion rings in the Southwest was operating at the clinic. He said police working on the case had seen automobiles from 13 states visit the address in recent weeks.

Two of the defendants were released on writ of habeas corpus soon after the arrests were made. Justice of the Peace Glenn Byrd said he expected to hold a hearing on the charges today.

Scheduled for 2500 feet with cable tools, No. 1, W. W. Ezell will be 2,480 feet from the East and 1,320 feet from the South lines of second 9th, SAEMG survey.

D. W. Henke, Dallas, staked three locations in the Grover Hart Field six miles southeast of Clark.

No. 1, H. K. Stubbfield Estate is to be a 4,000-foot rotary exploration 330 feet from the south and west lines from the northwest quarter of Section 102, Block 2, H&T Survey.

No. 1, Ben A. Brown is to be 600 feet from the south and east lines of section 105, Block 2, H&T Survey. It is also staked for 4,000 feet.

No. 1 Anna (S. B.) Parks will be 6000 feet from the south and west lines of the north half of the southwest quarter of Section 108, Block 2, H&T Survey.

**St. Louis Has War On Canines**

EAST ST. LOUIS, Ill., Feb. 26 (UP)—Detectives armed with shotguns prowled the city's vacant lots today in their snipe war against rabid dogs.

The officers killed 56 stray dogs yesterday in the first day of the anti-rabies campaign. Officers said the victims were "obviously homeless."

Detective Sgt. Fred Inerac said officers would shoot at the dogs only after 9 a.m. to avoid hitting school children with shotgun pellets.

Mr. Hurt died at 7:30 a.m. Tuesday, at his home, 721 West Main Street, Eastland. He had been ill with a heart ailment for the past twelve years. He had lived in Eastland for the past 26 years, coming from Gainesville, and was formerly owner of the Hurt Tourist Courts, until the condition of his health made it impossible for him to continue.

Survivors are his wife, the former Miss Edith McCleskey of Eastland, whom he married in 1927, and the following children, Neil Hurt, Mrs. Julia Beth Cross and Miss Marilyn Rhea Hurt, one brother, Frank Hurt of California.

**One American Injured In Train Wreck**

Pusan, Korea, Feb. 26 (UP)—A north-bound Army train crashed into the rear of a passenger train 10 miles from Pusan last night killing two persons and injuring five others including an American engineer.

A signal error was blamed for the crash. The crash occurred on the main Pusan-Seoul railroad line at the Kupo Compound station. The Diesel-powered Army locomotive and the last car of the passenger train were damaged.

Latest developments in the presidential race:

**DEMOCRATS**  
Truman — President Truman was expected to return from his four-month vacation at Key West, Fla., in time for the March 29 Jefferson-Jackson Day Dinner, at which some Democrats think he may announce his political plans.  
Russell — Sen. Richard B. Russell of Georgia, perhaps keeping silent until he knows Mr. Truman's intentions, refused comment on the request of the Georgia Democratic Executive Committee that he run for President.  
Kefauver — Sen. Estes Kefauver of Tennessee said America should "stop jumping from crisis to crisis" and give "close attention" to the "world's" "danger spots."

**REPUBLICANS**  
Taft — Sen. Robert A. Taft of Ohio, who plans a three-day tour through New Hampshire next month in a bid to upset Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower in that state's curtain-raising primary, said the GOP will win the White House and return "honesty, integrity, simplicity and liberty" to the government.  
Eisenhower — Sen. Henry Cabot Lodge, Jr., of Massachusetts, campaign manager of the Eisenhower-for-President drive, said the general's supporters were a "highly significant victory" when the Florida Republican Executive Committee announced it will be pledged and uninstructed at the GOP National Convention.

MacArthur — Slate of convention delegate candidates favorable to Gen. Douglas MacArthur was entered in the Wisconsin Primary, but the general withdrew his name from the ballots in Pennsylvania and Minnesota, saying it had been entered "without consultations with me and without my approval."

