Senators Turn Down Own Raise

WASHINGTON, June 28 (UP)—The Senate has decided its members can get along on their current \$12,500 salary, plus a \$2,500 expense account.

Even though the expense account won't be tax exempt any more after Dec. 31, the senators voted overwhelmingly Friday night to keep the "wage ceiling" on their own pay after toying four hours with ideas to lift it.

Then the Senate passed a \$76,889,948 appropriation bill to run Congress during fiscal 1953, which begins Tuesday.

In reaching the decision on members' pay, the Senate:

1. Rejected, 32 to 38, a proposal by Sen. Russell B. Long, D-La., to let an 18-man commission set congressional pay on the basis of such things as the "sacrifices" made by congressmen in accepting public office.
2. Adopted, 67 to 2, an amendment by Sen. John J. Williams, R-Del., knocking out a House-approved special tax deduction for congressmen's living expenses in Washington. Instead, the amendment substituted a ban on writing off political contributions as bad debts on anybody's income tax returns.

STEEL STRIKE THREATENS TO CRIPPLE AUTOMOBILE OUTPUT

PITTSBURGH, June 28 (UP)—The 28-day-old steel strike threatened huge cutbacks in automobile production Saturday, but there was one bright spot as the union signed an agreement with the Pittsburgh Steel Co.

A spokesman for the CIO United Steelworkers said that the agreement with Pittsburgh, a basic producer employing more than 10,500 workers in seven plants, was "an important break" in the solid resistance of the steel industry.

Only a few hours earlier Friday, however, Ford Motor Co. announced that "sharply curtailed" operations resulting from the steel strike would virtually halt production at 18 Ford and Lincoln-Mercury assembly plants next Monday.

Ford Furloughs 27,000 Workers

Ford said it would furlough more than 27,000 workers beginning Tuesday.

The "WSB type" agreement between the union and Pittsburgh Steel provides a "modified" union shop clause under which new workers must join the U.S.W. when hired but can withdraw within 30 days from date of employment if they choose.

The union shop clause has been one of the chief stumbling blocks to an industry-wide settlement.

Agreement Gives Wage Boost

The interim agreement also provides a 12 and one-half cent hourly wage increase and shift differentials of six and nine cents an hour retroactive to last August.

Ranger Relatives Receive Word Of G. E. Berry Death

Word has been received in Ranger of the death of G. E. Berry, who died Saturday morning in Grand Saline of a heart attack. Mr. Berry is a brother to H. C. Berry of Ranger and the pressman for this paper. An uncle of the deceased, J. B. Shirley, also lives in Ranger.

Mr. Berry is survived by his wife, three children, three brothers, two sisters, and his mother, Mrs. Len E. Berry of Grand Saline. Funeral services will probably be tomorrow afternoon at Grand Flat, Texas with the J. B. English Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Berry and children, J. B. Shirley, and Mrs. H. C. Berry's mother, left Ranger Saturday to attend the funeral.

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First Governor Arrives For Annual Conference

Old Timers Gather At Cowboy Reunion, Stamford

STAMFORD, June 27 (UP)—The real oldtime cowboys will have their reunion in Stamford July 1-4.

It's the Texas Cowboy Reunion, which has been held every year since 1930. The four-day show includes a rodeo, but that's only a part of the program.

The Texas Cowboy Reunion Association has more than 600 members, all of them at least 50 years of age and all of them men who worked on a ranch at least 35 years ago.

Last year the old cowboys came from 42 states. Their badge of membership entitles them to admission to the rodeo, and a daily chuck wagon meal.

Have Own Bunkhouse

Members of the reunion association also own the bunkhouse, a handsome stone structure where they meet every year. They'll talk over old times and renew acquaintances over a table of dominoes.

The older members of the association—those 55 years old and older—have a contest of their own. It's the oldtime calf roping contest, with first prize of a saddle and second prize a pair of spurs.

The oldtime cowboys take part in the cutting horse event. That event was first staged at the Texas Cowboy Reunion.

The prize this year will be another fine prize saddle.

A group of Stamford businessmen, ranchers and others are the officials of the Texas cowboy reunion, the working organization which puts on the show.

Same Reunion President

W. G. Swenson, vice-president and general manager of Swenson Land and Cattle Co., has been president of the Texas Cowboy Reunion since it was started.

Some \$7,000 worth of improvements have gone into the reunion grounds during the past few months including the purchase of 10 additional acres of grounds.

