The administration's farm bill was defeated in the House of Representatives by a 215 to 205 vote, due mostly to a failure of those people favoring the bill to do anything in its cause. As with many government programs, only those who oppose raise the clamor.

It was a hard bill to get worked up about, but under the circumstances its tight provisions and good price supports reflected the only way of cutting some of the billion dollars plus storage costs and reducing surpluses under the price support system that grew out of the depression years.

A chief opponent of the bill, and the organization that probably caused its defeat, was the American Farm Bureau Federation. It is our own understanding that the Farm Bureau approach to the problem would be to lower price supports to where they act as a safeguard instead of an incentive to overproduction. Eventually, under their theory, the market would stabilize and price supports could be dropped altogether, permitting the farmer more freedom of operation and protecting the taxpayers from price supports. Farm Bureau president Charles Shuman fights government price support programs with an evangelistic zeal.

Now the Farm Bureau program is reasonable enough as far as it goes. People critical of price supports for many years have advocated doing away with this segment of the government's farm program and letting the chips fall where they may. In a competitive economy there is no point, they say, in keeping marginal farmers in business. If they can't make a living under competitive conditions they should get out, just like in ordinary business ventures.

Ordinarily, this might be sound reasoning. It is quite probable that corporation type farms could compete in the world market long after the marginal farmer has moved to town. But our contention is that without price supports and acreage controls there would be such high production that cotton would drop to ten or fifteen cents or even less and that grain sorghum and wheat would drop to one-third their present levels. The American farmer could dump so many of his products on the market that he would ruin prices the world over, starting a farm depression that could have catastrophic results.

We contend that with fifty cent grain sorghum, seventy-five cent wheat and ten cent cotton just about every farmer in this area would become less than marginal and that only giant corporation farms with the latest in equipment and the smallest amounts of labor could stay in business. With two or three companies farming the Texas Panhandle thousands of farmers from this area would lose their properties requiring lifetimes to accumulate. Almost four million farmers and their families would have to go to town to seek work at a time when unemployment is high and welfare rolls already overburdened. A white man could stay on the farm only by working at less wages than those now normally paid to colored and Latin American hands. It is also possible that such a high utilization of machinery (i.e., moving equipment from south to north with the seasons) that a severe depression could result for the farm equipment business.

This isn't idle speculation. Remove price supports and restrictions and every farmer would plant all his land in one or more money crops, eventually creating such a huge world surplus that it could hardly be given away. World prices—today helped somewhat by American price supports—would fall in chaos.

There are some problems we must live with. This isn't Utopia or a dream world where freedom and free enterprise will solve all problems. We wish there were a better way, but we don't want to scuttle American farm life experimenting. And until there is a safeguard against this eventually happening we don't want anyone removing supports and restrictions.

The time is long past for bold new concepts for equipping the American farmer to survive without government help. Until a new plan, which would mold farmers and give them ways to protect themselves, we must look to the present farm philosophy that even its proponents dislike but which, as we said before, is the only working way at the moment for passing our farm heritage on to future generations.

Youngsters Learn Rules of the Road In Driver's Course

Driver's training program in the summer months has been taught the past three summers by James W. Bates, who teaches in Dimmitt High School.

Approximately 46 students taking the training program this summer have participated in 30 hours of classroom instruction, six hours actual behind-the-wheel driving, and eight hours observation.

Advantages in learning proper methods of piloting an automobile along with a marked reduction in insurance rates, and the ability of obtaining an operator's license when only 14 years of age are features for boys and girls enrolled in the program.

Students who are enrolled in Dimmitt's driver's education classes drive in Amarillo, Plainview, Hereford, Canyon and Lubbock. With this facet of driving activities the teenagers obtain city driver's training along with highway driving experience.

Actual in-the-car driving is done on a three-day basis. With this method students drive approxi-

mately 500 miles in a three-day period with driver rotation every hour.

Final day of driving is done in Dimmitt where quick emergency stops and parallel parking are emphasized. Correct procedures for making turns and changing lanes are also carried out during the last day of driving.

On completion of the course the new drivers take a written examination from the official state department of public safety examiner and then demonstrate various driving skills taught them during their driver's education class.

