Bobcats to Olton Ends Regular Slate

The Dimmitt Bobcats, within shouting distance of season's end and holder of 1-AA Conference championship, take on the Olton Mustangs Friday night in what promises to be another in a long line of football thrillers this year. While the Mustangs have won

only two games in Conference play, they have lost by only one or two touchdowns to Dalhart and Muleshoe and defeated Canyon on penetrations. They outscored Tulia. While Olton was never considered one of the stronger Conference contenders, they do have a good, heavy and consistent team—and they will be playing for their homecoming Friday night.

Coaches Covington, Fuquay and Etheridge have had a nerve-wrecking season thus far. While Dimmitt has been defeated only once (Lockney 32 Dimmitt 0) all season, they have had only one or two games all season which allowed the reserves to see much action. Dalhart, Canyon, Tulia, and Muleshoe, all pre-season hot potentials in the 1-AA conference race, have handed the Bobcats a load of jittery scares. Dimmitt defeated all these teams, but it took everything they had to do it.

It has not been an easy season for the Bobcats and Olton would like nothing better than lapping the daylight out of the Bobcats this week end.

Harvest Still Slow

Castro County farmers, with a bumper grain crop in their fields, are still unable to begin fullscale harvesting operations due to wet weather.

While there has been little rain this week, the humidity has been high enough to prohibit rapid drying out of the grain.

So far the ASC office has written

292 loans covering 43,000,000 pounds of grain. This does not include that harvested which is too damp to put into government loan. (Loan price presently nets \$1.64 to the producer, while the market is about \$1.45). Value of the loans made thus far this year is about \$700,000.

Preharvest estimates of pro-

duction ran from 800 million to a billion pounds for Castro County. This week, as well as for the past month, there is no way of telling how much or when grain will be harvested.

BOBCATS WIN DISTRICT

The Dimmitt Bobcats Friday night cinched themselves a Conference 1-AA Championship when they slipped by the strong Muleshoe Mules, 12-7.

In winning this game, the Bobcats earned the right to represent Conference 1-AA and to play the Lockney Longhorns for the Bi-District Championship. The game is expected to be played either during the afternoon or night on Friday, November 22 at Plainview. Lockney, high-riding champions of 2-AA after their Friday victory over Floydada, handed the Bobcats their only defeat early in the season, 32-0.

The Bobcats hold the championship because every other team in

tight Conference 1-AA has lost at least two games and the Bobcats have lost none. Even a loss to Olton Friday would still leave the Bobcats one game ahead of everyone else.

Dimmitt 12, Muleshoe 7
An estimated 2,000 people set in chilling temperatures Friday night and saw the Dimmitt Bobcats hand the Muleshoe Mules a 12-7 defeat and cinch the Conference 1-AA championship.

Dimmitt was in scoring territory many times during the night, but were unable to put the ball across more than twice. One touchdown, in the first quarter, was called back on a penalty and

it was not until the third quarter that Dimmitt scored one that stuck.

This tally came on one of the most spectacular runs of the season. It started when halfback Norman Nelson took a pitchout from Quarterback Truman Touchstone and started around the left side of the Dimmitt line. Nelson barely shook himself loose from two pursuers at the line of scrimmage on the 30 and broke into an open field.

He picked up ten or fifteen yards gratis before what looked like the entire Muleshoe team descended on the Dimmitt halfback. After stumbling, jumping, twisting and weaving for some fifteen yards with almost every Mule laying a hand on him at least once, Nelson bounded over the line for a touchdown to put Dimmitt ahead 6-0. The try for extra point failed.

The second touchdown for Dimmitt came in the fourth quarter when Keith Lowe took the ball on the twenty and scattered 18 yards to the Muleshoe 2-yard line before being pulled down. It took the Bobcats four plays to make the two yards due to a penalty back to the six on the third down. Zay Gilbreath punched the ball over from the six-yard line on the fourth. The try for extra point failed.

Muleshoe's lone score came in the fourth quarter when Dimmitt's kicking ace Cary Johnson, had to kick from about Dimmitt's two-yard line. The ball bounded out on about the thirty, giving Muleshoe one of their best breaks of the game. They were able to get the ball to Dimmitt's fifteen when Mule quarterback Dickie Johnson broke loose and scored. Johnson also made the extra point for Muleshoe.

Virtually every Dimmitt line-man turned in one of their best games of the season. Most of the Bobcats' success this year has been due to their forward defensive wall practicing the old universal truth among football circles. "If you don't let 'em score, they can't win."

State Receives 7.4 Million Acres Of Cotton

Farmers in Texas will have 7,474,661 acres available on which to grow their 1958 upland cotton crop and producers of extra long staple cotton 27,829 acres.

These state allotments, according to the State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, will be apportioned among the counties and the county allotments, to be announced later, among the farms according to the provisions of the law and regulations issued by the Secretary of Agriculture. The State Committee adds that individual farm allotments will be mailed to cotton producers prior to the December 10 referendum on marketing quotas for the 1958 crops.

The state committeemen point out that the December 10 referendums, for upland and extra long staple cotton growers, will determine whether or not marketing quotas will be operative for the 1958 crops. At least two-thirds of those voting in the two referendums must approve the quotas if they are to remain in effect. Acreage allotments, however, say the committeemen will be in effect regardless of how the votes go. Acreage allotments are a condition of eligibility for price support. A national marketing allotment and national acreage allotment for upland cotton must be proclaimed for the following year if the Secretary finds that the total supply of upland cotton for the current marketing year exceeds the normal supply. For extra long staple cotton, quotas and allotments must be proclaimed when-

Average Cotton Staple Length Running 1 inch on South Plains

Despite adverse weather conditions on the High Plains this fall, statistics on cotton classing data from the U.S. Department show the average staple length this year is 1 inch. The average micronaire is 4.3 and the average Pressley strength is 75 thousand pounds per square inch.

This is the first time statistics on micronaire and Pressley data have been available. George W. President of the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. announced. Pfeif-

ferberger said arrangements were made with the U.S.D.A. to determine and publish the micronaire and Pressley data in addition to grade and staple statistics.

As of November 2, cumulative figures from 220,000 bales classed at the Lubbock and Lamesa classing offices show that in grade 64.1 percent of the cotton is white and 35.9 is light spotted and spotted. W. E. Franklin, Head of the Lubbock office, reported that the

vast majority of the 35.9 percent cotton classed as spotted actually is light spotted cotton. Published U.S.D.A. report shows this area to have only four-tenths of one percent full spotted cotton.

In staple 71.8 percent is 1 inch or longer only 1.6 percent is shorter than 15-16.

In the micronaire tests the majority of the bales tested fall in the 3.5 to 4.9 category. The largest single percentage, 41.09, is in the 4.0 to 4.4 range. Less than 5 percent falls below 3.0 and more than 8 percent is above 5.0. A total of 8,055 tests were made for micronaire data.

In the Pressley tests three-fourths of the bales tested fall in the range from 70,000 to 85,000. Less than four percent fall below 65,000 while about 20 percent is 80,000 or above. A total of 1,961 tests were made from Pressley data.

Pfeifferberger explained that much significant data about High Plains cotton can now be obtained from the data on grade, staple, micronaire and Pressley.

"This information will enable prospective buyers of High Plains cotton to tell the character of our cotton without making preliminary tests of their own, and it may provide the way for additional sales," Pfeifferberger added.