The barns for the quarter horse show were moved to the new area, so as better to be able to take care of the official show of the American Quarter Horse Association which has been held at the reunion every year since 1940.

Conner Makes Statement To County Voters

Earl Conner, Jr., who is a candidate for Judge of the 91st Judicial District of Texas, has issued the following statement to the voters:

In the interest of my candidacy for District Judge of the 91st Judicial District of Texas, I wish to acquaint the voters of Eastland County with my qualifications and record as a public official. I am 47 years of age and was born and reared in Eastland. I have a wife and two children. I am a member of the First Methodist Church of Eastland. I am a member of the State Bar and the American Bar Association.

I received my legal education at the University of Texas and the University of Wisconsin. I have been in the actual practice of law for twenty years, first in the firm of Conner and McRae, and later in the firm of Conner and Conner in partnership with my father, Earl Conner, Sr., who has been active in practice in this County for fifty years.

I served this county for five consecutive terms as your County and District Attorney in two courts—the 88th District Court, presided over by the Honorable B. W. Patterson, and the 91st District Court presided over by the Honorable George L. Davenport, both fine examples and mentors of judicial integrity and legal learning. My record in this capacity is one of which I am justly proud—a record of 90 per cent convictions, which included almost every type of violation in the statute books. In no instance did I waste the county's money on cases in which there was no cause for action, nor evidence for conviction.

Since I started in the legal profession, my ambition has been to serve as your District Judge, and I have directed my efforts to qualify myself for this office. My aspiration is not an unpremeditated whim, but a long desired honor. I now believe I am fully qualified to discharge the duties of this office in a fair, impartial, christianlike manner in accordance with the laws of the State.

In the election for the office of District Judge for the 91st Judicial District four years ago, I needed but 50 votes to win the election. If it be my privilege to serve you as your District Judge for the coming term, it will be my purpose to dispose of litigation promptly and fairly, and keep the court docket up-to-date for the citizens of this county, and I will be true to my trust and obligation to you.

Meeting Non-Political, But First Arrival Breaks Rules

HOUSTON, June 28 (UP)—Gov. Dan Thornton of Colorado, first out-of-state chief executive to arrive at Houston for the 44th annual National Governors' conference, judged immediately into political talk and probably set the tenor of an ostensibly non-political gathering.

Thornton flew in Friday and predicted before he got away from the airport that delegates would "stampede" to Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower on the third ballot at next week's GOP convention at Chicago.

"Anyone would be foolish to think that Sen. Robert A. Taft would get the nomination on the first ballot," Thornton said. "Staweede On Third Vote"

"Sen. Taft should maintain that present delegate strength on the first ballot, but there'll be a tremendous shift on the second ballot. On the third ballot," the Colorado governor said, "there'll be a stampede for Gen. Eisenhower."

Thornton was followed into Houston by Gov. C. Norman Brundage of North Dakota and Gov. Paul A. Dever of Massachusetts. Gov. Len B. Jordan of Idaho flew in with Thornton, but left for San Antonio, where he will visit with relatives until Sunday.

Nearly all the other state chief executives were due to arrive Saturday or early Sunday for what was expected to be the most important set of pre-national convention meetings and conferences of the year.

The actual governors' conference program, however, makes no mention of politics.

All Governors May Attend

Forty-seven of the nation's 48 governors and those of three territories were expected. Gov. John S. Fine of Pennsylvania notified the arrangements committee that last-minute obligations may prevent his attending more than one day of the conference.

If Fine does get to Houston, it will be the first time in history all 48 governors have attended.

Formal conference meetings begin Monday after receptions for the governors and their parties Sunday. The conference ends next Wednesday.

Gov. Thornton was met at the Houston airport by host Gov. Allan Shivers. Shivers wore one of the broad-brimmed straw hats each of the governors will receive on arrival, along with a new automobile with name-plate attached and chauffeured by a Texas highway patrolman for the length of the conference.

Texas Teachers Are Improving; Get Higher Rank

Austin, Texas, June 25, 1952—Despite the fact that Texas teachers have not had an increase in their base salaries since 1949, they have continued to improve their professional training. They now rank among the five top states in the nation in teacher preparation according to Charles H. Tenneyson, executive secretary of the Texas State Teachers Association.

Tenneyson said that figures available from the Texas Education Agency show that more than 95 per cent of the state's 58,513 public school teachers now hold degrees from accredited institutions of higher learning.