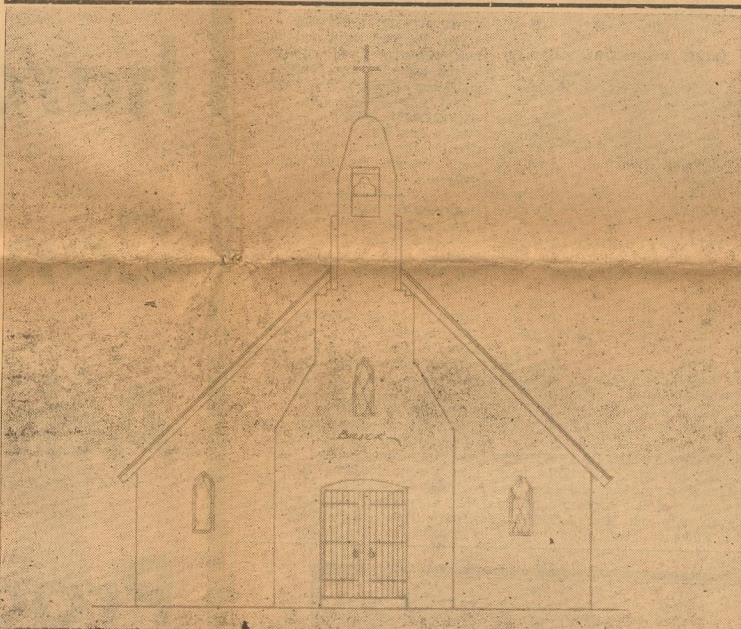

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PROPOSED PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

Presbyterians Give Go-ahead For New Church Building Here

Killingsworth Construction Company, Dimmitt, received a contract June 27 from the Presbyterian building committee to build Dimmitt's new Presbyterian Church in

West Dimmitt.

Construction on the pink brick building will begin in the next several weeks if necessary arrangements are completed in the near future, according to the contractor.

The \$33,786 structure will have auditorium seating facilities for about 125 persons. Three classrooms will be located in the downstairs portion of the building and in the upper level two classrooms and a study will be constructed.

Downstairs section of the church will be 30' x 70' and the upstairs portion will be 30' x 26'.

Woodrow Killingsworth, building contractor for the centrally air-conditioned church said completion of the building can be made within 90-120 days after construction begins.

Presbyterians have been meeting Sunday mornings in the base-

ment of the Castro County Courthouse in the Community Room.

Dimmitt Minister, who lives in the manse located just east of the new building site, is Burr Morris a native Texan, who was preach-

ing in Nebraska previous to his location in Dimmitt.

Presbyterian Church buildingsite and manse is located directly across the street from the new high school building site.

Decision of the post office department in the door-to-door delivery service will be based on whether city residents desire and need the service.

City delivery service would mean that mail of all classes could be delivered to residences and business firms within the city limits where the streets are paved and the area is at least 50 percent de-

veloped. Increased postal rates would be on letters mailed in Dimmitt for local delivery. Increase on local letters would be from three cents to four cents.

Door-to-door mail and parcel post delivery here would be made on a one-trip basis. Delivery trip would mean that approximately one-third of the patrons would receive their mail by noon and the remainder in the afternoon. Mail will not be delivered on Sundays and holidays unless the mail is of special delivery class.

Post office officials emphasized that a post office box could not be rented for the purpose of Sunday and holiday delivery only. However patrons can have a box and a carrier delivery although the mail will be sent only as addressed.

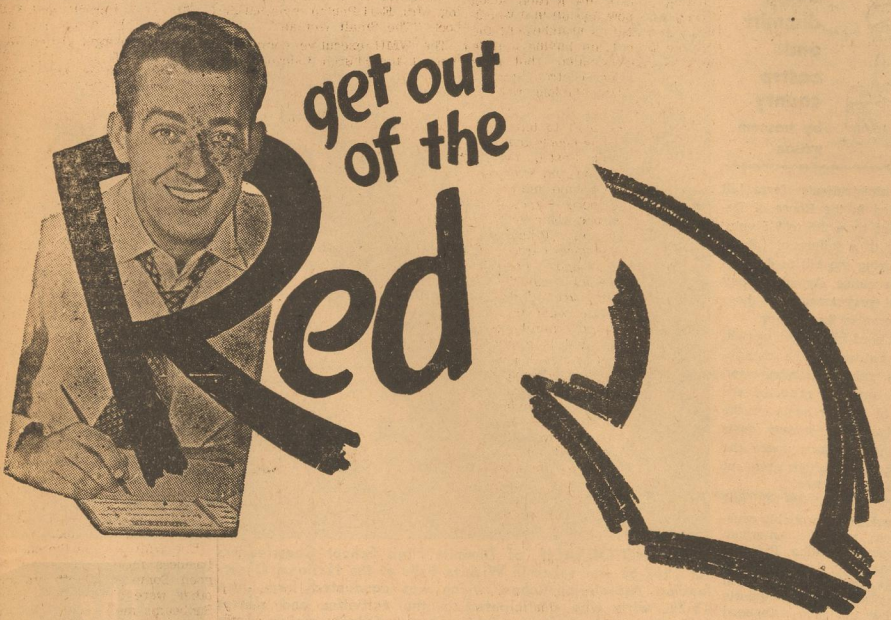

HIWAY SHOULDERS MAY RECEIVE HARDER SURFACE

College Station—Texas highway shoulders—the earth adjoining the paved surface—may someday wear the equivalent of a raincoat due to research conducted on the Texas A & M College campus.

