

Progress Marks 7 Years Jaycee Existence

Principal Aim Is Promotion Of Agriculture And Stock Raising

"Bigger and better each year" seems to be the objective of the Ranger Junior Chamber of Commerce in their annual undertakings. This year is the seventh since the founding of the non-political non-profit service club in 1946.

The Jaycees were organized to promote and encourage better agriculture and stock raising in this area. With their main effort being the Future Farmers and 4-H Clubs in this objective.

The Club Extension Committee of the Abilene Junior Chamber of Commerce "mothered" the Ranger club. Ranger was among a number of clubs they assisted in getting organized that year, an undertaking for which they received national recognition from the U. S. Junior Chamber.

The organizational meeting for this Jaycee organization was held in the Gholson Hotel in the spring of 1946. The original club had about twenty charter members. Price Crawley was the first president.

The first World's Championship Rodeo was held that year. With the rodeo arena and facilities being constructed from the time they were chartered until the opening day of the Rodeo. The final bit of welding was done on the arena a few minutes prior to the first performance.

The land and facilities was built through issuance of \$12,000 in stock to local merchants and supporters of the Jaycee program. The grounds and equipment are worth much more than that, due to a large part of the work being done free and materials furnished at no cost.

In the past six performances only one of them has failed to make money for support of the Jaycee program. That was due to rain on the final night of the rodeo. The loss was not great and the Jaycees were able to survive this blow and continue their work. Abilene Jaycees who had helped in the organization of the

club here are Dave Adams, Oliver Howard, Jimmy Partin, Gene Brndshaw, and Alec Bickley, and others.

Price Crawley was succeeded as president by the late J. P. Morris in 1947; Perry Horton followed Morris, but moved during the term and Morris Newham took over the reins of the club and directed its operation; in 1949 Wilson Guest was elected president to succeed Newham; C. E. May succeeded him and Allen Foll was May's successor; Charles Milliken is the present president.

The Tri-County Livestock Show barn is a profit of the Jaycee Rodeo operations in past years. The Jaycees hold this show annually unassisted in the hope that it will further their aims in improving agriculture and stock raising in this area.

The original west Texas Calf Scramble is a major factor in aiding the FFA and 4-H Club boys in raising better livestock. The original scramble was for stocker cattle, this was later changed, and the Jaycees, with the help of merchants and surrounding banks, give away each year registered Jersey Heifers. The chosen club boys scramble for numbered pigs at a performance of the rodeo that correspond with heifers they will receive for catching the pigs.

Some of the activities of which the Jaycees have supported in past years are a meeting here of the West Cross Timbers Sheep and Goat Raisers Association in 1949; had Murray Cox here twice to promote and advertise their livestock program at the stock show; conducted "Pay Your Poll Tax" campaigning; and sponsored a Christmas program that provided 1000 toys for underprivileged children.

The Jaycees in the past six years have become a needed part of Ranger and a boost to agriculture and stock raisers in this area. The members give their time

