ordered the industry seized. President Philip Murray of the CIO and the steelworkers union called the stoppage after Federal Judge David Pine said yesterday that President Truman had no authority to seize the steel plants.

Consumers are expected to begin feeling the pinch almost immediately. Natural gas users in eight midwestern states are sure to be affected.

New York City, also, shouldn't feel the effects too badly. It receives a large part of its petroleum supplies by tanker, much of it from Venezuela and the Middle East.

Union spokesmen estimate the walkout involves slightly less than half the total number of basic workers in the oil industry. It's contained mainly to refinery workers, but includes some pipeline and field production personnel.

Federal Judge David Pine issued a temporary order today at Washington ending government control of the steel industry. Almost immediately he refused a government request to hold up the order.

Pine turned down an appeal by Justice Department attorneys to build up the effect of his order pending an appeal to higher courts. Government attorneys planned to make an immediate request for a stay order in the Federal District Court of Appeals.

Yesterday, Judge Pine ruled the steel seizure illegal, and the CIO steelworkers union called its 650,000 members out on a strike which already has cut off 95 per cent of the country's steel production.

AUSTIN—Mental disorders today represent a real problem and it is estimated that almost fifty percent of all hospital beds are filled by persons suffering from mental or nervous diseases, declares Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

It thus appears that modern civilization is exacting a terrific toll. High speed living with its cruel exactions upon nature, is responsible for a large part of the trouble. But improper personal conduct must also shoulder much of the blame.

For example, general paralysis is the direct cause of many mental troubles in males entering hospitals. This condition is an organic disease of the brain due to the germ responsible for syphilis. It is a preventable disease. Early and effective treatment of acquired syphilis will block the end results of general paralysis in the insane.

1. Let the house work for you, not you for the house. Keep dirt-catching at a minimum by eliminating gewgaws, dust-absorbing upholstery, and easily stained carpets. Stick to washable accessories and floors such as clay tile which may be wiped clean in seconds. 2. Build time-saving conveniences into the home, devoting as much of the budget as possible

to automatic appliances, durable and easily cleaned surfaces such as clay tile in kitchen and bathroom, and a heating system which produces a minimum of grease and dirt. 3. Live as closely to a household schedule as a man does to an office routine. Time frittered away is never recaptured. 4. Learn shortcuts. 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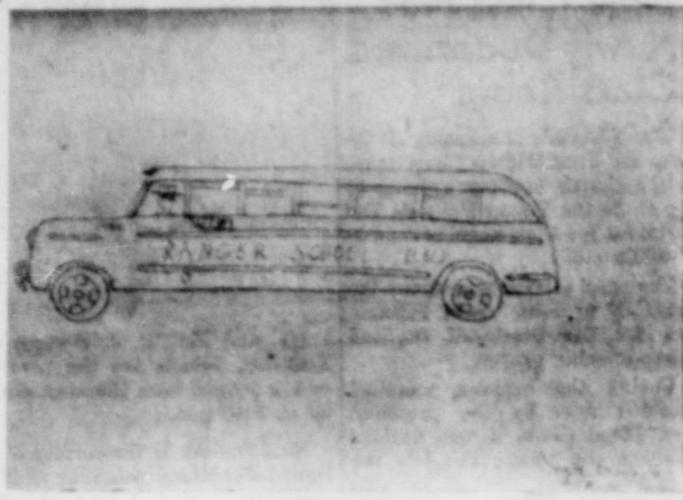
Getting Social Security Number Important Now

June graduates of high schools, vocational schools, and colleges are urged to apply for their so-

cial security account-number cards before they graduate. Also, students who are not graduating this June but who expect to work during their summer vacations should obtain their cards before classes end. Seasonal workers, who expect to be employed for the first time on jobs covered by social security, should likewise apply early. Many prospective employers will not hire a person unless he has his social security account-number cards with him, and many a good job has been lost this way.

Ralph T. Fisher, manager of the Abilene social security office, says that the importance of the account number lies in the fact that wages can be credited only through the use of the account number. Since the money recorded in a person's social security account is used to figure benefits, the more money credited in the account the higher the benefits. Thus, if for any reason wages are reported without an account number or with an incorrect number, then those wages may not be credited to the account. Not only may future benefits be smaller because of this, but in some cases no benefits may be payable at all.

The advice of the Social Security office is: "Remember that your

May Baskets Come To The Dinner Table

May Day is sure to bring gay little baskets to your front door. And, Mother, why not let your family find a surprise at dinner. Make your main dish Meat Baskets with Creamed Potatoes.

Moisten with 1/2 teaspoon of salt and 1/4 teaspoon of pepper. Line ungreased muffin pans with the meat mixture to a depth of about 1/4 inch. Next, fill the baskets with creamed potatoes and they're ready to cook. Bake in a moderate

oven (350 degrees F.) for about 30 minutes.

Or change about and serve creamed meat in potato baskets. French fried noodle baskets or pastry baskets are other choices. Filling suggestions include creamed ham and pimiento or mushrooms, creamed chipped beef with peas and creamed lamb or canned luncheon meat.

Game Officials Want Waterfowl Zoning In State

AUSTIN—The Texas Game & Fish Commission Friday renewed its efforts to have Texas zoned for waterfowl hunting.

It authorized its executive secretary to again appeal to the Federal Fish & Waterfowl service which has final authority.

Commission members agreed that Texas is so large that one hunting season for the entire state handicaps goose and duck gunners in either the north or south part.

The Commission also authorized the executive secretary to draft a legislative bill whereby a limited number of deer should be harvested each fall to balance the herd.

The Commission decided to continue experiments with fishways across Padre Island as a means of providing sports fishing in Laguna Madre, and authorized for their efforts to keep Yarbrough Pass open. A delegation urged a new pass to be cut at Redfish Bay.



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WTCC Irked At Proposed Steel Union Control

Support of the movement in Congress for an investigation of the Wage Stabilization Board's recommendation of a union shop in the steel industry has been urged upon Texas members of both Houses by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce in messages from its president, Frank H. Kelley of Colorado City.

Sentiment of West Texas was expressed by votes of Texas members of the House when they supported the Allen resolution, which called for such an investigation, said Kelley. The measure was supported by all the 15 Texans whose votes were recorded when it was adopted.

Establishment of the union shop in industry by insistence from the Wage Stabilization Board would be a backward and reactionary step in labor-management relations, Kelley said in a letter to members of the Texas delegation.

The union shop is a non-economic issue and properly should be resolved between labor and management and is entirely outside rightful functions of a government agency, said Kelley.

He wrote WTCC directors that in the steel case, the government has become a party to a direct attempt to impose the union shop. Instead of protecting citizens in their right to earn a livelihood, the recommendation would force certain workers to join and support a private organization, which some clearly have indicated they do not wish to do.

"Certain members of the Wage Stabilization Board maintain that they merely recommended the union shop and did not order it. A government recommendation, however, can easily be given much of the force of an order, and might cause a strike to be called under the guise of 'upholding the hand of the government.'"

It approved a new Commission-sponsored basic research center at Texas A&M College and agreed to designate Spring Lake in San Marcos as a fish sanctuary.

The Commission took under consideration a proposed new state hunting license, with attached tags for big game.

The Commission authorized the executive secretary to study the proposed licensing of fox hunters. It proposed action on a suggestion to license more agencies to sell fishing and hunting permits.

The executive secretary reported that at least one more year will be required to prepare a state song hard for public sale.

The Commission named a committee to meet in Fort Worth Tuesday to study a site for the new Eagle Mountain fish hatchery.