During the school term just closed, only 2,295 or 4.5 per cent of the Negro teachers in Texas do not have degrees.

The school year 1951-52 also marked progress in another direction, Tenneyson added. It was the first year in the history of the state that the school did not have some people teaching who had less than a high school education. The previous year 34 such people were employed as teachers.

Ranger Colonel Sent To Turkey

Et. Col. William R. Cole, widely known in the Peninsula area as one of the best local golfers, will leave his Fort Monroe assignment with the Army Field Forces shortly (July 15th) for duty in Turkey. His new job will be with the Joint Military Mission for Aid to Turkey.

For the past three years Colonel "Ray" Cole has participated in the Peninsula Amateur Golf Tournament. Although he has always been a leading contender for the military division championship, Ray was never quite able to capture the top spot. In 1950 and 51 he was runner-up while this year he took the third spot. However, in this year's Pan-Am he carded the low net score.

A native in Texas, Colonel Cole was assigned to the Office, Chief of Army Field Forces in August 1949. He has been working in the Infantry Branch of the G-3 (training) Section. While at OCAFFE Ray has consistently played a program of physical fitness for our troops. Also an advocate of better marksmanship in the Army, he has been one of the staunchest supporters of rifle and pistol tournaments in the Army. Last March he was the Army's representative designated to present the U. S. Army Pistol Team with Certificates of Achievement for their outstanding work in capturing the 1951 National 22 and 28 caliber championships.

In 1940 Colonel Cole was graduated from the University of Arkansas. While a student there he played varsity football and golf. During the 1939 season he captained the football team. Prior to entering the Army on active duty as a second lieutenant in 1941 he played professional football with the Milwaukee Chiefs. He received his commission after graduating from the Reserve Officer Training Corps at the University of Arkansas.

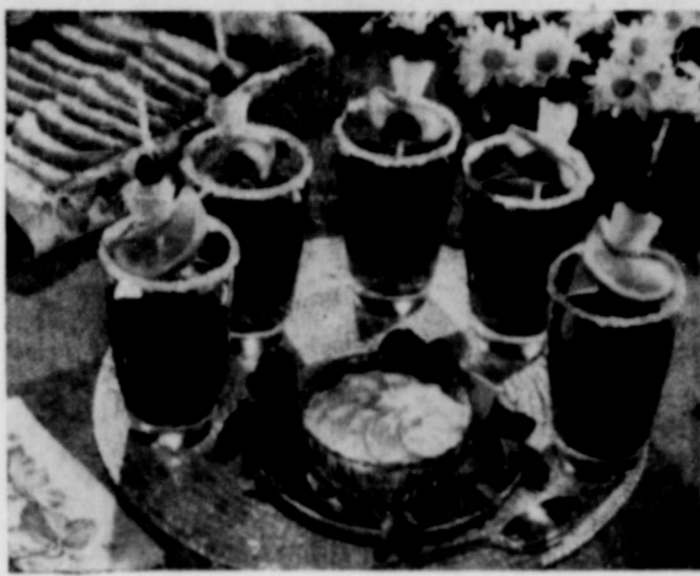

Summer Coolers for 5 or 25

Are you a one-woman "refreshment committee" who likes to bring out a big pitcher of something cool when family or friends are gathered? Or, are you a member of a bigger refreshment committee for your club or church group, or possibly having a wedding reception for 25 or more, when a refreshing drink with a distinctive flair seems to be called for? In either case, you'll welcome these ideas...

Spiced Tea-Cooler for 5 with "Lemonated" Sugar

Pour 5 cups boiling water over 7 teaspoons black tea and 5 whole cloves. Cover and steep 5 minutes only. Strain tea into pitcher filled with ice cubes and chill. When ready to use, stir in chilled orange juice. Serve in 5 tall, chilled, sugar-rimmed glasses—so easily done by dipping glasses into shallow saucer of water, then into C and H granulated sugar. Garnish glass with straw sipper, strung with whole maraschino cherries, chunks of pineapple, thin slices of orange, with more cherries on top to hold all in place. Pass "lemonated" sugar and mint sprigs for each to sweeten and garnish his own drink.

Lemonated Sugar

Simply mix 1 cup C and H granulated sugar and the grated rind of 1 or 2 lemons according to your own taste, just before using for the most tantalizing fragrance and full flavor. Garnish serving bowl with thin curls of lemon peel and surround base with fresh sprigs of mint.