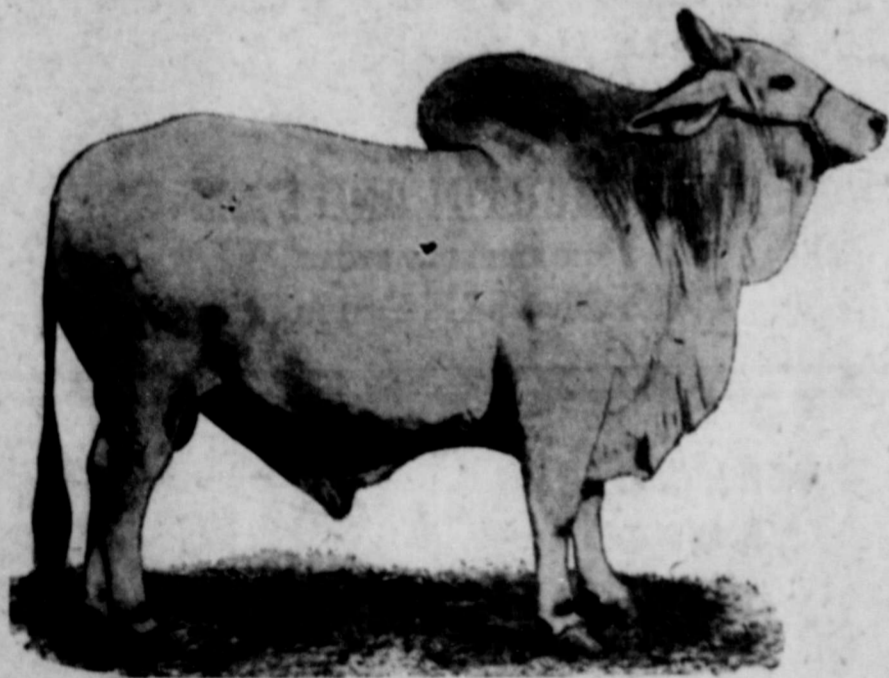

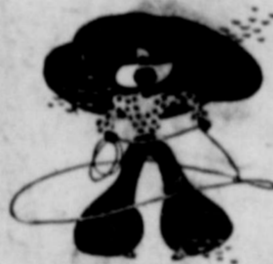

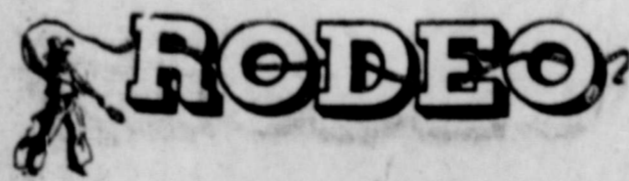

**Spur Scientist Named Tops
Among Agricultural Leaders**

RENNER, Texas, May — The tough and aggressive mesquite infests more than 55 million acres of land in Texas, according to a report issued last week by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. The report, prepared by Charles E. Fisher, 41, Superintendent of Texas Agricultural Experiment Station Substation No. 7 at Spur, was named winner of the Hoblitzelle award recognizing him as the "Texas agricultural scientist who in the past three years has made the greatest contribution to agriculture in the State."

Consisting of \$5,000.00 in cash and a gold medal, the award was presented at the annual open house of Texas Research Foundation here.

Fisher's research resulted last year in the control of mesquite on more than 400 thousand acres of Texas pasture. The control method is simple: A low flying airplane "bombs" the mesquite trees with coarse droplets of an oil-water emulsion loaded with a new chemical herbicide. Flying just above the tree tops, the pilot sprays a wide swath of mesquite as he goes. One pound of the hormone-type chemical, 2,4,5-T, is recommended per acre. Cost of treating: About \$360 per acre.

The panel of judges in selecting the work on mesquite control over that of thirty other Texas agricultural scientists whose research had been entered, pointed out: "No absolute method for the final eradication of mesquite has been perfected, but the research of C. E. Fisher provides new hope to the farmer and rancher of Texas and the Southwest through the provision of an economic effective means of controlling the brush. His research has immediate and significant widespread application."

Fisher's control method not only kills about 98 per cent of the mesquite to ground level, but invades its bud zone area below ground and prevents a high percentage of the plants from sprouting again.

The chemical "bombing" of the brush not only knocks out the mesquite, but many other range pests such as the cocklebur and sunflowers. The treatment can be administered while cattle and other livestock are grazing the land. The chemical has no effect on either the cattle or the native grasses upon which they graze. Care must be exercised in the application of the chemical, however, for even in trace amounts it will damage highly susceptible crops such as cotton, alfalfa, clover, grapes, tomatoes and many others.

Fisher, with the assistance of his staff conducted hundreds and hundreds of experiments in his long fight against mesquite brush before the method of airplane control with 2,4,5-T was perfected.

Three fold benefits result from the solution to this problem peculiar to the ranges of Texas:

1. It is much easier to handle and care for livestock in cleared areas.
2. Improved growth of native grasses helps to rebuild the soil and aids in conservation.
3. Cleared areas afford better grazing. During the past three years in experiments conducted at Spur, steers gained 28 per cent more weight on cleared pastures than in brush pastures.

