#### Two Desserts with One Making

Here's an idea you'll want to try the next time you're having guests for luncheon, dinner, or buffet supper.

What you do is make a big, round, deep 10-inch layer of oldfashioned burnt sugar cake on company day. Simply put cake on a big, pretty serving plate with ivy leaves under cake for garnish. Carefully cut a circle out of the center; remove center, leaving a 3-inch outer ring. Frost ring with Creamy Orange Frosting. At

serving time, heap ice cream into center of the ring cake, bring to table with a bowl of Party Butterscotch Sauce to spoon over ice cream.

What about the remaining center piece? Spread it, too, with the same frosting, cover and put away for dessert for the family the next day. When ready to serve, decorate the little cake with halves of seeded grapes or maraschino cherries. Serve with bowls of sugared sliced peaches or other fruits in season.

If you'd like to make your own cake plate for the little cake, turn a stemmed goblet upside-down, attach a small plate to bottom of goblet with bits of molding clay. Be sure both golblet and plate are dry.

#### Old Fashioned Burnt Sugar Cake

- 3/2 cup C and H cane brown
- sngar
  \( \) cup boiling water
  \( \) cups C and H cane
  granulated sugar
  \( 2 \) cups all purpose flour
  \( 3 \) teaspoons baking powder
  \( \) teaspoons salt
  \( \) cup shortening
  \( 2 \) case
- 2 eggs I cup cold seater I teaspoon vanilla flavoring

First, make this buent sugar syrup: Melt 1; cup brown augar in heavy frying pan over low heat, stirring constantly. When sugar is dark and burnt in appearance, remove from heat, and at edge of pan slowly stir in ½ cup boiling water. Return burnt sugar to heat and boil gently, about 5 miontes, until thickened. Cool.

Next, make the cake: Cream short-ening, and gradually cream in 15 cups granulated sugar until light and fluffy. Sife in eggs, one at a time, heating well each time. Measure and

sift flour with baking powder and salt, then gradually add to creamed mixture, alternating with the cold water, and beating well after each addition. Stir in 3 tablespoons of the burnt sugar syrup and 1 teaspoon vanills. Pour into well-greased 10-inch cake pan at least 1½ inches deep. Bake at 375° for about 45 minutes, or until well done. Serves 6 to 3.

#### Creamy Orange Frosting

- 2 cups sifted C and H cane powdered sugar 2 tablespoons softened batter
- I egg yolk I beaten egg white
- 1 to 2 tables poons grated orange peel 1/2 teaspoon grated lemon peel Orange juice

Cream butter, then stir in egg yolk and salt. Gradually cream in sifted powdered sugar and grated fruit peels, using only enough erange juice to make a spreading consist-ency. Fold in stiffly beaten egg white,



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