Mock Pink Champagne for 25

2 cups C and H granulated sugar
2 cups hot water
2 cups grapefruit juice
1 cup orange juice
1 quart ginger ale
3/4 cup grenadine syrup

Boil sugar and water together in uncovered pan for 5 minutes. Cool. In large bowl, place chilled, strained fruit juices. Add cooled sugar water

and grenadine syrup. Chill thoroughly. When ready to serve, add chilled ginger ale. Pour in large punch bowl over block of ice and serve immediately in champagne flutes or punch cups. Makes about 25 servings. Note: The secret is not to add ginger ale until serving, so the sparkle remains, and the block of ice chills, but does not dilute the punch.

What to serve with cold drinks is sometimes a problem for the hostess. For the Tea-Cooler, nothing could be better than this buttered slice of Fruited Brown Sugar Nut Loaf.

Fruited Brown Sugar Nut Loaf

3/4 cup C and H brown sugar
2 tablespoons soft shortening
2 mashed ripe bananas
3 cups sifted all-purpose flour
3 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
1 slightly beaten egg
1 1/2 cups milk
3/4 cup chopped nut meats

Cream together the sugar and shortening until light. Measure and sift flour, measure and sift again with baking powder and salt. Alternately add sifted flour with egg mixed with milk. Stir in bananas and nuts and mix well. Pour in 9x5x3 loaf pan. Fill only 3/4 full. Bake in moderate oven 350° about 1 hour, or until done when tested with long broom straw. Or, if you prefer, you can bake in three No. 2 cans that have been lined with heavily greased wax paper extending one inch above can for about 45 minutes, or until done when tested. Note: For best flavor and easy cutting, we bread day after baking.

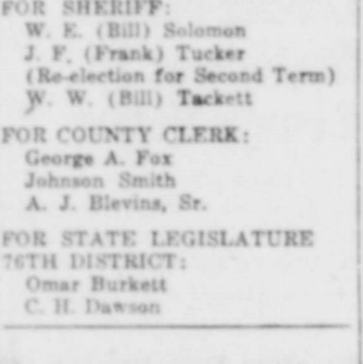

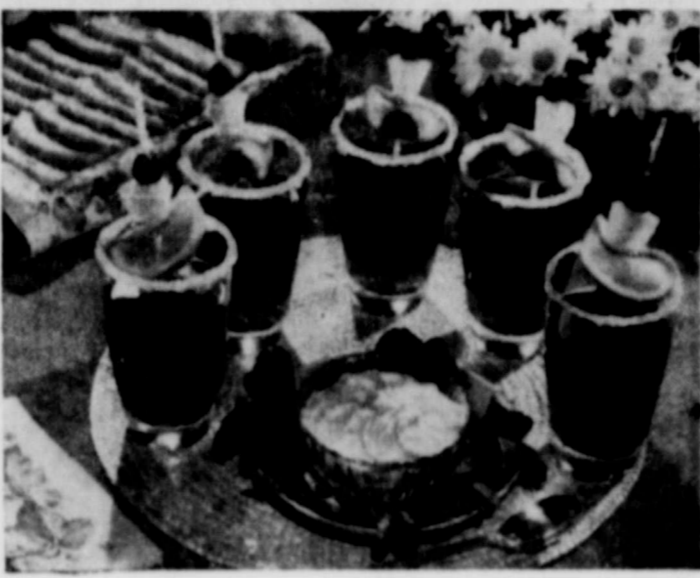

Summer Coolers for 5 or 25

Are you a one-woman "refreshment committee" who likes to bring out a big pitcher of something cool when family or friends are gathered? Or, are you a member of a bigger refreshment committee for your club or church group, or possibly having a wedding reception for 25 or more, when a refreshing drink with a distinctive flair seems to be called for? In either case, you'll welcome these ideas...

Spiced Tea-Cooler for 5 with "Lemon-ated" Sugar
Pour 5 cups boiling water over 2 teaspoons black tea and 5 whole cloves. Cover and steep 5 minutes only. Strain tea into pitcher filled with ice cubes and chill. When ready to use, stir in chilled orange juice. Serve in 5 tall, chilled, sugar-rimmed glasses—so easily done by dipping glasses into shallow saucer of water, then into C and H granulated sugar. Garnish glass with straw sippers strung with whole maraschino cherries, chunks of pineapple, thin slices of orange, with more cherries on top to hold all in place. Pass "lemon-ated" sugar and mint sprigs for each to sweeten and garnish his own drink.