The section of the Hoblitzelle award winner was made by a committee from outstanding Texas educators and agriculturists. The Committee was composed of Lewis P. Merrill, Regional Conservator, Soil Conservation Service, Ft. Worth, Texas; Dr. R. J. Williams, Professor of Chemistry, University of Texas, Austin, Texas; Dr. R. D. Lewis, Director, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Texas; and Dr. D. M. Wiggins, President, Texas Technological College, Lubbock, Texas.

**Duck Prospects
Reported Good**

AUSTIN, July—Reports of favorable waterfowl nesting conditions were brought back to Austin from a Central Flyway Council meeting at Bismarck, N. D.

The Assistant Executive Secretary of the Texas Game & Fish Commission (W. J. Cutbirth, Jr.) who attended the conference, said preliminary information presages a good hatch both in the northern states and in the Canadian provinces.

The conference named the Executive Secretary of the Game & Fish Commission (Howard D. Dodgen) as one of two representatives of the Central Council to attend the National Waterfowl Council in Washington D. C., early in August.

That meeting will be attended by both private and governmental authorities on ducks and geese. The conclusions are expected to help shape the 1952 shooting regulations.

**Japanese Opinion Poll
Backs Recent U. S. Pact**

TOKYO UP—Seventy per cent of Tokyoites were satisfied with the Japanese peace treaty signed in San Francisco last September according to an official public opinion survey here.

The results indicated that some 70 per cent considered the peace treaty satisfactory for a defeated nation. Twelve per cent found it unsatisfactory even for a defeated nation and the remainder not-satisfactory but acceptable.



Rodeo Fans May See Jaycees Ride L. R. Pearson's Buffalo

An animal that at one time covered the entire west, but has since become nearly extinct will be a featured attraction at the Seventh Annual Ranger Jaycees Rodeo, July 14-19. Representative L. R. Pearson of Ranger has given the Ranger Jaycees permission to use his herd of buffalo in their rodeo.

The only catch to the deal was that the Jaycees pen them on his ranch about eight miles west of Ranger. Judge Pearson said he would furnish transportation to and from the rodeo, the animals, only if the Jaycees would undertake to pen the untamed beasts.

That doesn't sound like to big a job. But a chat with Pearson will enlighten you about buffalo. They must be penned on foot with extreme caution. Any sudden movement or action will send the herd of ten scattering in every direction. And on a section of land that will be no small undertaking for the city boys.

Pearson, who is a lawyer, rancher, oilman and state representative, explains that buffalo are highly allergic to horses, with or without riders. "A hundred cowboys on horseback couldn't pen these ten buffalo on that little section of land," Pearson said. A buffalo will not turn and run from a horse. They will turn to face the animal and either charge it with murderous intent or the entire herd will scatter to the four winds when approached by a man on horseback.

This rare collection of these animals started a number of years ago when Pearson was given a pair of the animals from the Goodfellow Ranch. Since the heifers do not calve until four years, the herd numbers only ten in the many years they have been on the Pearson Ranch.

As Pearson said, "the buffalo will be available if the Jaycees pen them", and if they are able to corral the herd the rodeo goers will get to watch a rare feature when the Jaycees come out of the chutes at the arena on these descendants of the old west.

Well folks—here it is. Another year has rolled around that brings us another Jaycee Rodeo. Tops in thrills, spills and western showmanship in RCA approved rodeos. The Jaycees have left nothing undone in their efforts to make this seventh rodeo which they have sponsored an entertainment you'll never forget as long as you see rodeos.

We would like to congratulate them on the fine spirit of cooperation that they display each year in making this high spot of entertainment in this area possible.

It's all for you. Ever moment spent by the Jaycees away from their homes in contributing their time and energy has been done for your benefit. When the time for the actual performance rolls around they look to you for approval. The question utmost in their minds is whether their efforts will be appreciated by the fans for whom this show is annually produced.