**Former Governor Alabama Free Of Drunken Charges**

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Feb. 26 (UP)—Former Alabama Gov. James E. (Kissin' Jim) Folsom was acquitted here yesterday of drunken-driving charges.

On February 5 in Brownwood the Yellow Jackets whipped the Wildcats, 74-59. If they can repeat they will advance into the NAIB Texas playoffs.

It should be a fierce battle here Tuesday night, for ACC, too, has a shot at the championship. To achieve that, the Wildcats need to trip the Yellow Jackets and then on Thursday night beat McMurry again. At any rate, a victory over Howard Payne would guarantee ACC a share of the title.

In their first game, the Wildcats and Yellow Jackets staged a closer contest than the score indicates. Howard Payne led at the half 28-21, but when the third period opened ACC whittled that margin to two points before the Yellow Jackets found the range again.

Should the Wildcats beat Howard Payne, then the showdown will come in the small McMurry gym at 7:30 p.m. Thursday. The two arch foes will have everything at stake. ACC will need the triumph for their fourth conference championship in the last five years (they missed in 1951), and McMurry will be fighting for a share of the title with ACC and Howard Payne.

Reds May Be Stalling Truce To Start Battle

PANMUNJOM, Korea, Feb. 26 (UP)—The United Nations Command said tonight that Communist truce negotiators may be stalling to delay a cease-fire until May Day or to cover preparations for a spring offensive.

May Day is a traditional Communist holiday. Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway's headquarters broadcast the charge from Tokyo in a "Voice of the U. N. Command" program as Red negotiators rejected an Allied compromise offer designed to break the deadlock over policing a truce.

Chinese Col. Pu Shan categorically refused to drop Russia from the proposed neutral truce supervision commission despite the U. N. offer to match the gesture by withdrawing Norway. The U. N. headquarters broadcast from Tokyo said the Reds had warned at a recent negotiating session that "as far as they are concerned, an early truce was out of the question."

"They estimated that the delay might take another 70 days," the broadcast said. "If this figure has any significance at all, it is that a delay of that length brings the talks right up to May Day for the Reds."

"Is this a veiled threat to the free world that unless the U. N. command accedes to the Reds, a new Communist offensive will begin this spring?"

"Or is it an indication that the Reds will make the signing of an armistice coincide with their auspicious holiday?"

"Only time and the outcome of the talks at Panmunjom will reveal the answers." The broadcast said the Reds have made it clear they will delay the truce talks as long as possible to win their fight to force the repatriation of even war prisoners.

who do not wish to return to Communism. But, the broadcast added, the Reds have changed their "unshakable" stands before. They may be trying to "horse-trade" one point for another, it said.

Miss Hasty, at first reported to be a television singer, said she was "detained" in El Paso. "I just stayed over with a girl friend, after I got sick on the bus."

The girl left Azusa, Calif., by bus last Wednesday. Thursday she sent a telegram from El Paso to her aunt, Mrs. J. B. Larue, that she was catching the "next bus" to Fort Worth.

Mrs. Larue heard nothing more and, fearing the girl had met with foul play, reported her missing yesterday. She said her niece had been appearing with the Spade Cooley western band in Los Angeles on television.

Miss Hasty, who finally showed up at her aunt's home last night, said she had never appeared on television.

"I don't even watch it," she said. "I don't know how such a report got started. I don't even know Spade Cooley. I only know his singer vaguely."

Miss Hasty said she had studied for opera in Hollywood and "I don't think my voice would be quite in tune with Spade Cooley's music."

She planned to spend a few days in Fort Worth then visit her grandmother in Wichita, Kan., where she lived before moving to Azusa 10 years ago.

Korean War At Almost A Halt

8th ARMY HEADQUARTERS, Korea, Feb. 26 (UP)—The Korean War came to an almost complete halt both in the air and on the ground today. Over 14 sorties were flown by 5th Air Force planes because of the almost solid overcast over North Korea. It was the lowest number of operational flights since Sept. 26, 1951, when the weather limited the 5th Air Force to seven sorties.