This development, as with some others stemming from research through the years, actually is a by-product of a project concerned with a different problem. Dr. Morris E. Bloodworth, professor of physics in the Soil and Crop Sciences Department at Texas A&M is conducting research to find surfactants or chemical agents useful in keeping cropland from crusting over.

Finding of a suitable surfactant or chemical agent that affects the surfaces of tiny, or even microscopic, particles of matter, could improve the soil structure for a better infiltration of water and inward diffusion of air on countless thousands of acres of land in Texas and a vast acreage around the globe.

With the pressure of ever increasing population, all ways of making more land available for

increased agricultural production are of increasing importance.

One of the major projects of Dr. Bloodworth is to find an anticrusting agent that can be used to leach out the excessive amounts of soluble salts that make soil in the Pecos area saline. High amount of soluble salts in the soil make it difficult and in some cases impossible for plants to live, in addition to being responsible for formation of the crusts which can prevent plant emergence and even strangle young plants.

Dr. Bloodworth is working on this project in cooperation with the Soil and Water Section of the Department of Soil and Crop Sciences and the Trans-Pecos Substation.

Soils have interested Dr. Bloodworth ever since his undergraduate days on the Texas A&M campus. A member of the Class of 1941, he returned to the campus to complete the Master of Science and Doctor of Philosophy degrees and in 1956 he was named to the A&M College faculty.

Dr. Bloodworth thus far has checked out a total of some 70 surfactants in his broad study of them and their actions upon soils.

In Cooperation with agricultural engineers, in one research project, he is working toward the use of a suitable surfactant and organic material to prevent crusts forming upon the soil through "puddling" after rainfall.

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Highlights and Sidelights
FROM your State CAPITOL
By Vern Sanford.

AUSTIN, Tex.—State-owned islands along the coast and submerged lands in inland waters, now are available for lease for industrial purposes.

Leasing for industry was authorized last year by the Legislature. First step in the program was for Gov. Price Daniel to select the men to serve on a committee to advise the School Land Board on leasing procedures.

Daniel now has named J. Chrys Dougherty of Austin, an attorney and Dr. Armstrong Price of Corpus Christi as the advisors.

Procedure is this—a person who wants to lease state land must first apply to the city government if the land lies in a city limit, or to the county commissioners court. They publish notices and have public hearings. If they recommend the lease the three-man School Land Board then can consider it and set the amount of rent to be paid.

First application was from Port Aransas, which wants to lease part of Mustang Island for an airport.

SCHOOL BUS BARGAINS—Prices of school buses are falling.

State Board of Control, which buys buses for all the school districts on sealed bids, found that the price of 72-passenger buses has fallen by about \$1,200 this spring.

Purchases averaged \$5,430 while the 1961 average was \$6,618. Same sort of declines were noted in prices of smaller buses.

LEASES GO UP—but there was a note of higher prices, too.

For many years, the University of Texas lands in West Texas have been leased for oil and gas with only one-eighth royalty reserved for the University of Texas and Texas A & M College, which share in the proceeds.

This year, the royalty was raised to one-sixth, and only 9 of 101 tracts offered for lease were passed over by the oil company bidders who bought them at an auction sale.

Cash bonuses averaged \$38,64 an acre. This is lower than at some sales in the past. But if they find oil or gas, the University fund will get more of it due to the higher royalty fees.

IMPACT STILL DRY—That long-expected "oasis" in West Texas will stay dry awhile longer. It is the town of Impact, in the edge of bone-dry Abilene, which incorporated and voted itself wet in 1961.

Atty. Gen Will Wilson and the City of Abilene brought suit to declare the incorporation invalid. But District Judge J.R. Black held that the incorporation had been validated by the Legislature. It was done in a validating act passed mainly for the City of Plano, which just happened to apply to Impact, also.

However, State Liquor Administrator Cok Stevenson Jr. announced that he will not grant a package store permit which has been pending for months. He'll wait to see what the higher courts say about Judge Black's ruling, since the case will be carried to the Texas Supreme Court.

So there won't be any legal liquor in Taylor County for many more months.

TEXTBOOK STORM—The special House of Representatives committee which had some stormy hearings wound up its business with an internal storm.

Rep. W.T. Dungan of McKinney held the final hearing all by himself in Taylor County for many months.

Each member will write his own report to the House on the procedures by which textbooks are selected.

During its stormy life, committee heard one member called a "card carrying communist" by a lady in Amarillo. He filed suit against her, and apparently the folks back home didn't believe her, because he won renomination.