They've done everything they know how, with assistance that was deeply appreciated, from many of you not members of their organization. For months now they have thought, talked, and worked for the rodeo.

The Jaycees, in their own way, will give thanks to each of you supporting them in their project. Without help and cooperation from everyone the rodeo would be only a thought. People have gotten to where they look forward to the rodeo. It is becoming a part of the yearly life of the people of this area. And the more the show is appreciated the harder the Jaycees work to make it more successful each year.

Wednesday night, July 16, they turn their months of planning and hard work over to the producers, cowboys, and most important of all—the fans. From then on it is out of their hands.

The producers bring the best in stock and years of "know-how" to see that the show goes off; the cowboys bring their skills and take the risks without thought of personal injury; and you—the fans—bring yourselves and families to enjoy the performances.

Some of you might think that all needed to be done is to hire the stock, announce the date, and then set back and wait—you're wrong.

WHO do you think keeps the arena in condition? The Jaycees do. After their regular jobs they give their free time willingly and without obligation to repair, repaint, decorate, and in many ways get the stands, pens, arena, parking area, ticket booths, and many other things that go to make up a rodeo in readiness.

Prior to rodeo time they prepare the program. They sell ads to finance the printing. Make the program up as it is to appear in the printed form before sending it to the printers for final publication. That sounds easy—prepare the program and put it in final form—well it certainly isn't. If you are still an unbeliever, become a Jaycee and get on the program committee some year.

Don't forget the parade and getting riding clubs and sheriff posse to ride in the parade to make it a success. The journey down the main drag has to be planned, started and ended. Someone has to do that. A committee plans that. But they don't do it overnight. They work brother, they work. Especially on the day of the parade.

You have to let people know about anything you want them to see. That comes under the head of the publicity chairman and his committee. And working under limited funds doesn't make his job easier. Sometimes it can be hard for them to understand why all this is necessary, but once they see the stands full and the stock going full blast, losing some hapless cowboy, then they know.

Having the stands full to enjoy the rodeo every night is the Jaycee's dream, their desire, and the biggest ambition they have. If they can see that then for another year they will be content.

Old man weather can knock their plans for a loop. But if he, and the fans, through the grace of God, see fit the show will be a success.

Eisenhower Wins GOP Nomination On First Ballot

CONVENTION HALL, Chicago, July 11 (UP)—Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower captured the Republican presidential nomination Friday with a first-ballot victory over Sen. Robert A. Taft.

The 61-year-old general, who started his campaign late and lagged behind the senator in all pre-convention delegate counts, rode to triumph on a bandwagon that really got rolling only a few days ago.

The 62-year-old Taft went down to defeat despite desperate stop-like efforts in which his camp tried at the 11th-hour to turn the Eisenhower bandwagon into a horse.

It was Taft's third-and, he has said, his last—unsuccessful try for the nomination. He lost in 1940 to the late Wendell L. Wilkie and four years ago to Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York.

Was Bitter Fight

Ike's victory climaxed the Republicans' 25th and bitterest national convention, leaving the weary and wound-licking delegates only the anti-climactic task of picking a vice presidential nominee.

This convention's angry Taft-Ike struggle, climaxed by Eisenhower's victory on Wednesday in the battle for "stolen" southern delegates, left deep scars which the party must try to heal if it hopes to win their campaign to unseat the Democrats in November.

Ike's victory was foreshadowed days before the balloting started.

Wyoming Day Change

A tip-off that everyone was itching to get aboard the right bandwagon at the right time came from the Wyoming delegation. Its chairman, Marvin Bishop, said his state's 12 delegates would vote for Eisenhower on the first ballot if he appeared to be getting "close" to a majority. Wyoming is last on the list of states, and a majority of its delegates favored Taft before the roll call.

Sen. Robert A. Taft was maneuvered into the role of challenger, and his managers were dickered with Gov. Earl Warren of California, and Gen. Douglas MacArthur on stop-like strategy. Taft's second choice could be either of those men, or almost anyone but Eisenhower.

