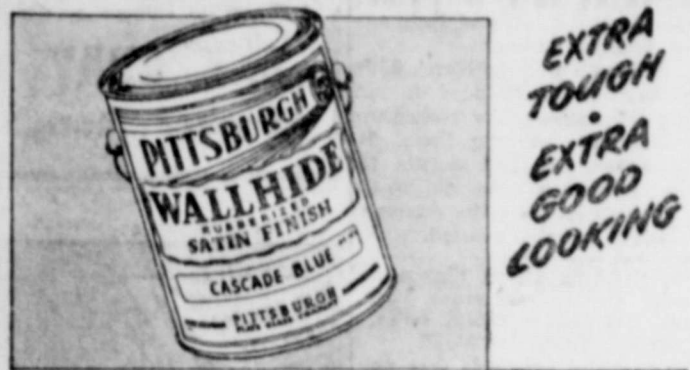

NEW YORK, April 17 (UP)—The Merchants on New York's Fifth Avenue are indignant about the commercialism which marked this year's Easter Parade on the famous street.

Walter Hoising, chairman of the board of the Fifth Avenue Association, representing the merchants, has called the commercial aspects of the annual event a "disgraceful exhibition."

OKLAHOMA CITY, April 17 (UP)—The Oklahoma Legislative Council will learn about Texas 100 million dollar Veterans Land program tomorrow from Texas Land Commissioner Bascom Giles.

Giles says he will recommend that Oklahoma follow Texas' example in establishing the program. It permits veterans to purchase land with a small down payment and a low rate of interest. And Giles says he will also discuss the program with representatives of Oklahoma veterans organizations.

Methodists From All Over World To Attend San Francisco Meet

State delegates of the world-wide General Conference of the Methodist church will soon be packing their bags for the long trek to San Francisco, to the 14 day meeting to be opened there April 23.

Held every four years, the General Conference is Methodism's supreme law and policy-making body. The 746 lay and clerical delegates, elected at regional annual conferences, will represent more than 10,000,000 Methodists in the United States and 25 foreign countries.

Also in attendance will be several hundred ministers and laymen as visitors, administrative officials of Methodist boards and agencies, and fraternal messengers from other denominations.

The conference will meet in San Francisco's Civic Auditorium. Seventy bishops will occupy the platform along with the nine-man Judicial Council, Methodism's supreme court. Delegates will be seated in the arena, grouped by state and foreign conferences.

The keynote principal address, will be given on opening night by Bishop Paul E. Kerr, Nashville, Tenn. Speaking for the entire Council of Bishops, he will sound

the call for churchwide goals during the next four years.

Of top interest on the legislative agenda is the controversial report of the Survey Commission, a group empowered by the 1947 General Conference to present in 1952 a plan to reorganize the church's administrative structure. Methodist boards and agencies have scored the proposed changes as "undemocratic and impracticable."

Bishops A. Frank Smith, Houston, and William C. Martin, Dallas, will take their turns in presiding at the sessions.

IT'S THE LAW
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INDIVIDUAL'S PRIVILEGE AGAINST SELF-INCRIMINATION EXPLAINED

The privilege or rule against self-incrimination makes news from time to time in connection with court proceedings and legislative committee hearings. The statement, "I refuse to answer on the grounds that it may tend to incriminate me," has become familiar to many. Some do not understand the background of the legal principle which allows a person to remain mute in such circumstances.

Lawyers say this one of the most important basic rights of the individual in this country. The Fifth Amendment of our Federal Constitution provides that "no person shall be compelled in any criminal case to be a witness against himself." The early American statesmen insisted that this guarantee become a part of our law for excellent reasons.

The doctrine against self-incrimination is most probably an outgrowth of "trial by ordeal" practiced in the ancient days of England. A person accused of a crime had to prove his guilt or "not guilty" at the time he was arraigned for trial, and still does today. However, in those days the accused had neither the benefit of counsel nor the right to testify in his own defense, and either plea ultimately amounted just about the same thing.

If the accused pleaded "guilty" he was hung a little sooner than was the case if he pleaded "not guilty." This situation, understandably enough, caused many persons charged with crime to stand silent on arraignment and not plead either way. When that happened, the accused was subjected to torture to induce him to plead one way or the other.

Incredible methods of making a person talk were used with almost total success. In some cases the accused was placed in close confinement with a bit of bread to eat one day, a sip of water the next, and so on from day to day until he consented to plea or died of starvation.

On other occasions heavy weights were placed on his chest above the heart and attendants stood on the weights, or he might have been forced to recline on a bed of sharpened stakes. Investigations in those days arose primarily because of alleged dereliction from the rules of the Church.

With memories of such atrocities, it is plain to see why the colonists from England made sure that such practices would be prohibited by their fundamental laws.

The privilege against self-incrimination is not only incorporated in the Federal Bill of Rights, but is also guaranteed under the

constitution of all but two of the 48 states. Our Texas Constitution provides that an accused "shall not be compelled to give evidence against himself."

The right of a witness to refuse to answer on these grounds has been repeatedly sustained by the courts of the United States. Although the U. S. Supreme Court has not directly passed on the question of self-incrimination before a legislative committee, there is a fair inference that the privilege established by the Fifth Amendment protects witnesses in Congressional investigations as well as in judicial proceedings.

Estonian Student McMurry Given Assistantship

ABILENE—Juri Nou, Estonian student who has been studying at McMurry College for the past two years, has been awarded a junior assistantship in mathematics at Johns Hopkins Graduate School in Baltimore, Maryland.

The assistantship will allow Nou \$650 on tuition and \$275 cash yearly until he completes his study towards a Ph.D. He will be teaching four hours a week.

He plans to enroll in October to begin his doctorate in mathematics, as he graduates from McMurry in May with a double major of math and secondary education and a double minor of physics and German.

Juri came to McMurry in Sept. 1950 and has attended both summer and winter since his arrival in order to complete his work as soon as possible. While a student he has been a member of Future Teachers of America, Science Club, Jaycees, Kiva, men's social club, and Kappa Delta Pi, national education society, for which he served as president this year.

During his stay on the campus, he estimates that he has made some 150 speeches at civic and church events throughout West Texas concerning his home-land and foreign relations of the United States.

Nou escaped from Estonia when the Russians made their second invasion and was taken to Germany by the Nazis and placed in a labor camp. Following the end of World War II, he was transferred to a displaced person camp and from there came to the United States and lived in the eastern states for a year before coming to McMurry.