Lemon-ated Sugar
Simply mix 1 cup C and H granulated sugar and the grated rind of 1 or 2 lemons (according to your own taste), just before using for the most tantalizing fragrance and full flavor. Garnish serving bowl with thin curls of lemon peel and surround base with fresh sprigs of mint.

Mock Pink Champagne for 25
2 cups C and H granulated sugar
2 cups hot water
2 cups grapefruit juice
1 cup orange juice
1 quart ginger ale
1/2 cup grenadine syrup
Boil sugar and water together in uncovered pan for 5 minutes. Cool. In large bowl, place chilled, strained fruit juices. Add cooled sugar water

and grenadine syrup. Chill thoroughly. When ready to serve, add chilled ginger ale. Pour in large punch bowl over block of ice and serve immediately in champagne glasses or punch cups. Makes about 25 servings. Note: The secret is not to add ginger ale until serving, so the sparkle remains, and the block of ice chills, but does not dilute the punch.
What to serve with cold drinks is sometimes a problem for the hostess. For the Tea-Cooler, nothing could be better than thin buttered slices of Fruited Brown Sugar Nut Loaf.
Fruited Brown Sugar Nut Loaf
1/2 cup C and H brown sugar
2 tablespoons soft shortening
2 mashed ripe bananas
3 cups sifted all-purpose flour
3 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
1 slightly beaten egg
1 1/2 cups milk
1/2 cup chopped nut meats
Cream together the sugar and shortening until light. Measure and sift flour, measure and sift again with baking powder and salt. Alternately add sifted flour with egg mixed with milk. Stir in bananas and nuts and mix well. Pour in 9x13 loaf pan. Fill only 3/4 full. Bake in moderate oven 350° about 1 hour, or until done when tested with long broom straw. Or, if you prefer, you can bake in three No. 2 cans that have been lined with heavily greased wax paper extending one inch above can for about 45 minutes, or until done when tested. Note: For best flavor and easy cutting, use bread day after baking.

In a prepared text of his address, Dies, who headed the American Activities Committee from 1935 to 1943, says that it is a historic fact that "75 per cent of our warnings have come true and that our findings have been substantiated by the events and disclosures of the past five years." Dies said that Communism remains our major problem at home and abroad. The Congressman-At-Large candidate further said that he was not an isolationist, but felt that "we must do our part in the family of free nations. This does not mean that we should become an international feeder and busy body, nor that we should bankrupt our country."

On domestic problems, Martin Dies stated that "our basic problems are inflation and taxation." Dies favors immediate return of the Tidelands. He declares that "a just and fair formula must be found under which labor, capital and government can work in harmony."

In his address, Dies predicts that the new office of Congressman-At-Large will likely not last longer than two years. Therefore, he believes an experienced and seasoned legislator who served in congress for 14 years can get in the harness at once and work in the citizen's behalf.

Dies talk is scheduled to originate from his hometown of Lufkin, Texas.

Marketing Of Livestock To Be Simplified

Building a marketing service to meet the needs of livestock producers in the range country, the Texas Livestock Marketing Association, with offices at Fort Worth and San Antonio, handled 433,249 head of livestock, valued at \$46,762,476.61 in 1951, according to Jim W. Mitchell, who is Executive Vice-President of the Association. Of this volume, there were 272,072 cattle and calves, 152,712 sheep, and 8,455 hogs.

Serving thousands of customers located principally in Texas and New Mexico, says Mitchell, with a few in Oklahoma, Arkansas, and Louisiana, the trade territory served by the Association is equivalent to the combined area of the six major Corn Belt states, and the many varied problems confronting livestock producers in an area this size offer a real challenge.

As the major feed crop produced in the Southwest is grass, and as a large percentage of the cattle and sheep grown in this area are in stocker and feeder flesh when sold, one of the most important functions of the Texas Livestock Marketing Association is to be able to serve both ranch-

ers and feeder-buyers—providing outlets throughout the nation for ranchers and assuring feeder-buyers of a reliable source of feeder cattle and sheep.

From its small beginning as a livestock cooperative marketing agency, it has steadily progressed until today it has a membership of nearly 6,000 livestock raisers in addition to many customers who are not members. Those members, at the annual meeting each year, vote on new directors and other business matters of the Association. Each member has one vote, whether the Association handles one or a thousand head of livestock for him.