Standing of the candidates Friday before the first ballot: Eisenhower 572, Taft 500. Necessary to nominate 604.

Bond Brokers Take Option To Sell Dist. Bonds

The Underwood Company of Dallas, who are the bond brokers for the Eastland County Water Supply District, met with the directors of the district in Eastland yesterday and exercised their option to take the district bonds. A certified check for \$30,000 was deposited with the water district as a guarantee of their good faith.

The option calls for the bonds to be sold within the next sixty days or the \$30,000 dollars to be forfeited to the district.

This does not constitute an actual sale but is indication that the bond brokers have reason to believe that the bonds are saleable.

Frank Mariam, of Ranger, General Manager of the Triangle Bell Rodeo Ranch of Belton, with his partner and former sole owner of the Triangle Bell, Duke Gibbs will produce and direct their year's rodeo.

Frank will personally act as arena director in production of the show this year at Ranger. A capacity that he has filled at all but one of the Jaycee sponsored rodeos. 1951 was the only year that Mariam did not direct the Jaycee show.

Due to expansion of the rodeo ranch's facilities, including new bucking horses and brabams, the show this year will be a much better show than in 1951.

Mariam will be under the "eyes of the homefolks here at Ranger", a situation which has led him to say he will put his utmost into making this best and biggest rodeo he has ever produced.

Russell Plans Active Battle For Nomination

WASHINGTON, July 11 (UP)—Sen. Richard B. Russell served notice Friday he doesn't intend to be overshadowed in the race for the Democratic presidential nomination by Sen. Estes Kefauver's reputation as an anti-crime crusader.

The Georgian sprinkled a bit of cold water on the nation-wide acclaim given the lanky Tennessean who directed the Senate Crime committee's televised crime hearings.

Appearing on the Columbia Broadcasting System's televised "Mark Evans show" Thursday night, Russell noted that he had presided over the Senate hearings on President Truman's dismissal of Gen. Douglas MacArthur.

Recalling that the MacArthur inquiry was held in perhaps "the most uncharged atmosphere of our times," Russell said: "If I could have put my show on the road, it would have far exceeded any other investigation."

Russell said he had to fight against telecasting the MacArthur inquiry because a third of the data revealed during the closed-door hearings involved American military plans.

Russell said he hoped to get the 616 votes required for nomination "somewhere between the fifth and eighth ballots."

Kefauver took another crack at the Republicans when he told Massachusetts Democrats at a gathering in Boston that the current convention shows the GOP is "so hopelessly divided it cannot be entrusted with handling the nation's affairs."

Meantime, a source close to the party's liberal wing said he "knows" Mr. Truman has cooled toward Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson of Illinois and is now supporting Mutual Security Director Averell Harriman for the presidential nomination.

Elliott Roosevelt, son of the late president, said during a vacation at Meeker, Colo., that he is "one of many registered Democrats" who would cast party lines to vote for Dwight D. Eisenhower.

Supporters of Representative Omar Burleson of the 17th Congressional District are staging a county-wide welcome for him and his wife in Anson tonight. A free watermelon feed has also been arranged for in connection with the celebration.

High school bands, watermelon cutting, and speechmaking will highlight the event. Invitations have gone out to every town in the district to attend and bring everyone in the district with them to Anson tonight.

A truckload of watermelons has been ordered placed on cold storage by Burleson supporters and someone is promised their fill. Afterward speeches by Burleson and his wife, Ruth, will be heard by the crowd.

Tornado Breaks Weather Calm In Southwest

An unusual summer tornado, almost a phenomenon this time of year, broke the monotony of Southwest weather, but failed to leave a trace of damage Friday. The anemic twister tumbled half-heartedly from a heavy cumulus cloud southwest of Beaumont, Tex., about 1:04 p.m. yesterday. It was sighted by U. S. weather bureau observers at Houston and Beaumont, but it lifted after 15 minutes and disappeared into the clouds without touching the ground.

