### 304 More Reds Desert Koje Island Buddies

A trail of trampled Red-starred caps marked a road to freedom on Koje Island today.

Anti-Communist prisoners, 304 of them, broke away from their comrades as they were marching out of Compound 85 to smaller quarters and ran to safety behind Allied guards.

A total of 11,000 war prisoners were moved today. That makes 61,000 prisoners shifted to smaller compounds.

In Washington, acting Defense Secretary William Foster says arrangements are being made to send a team of neutral observers to inspect the Koje Island camp.

And the United Nations command has demanded proof that four Communist prison camps are where the Reds said they were five months ago. Allied air reconnaissance shows no trace of the camps.

## STATE BAR MEMBERS WILL HEAR NOTED CRIME WRITER

HOUSTON, June 18—An address by Eric Stanley Gardner, lawyer turned writer, and a panel discussion in which he and other members of the famous "Court of Last Resort" will participate at the 1952 annual convention of the State Bar of Texas, scheduled in Houston on July 25. Bar president Cecil E. Burney announced completion of arrangements for the appearance of the noted author as principal speaker at the organization's annual banquet on the evening of July 4th.

Members of the "Court" will hold forth at a general convention assembly the following morning with the creator of fictional lawyer Perry Mason acting as moderator for the group. The public will be admitted as spectators to the latter session Burney indicated. An attendance of more than 2,000 jurists is expected for this the 17th annual meeting of Texas lawyers and judges.

### Benny Binion Be Tried in Dallas

The trial of gambler Benny Binion and his onetime partner, Harry R. Urban, Sr., on federal income tax evasion charges will be held in Dallas this fall.

U. S. Attorney Frank Potter said the two would be tried separately before Federal Judge T. Whitfield Davidson in September.

Binion, now living in Las Vegas, Nevada, has successfully resisted Texas' attempts to extradite him since his indictment two years ago in Dallas on charges of operating a policy racket. Both Binion and Urban were indicted in Ft. Worth last month by a special federal grand jury.

## Contested Texas GOP Votes Peacemaker To Be Decided

The Republican National Committee picks a peacemaker today in the bitter fight over the Texas delegation.

A decision will be made on whether the Chicago convention or the Texas state G.O.P. committee should make final decisions on most of the disputed votes.

The dispute involves 38 delegates. Backers of Senator Robert Taft swung the votes to Taft at the state convention after calling pro-Eisenhower delegates Democrats in disguise.

The Eisenhower forces then bolted the convention and help one of their own. Now two separate 38-man delegations from Texas are competing for official recognition. Eisenhower forces have been demanding the issue be settled at the Chicago convention itself. They say the Texas republican committee is dominated by Taft

## "Sympathy" Will Be Given Steel Price Hearing

WASHINGTON, June 18 (UP)—Economic Stabilizer Roger Putnam says the steel industry has been promised its application for a price increase will receive "friendly and sympathetic" consideration if it negotiates a wage contract with the striking steelworkers. Putnam says the increase to be considered would be three-dollars a ton.

Putnam says he and acting Defense Mobilizer John Steelman talked about a price increase of four-and-a-half dollars a ton, "among other things." But he adds, no figure was agreed upon. Putnam says the discussion came up during the latest steel wage negotiations, and that Steelman promised the industry a "friendly and sympathetic hearing."

## Yarborough To Speak, Eastland Friday, June 26

Judge Ralph Yarborough, candidate for Governor, will speak at Eastland on June 26, in interest of his campaign for the governorship of Texas.

On his road trip through Texas, Yarborough has declared that there is "corruption" at the state level and pointed to a Travis County grand jury report to back him up. The grand jury said, "testimony given before the grand jury would indicate—that often in the past no report for political reasons or otherwise has been made to the grand jury when obvious violations had been detected."

Judge Yarborough called for restoration of the Narcotics Division of the State Department of Public Safety.

## Federal Building In West Texas Is Told By WTCC

ABILENE — Cost of construction in West Texas by the Department of Defense that is under way, that has been authorized by Congress, and that is being requested for 1953 will total \$155,877,000, according to a report prepared by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. The report was compiled from information obtained from the Defense Department and the U. S. Corps of Engineers.

Each construction is being completed, and much more is more than 75 per cent finished.