PARK FOLDER—A sharp new folder describing for tourists the facilities and location of state parks is being made available by the State Parks Board.

A fishing scene at Lake Brownwood State Park is the colorful cover for the booklet.

RETIRED JUDGES—The judicial retirement system was designed so judges could leave the bench for a few years of rest before their deaths.

Statistics just worked up on the operation of the system by State Auditor C.H. Cavness reveals that there are 219 district and appellate judges paying into the retirement fund, and 31 who are on retirement.

During the last state fiscal year, five retired judges died and 11 retired. Of 62 judges who have retired, 31 had died as of the date of the audit.

But the retirement system may not have succeeded in keeping judges on the bench. During the year, 10 left the bench without retiring, to go into private law practices.

About Your HEALTH

Early this fall more than 238,000 young Texans will be entering both private and public schools for the first time.

Even though opening of school is still some weeks away, parents are busy making preparation to insure their child makes a smooth adjustment to his new environment.

The child's adjustment will be more rapid and satisfactory if he starts his school life in good, sound health.

Have your family physician or local clinic give your child a complete physical examination including an eye check. His teeth should also be checked by the family dentist. If these examinations show there are ailments or defects that can & should be looked after, then follow the doctor's and dentist's advice and have them corrected, if possible, before you enroll him in school.

It's likely that your child has already been immunized against certain of the childhood diseases such as diphtheria, whooping cough and smallpox. If not, have it done immediately either by your doctor or by the local health clinic. If all immunizations have been done previously, make sure your child gets the necessary booster dose.

Insist on your child's getting regular and sufficient hours of sleep to help him enjoy school. He needs ten to twelve hours of sleep in a quiet, darkened room with an open window to build up his energy and offset his tiredness.

Proper nutrition is very important. When school starts, allow enough time for a wholesome breakfast. A good breakfast includes citrus fruit or juice, milk, whole grain cereal or bread, eggs or bacon or both.

Lunch and dinner should be a leisurely meal. The new adventure of school is a pretty fast pace, but mealtime offers an opportunity for the family to pause and relax together.

Also nearly every school district in Texas requires proof-of-age for first year students in the form of a certificate of birth.

You may obtain a copy by sending a dollar and a half plus the name of the child, the date of birth, the place of birth, and both the father's and mother's names to the Division of Vital Statistics Texas State Health Department, 410 East 5th Street, Austin, Texas.

Nazareth Man In Air Force Maneuver

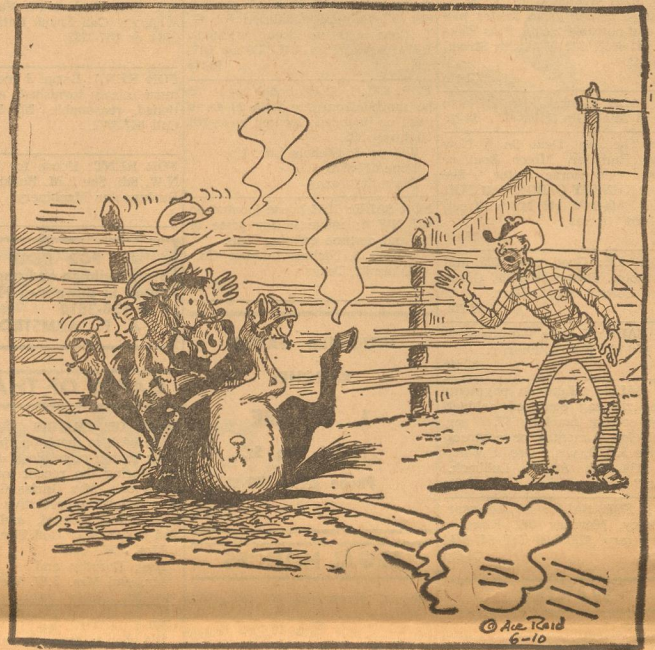

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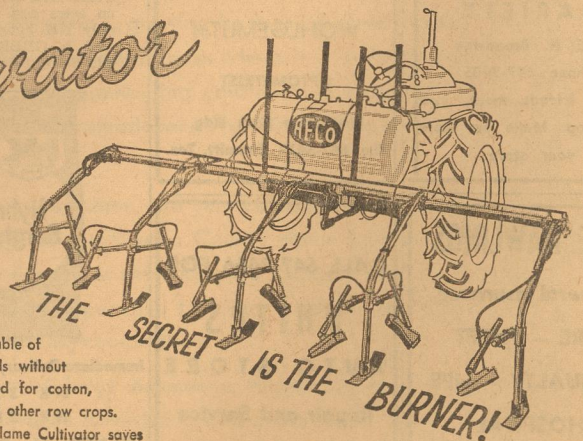
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