The whirling formation was unusual in timing and movement. It disappeared in a southwesterly direction. Apparently into the Gulf of Mexico, although nearby all tornadoes move from the southwest toward the northeast.

Other wise throughout the Southwest, partly cloudy skies held temperatures below the 100-degree mark except in Kansas and there were continued widely scattered thundershowers throughout the area.

State high temperatures Thursday included 100 degrees at Hill City, Kan.; 94 at Joplin, Mo.; 96 at Cato, Okla.; 97 at Leadville, Colo.; 83 at Douglas Wyo., and 98 at Del Rio and Laredo, Tex. A 53-degree reading at Goodland, Kans. was the area's low temperature.

State Politics Take Background To GOP Meetings

Texas office seekers—crowded off front pages and the air by the flood of news of the national Republican convention—hoped Friday to take over the limelight next week with the state's first primary only two weeks away, July 26.

However, the Democrats will convene at Chicago on Monday, July 21, and the battle of space and listener appeal will be on again in earnest.

Candidates for Congress, state and county offices are on the road in most instances with their loud-speaker sound trucks and some of them, especially U. S. Rep. Lindsey Beckworth, Gladewater, U. S. senatorial candidate, are making as many as 10 and 20 speeches a day.

Attorney General Price Daniel, one of the leading senatorial candidates, announced a speech for Saturday afternoon from the courthouse steps in Stephenville.

Daniel expects heavy backing Thursday that he would carry the Panhandle and South Plains region "By better than a four-to-one majority."

Gubernatorial candidate Ralph Yarborough made 12 talks Thursday and had a similar schedule planned Friday. Gov. Allan Shivers is not making as many appearances but is busy campaigning. He was to visit Borger, Pampa, Midland and Odessa Saturday.

Rayburn, Brown Vie
Speaker Sam Rayburn of Bonham is actively in the field in his bid for re-election. One of his principal talks thus far in the campaign was made Thursday at Royse City before an estimated 1,000 persons. His congressional opponent, Reagan Brown, 31, of Terrell, spoke at the same gathering.

Brown spoke first and criticized the "waste and graft, the 5 percenters, the mink coats and all that other mess" in Washington.

Rayburn said he was running on his record. "It's not how long you've served, but how well," he said. He promised "to try to serve you first and my country and humanity second."

Rayburn represents the fourth Texas congressional district.