Cost of work under way and to be negotiated in contracts includes the following: Fort Bliss, El Paso, \$27,750,000; William Beaumont Army Hospital, El Paso, \$96,900; Fort Worth Quartermaster Depot, \$6,492,000; Amarillo Air Force Base, \$9,476,000; James L. Webb Air Force Base, Big Spring, \$6,044,000; Biggs Air Force Base, El Paso, \$1,279,000; Carswell Air Force Base, Ft. Worth, \$1,394,000; Fort Hood, \$15,540,000; James Connally Air Force Base, Waco, \$9,500,000; Sheppard Air Force Base, Wichita Falls, \$9,570,000; Perrin Field, Sherman, Denison, \$9,000,000; Laughlin Field, Del Rio, \$2,100,000.

The Public Works Construction Bill now before Congress contains \$32,844,000 for improvements at an Air Force Base yet to be activated. It is Tye Field, nine miles west of Abilene, where citizens recently subscribed \$500,000 for purchase of land the Air Force had indicated it will need if the appropriation is approved.

West Texas expenditures requested by Secretary of Defense Robert A. Lovett, which are listed in the 1953 Public Works Construction Bill, include the following for West Texas Army posts and Air Force bases: Fort Bliss, \$5,036,000; Biggs Air Force Base, \$773,000; Carswell Air Force Base, \$1,744,000; Tye Field, \$32,273,000; James Webb Air Force Base, \$6,270,000; Fort Hood, \$10,516,000; James Connally Air Force Base, \$7,829,000; Goodfellow Air Force Base, San Angelo, \$5,741,000; Laughlin Air Force Base, \$4,958,000; Reese Air Force Base, Lubbock, \$8,239,000; Perrin Air Force Base, \$4,016,000.

Today, the divers may find out for sure. Sweden's King Adolf has told his people—"we are vigorously determined to defend ourselves with arms in hand if warfare should come to our country."

## Moisture For Crops Depleting

Another hot, sultry day is in store for Texans today with more 100-plus temperatures and still no relief in sight. Yesterday's temperatures ranged from the high of 105 at Presidio to Galveston's 87. Overnight, it was no cooler than Marfa's 62 and ranged upwards to 77 degrees at Dallas, Palacio and Presidio.

Residents of the Lubbock area were blessed with a thunderstorm which dumped 1.13 inches of rain. Dalhart, in the Panhandle, had eight hundredths of the only other moisture recorded in the state.

Weathermen say the outlook for today and tomorrow is for clear to partly cloudy weather and continued hot. The forecast says West Texans can expect some widely scattered afternoon and evening thundershowers.

In Austin, the U. S. Department of Agriculture reports that hot, open weather combined with steady winds and growing crops is rapidly depleting moisture reserves over most of Texas. The USDA says rain will be needed soon in all areas to maintain progress, particularly for feed crops.

The report said crops and pastures made rapid development last week, and in the northwest, cotton and sorghum planting was pushed toward completion. The department says the oat harvest is in full swing and yields are "very good." However, the wheat harvest is dragging on the high plains where combine crews are waiting for the crop to ripen.

## Texan Takes Stand In Own Kidnap Case

Thirty-one-year-old Louis B. Conley of Amarillo was taken from his Brockton, Massachusetts, jail cell today to tell his story of the alleged beating of his wife and kidnaping of his daughter five years ago.

Conley was caught in the witness stand after the state rested its case in his kidnaping and assault trial. His divorced wife testified that Conley hit her and her mother with brass knuckles on June 26th, 1947, and then kidnaped his daughter, Lynette, from her crib and took her to Texas.

The girl is still living with his relatives in Amarillo. Conley has been in jail two years on contempt charges because he refuses to take her back to Brockton.

## Above Normal Heat Forecast Next 30 Days

A blanket of warm air is covering the east, but prespiring residents are hoping for the best.

The Midwest already has received some relief from the heat wave. And crop forecasters say that farmhands in Kansas and Minnesota are in fine shape despite the hot weather.

In Washington, the weather bureau has a little bad news for most everyone. It predicts that the temperature in most of the nation will be above normal during the next 30 days.

The House bill increasing old-age insurance benefits by about five dollars a month now goes to the Senate. The Finance Committee will decide whether hearings on the bill should be held.



American officials sit down with Russians today in Washington in

the hopes of getting down to brass tacks on Russia's offer to settle up its wartime lend-lease account. The Reds have promised to return 186 of the 670 ships they received from this country under lend-lease accounts. The Soviet spokesman said the vessels would be returned in four or five months. American officials want a definite understanding on the transfer date right now.

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