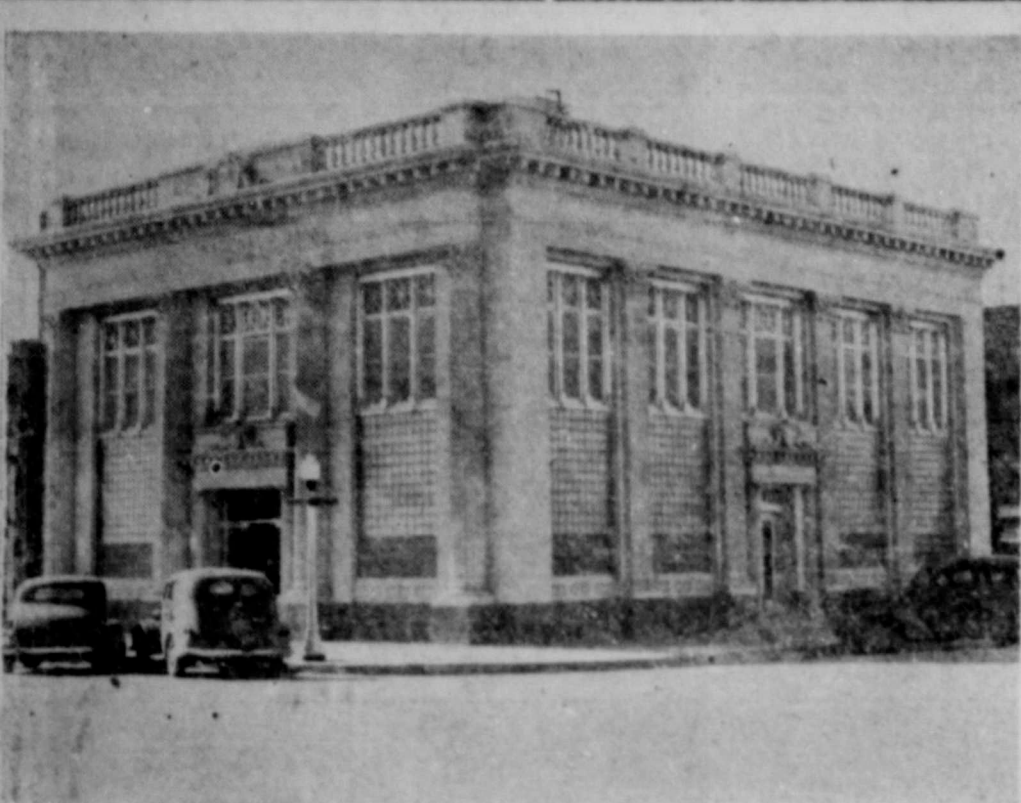

Girls Require Food Doctor Contents

SYDNEY, Australia UP—Almost every second girl who contracts tuberculosis in this city does so as a result of failing to eat lunch, according to the medical director of the anti-tuberculosis association, Dr. H. Wilson.

"There are an amazing number of pretty girls in sanatoria who are there because they go out too much and do not spend enough time eating properly or getting sufficient sleep," Dr. Wilson said.

Dr. Wilson agrees with the dean of the London School of Hygiene, Dr. Andrew Topping who says that many girls develop tuberculosis because of luxuries.

"Too many parties and dances and too much interest in dresses and such things are sapping the vitality and strength of our young womanhood," Dr. Wilson said.

"Almost half the girls who come to T-B clinics admit they haven't time to eat breakfast, and they tell us they spend their lunch hours shopping or at films."

"They then rush home and get ready to go out again, and often do not even bother to have a decent evening meal."

"This senseless and unhealthy existence deprives them of their powers of resistance to disease and they finish up with tuberculosis."

Carp Control Success Cited

Austin, July 11—The Assistant Chief Aquatic Biologist of the Game & Fish Commission said success of rough fish control work this year gives promise of expanded future operations.

He said chemicals have been profitably utilized to knock out concentrations of carp and buffalo in several areas, including Lake Austin.

He added that studies have shown that rough fish eradication is indispensable to modern fish management since more restocking is not sufficient to maintain adequate fishing resources.

The principal damage from rough fish is that they not only crowd out the game fish but they also utilize some foods that ordinarily would be available to the young game species.

Big Three Makes German Treaty Offer To Kremlin

WASHINGTON, July 11 (UP)—The United States, Britain and France Friday confronted the Kremlin with a direct offer to start working toward a German peace treaty without any Red veto.

The offer of four-power talks on appointment of an impartial, vote-free commission to study the possibility of holding all-German elections was the key point in the latest Big Three notes to Moscow on the crucial German issue.

In identical notes, the three western powers Thursday night charged the Russians with tightening the Iron Curtain and splitting Eastern and Western Germany while paying lip service to expressions of hope for German unity.

These "unjustified measures aggravate the arbitrary division of Germany," the Allies said. This was a barbed reference to recent Communist moves to barricade Eastern Germany by digging trenches, moving houses, posting heavy guards, and attempting to intimidate the West.

The western offer to meet with the Soviets to select an election inquiry group left no room for the Russians to bid for a major conference on Germany at this time.

Truman Signs Money Bill For Department Use

WASHINGTON, July 11 (UP)—President Truman late Thursday signed \$1,015,911,710 appropriations bill to run the State, Justice and Commerce Departments during fiscal 1953.

The amount was 18 per cent less than the President had requested. Congress chopped the most—\$217,701,424 from the \$318,408,010 requested by the State Department. It provided \$87,325,099 of the \$133,272,914 asked for the Voice of American, motion pictures and other overseas educational purposes, and knocked out \$36,727,086 requested for construction of nine new radio projects, including two more high-powered ship-borne relay bases.

The total cut was \$217,701,424.

The Justice Department's request for \$189,907,000 was trimmed to \$184,293,000.

SADDLE BRONC RIDING
In case you don't know, when that saddle bronc comes bursting out of that chute the odds are all in the horse's favor folks. The rules are all made to enable the horse—he can do anything that his emery head, hooves, or legs can dream up. But the rules say that the rider must remember to do this or that.

He has to rake his horse from shoulder to the cantle of the saddle every jump for the five jumps. After that he's supposed to keep spurring until the bell rings.
He can't even ride in his own saddle. And there's no bridle on the horse—just a halter with one rein. And no—the rider can't loop or wrap his fingers to get a better hold.



Calf Roping Contest
Calf roping is an event of skill. Here the trained cow pony plays a major role. Without a thoroughly trained, speedy and intelligent horse, the roper might as well stayed in bed. But a good roper on a well trained horse is a team to watch. The better they work together the more they are to win big purses.

The ropers compete against each other by seeing who can rope and tie a calf the quickest. The rules are made to protect the calf and make the action all the more exciting to the audience.
The roper is allowed to use two loops. And if he missed with both of them he is out of the contest. It is an event that appeals to many, as evidenced by the many roping clubs through this area.



Bareback Bronc Riding
With legs dangling—not even a rein to hold—one hand high in the air—only a surcingle around the bronc's belly to hold onto with the other hand—the bareback bronc rider yell "Turn him out."
Coming out of the chute on a horse with nothing but evil on his mind for the rider makes a cowboy think of two things. The first is to stay on top until the timer signals; the second is to make a safe three-point landing.
Most of your brahama bull riders are also bareback bronc riders, but few saddle bronc riders go much for this part of the rodeo.
Brahma Bull Riding
Headup Here is the real thriller of the rodeo. When you see a rider "screw down" on one of



those Brahma bulls in the chutes—and when you see the flash of feet and swinging of sharp horns you'll be glad that that's not you aboard that one way ticket to retirement.
To make a qualified ride on one of these brutes is only half the battle—the next thing is to get over the fence with out being trampled or gored. They say that there is a man, somewhere, who

can ride any horse. But there are many Brahmas that few men can ride for more than a few seconds under rodeo rules.
The other boys out there in the arena during the Brahma riding events are also "about half wild" as the cowhands say. They are out there to get the attention of the mad Brahmas while the riders beat a hasty retreat for the fence.

Jaycee Calf Scramble History Told

Bulldogging, Product Of Negro Cowboy Unlike Original Stunt

Bulldogging—or steer wrestling, one of the time events at the Ranger rodeo, is not as much an accomplishment of the ranch hands as some of the other events in the rodeo, but it is one of the most spectacular events of the show.
Bulldogging, daring and dangerous, was originated in 1903 on the range by a famous Negro cowboy, Bill Pickett.
The event was first called bulldogging for the method in which Pickett and the pioneers of the sport used in downing the steers. The cowboy would sink his teeth

into the steer's lip in the process of throwing the steer down; this was changed to steer wrestling after the cowboys started using scientific wrestling holds to down the steers.
How bulldogging originated on the range and how it got its name is interesting. It's a far cry from Bill Pickett's stunt as part of his livestock work, to the speedy event as it is staged in the arena today.
Bill Pickett was working on a ranch at Taylor, near Austin. The ranch was covered with blackjack and low brush.

The ranchers had cowdogs to help work the stock out of the thickets. The dogs were sent into the brush to bring out the wild cattle that would take refuge during round-up.
If the cattle would not leave the dogs were trained to attack the cow. The dogs would hold the cow until a cowboy could get a rope on the animal and drag it from the brush.
In the spring of 1903 Pickett was told by the ranch boss to ride into a thicket after a cow that had a calf by her side. Pickett overtook the "brusher" and tried to drive her out on the flats where the cowboys were holding the other cattle. The old cow would not leave the thicket and the brush was so thick that Pickett could not put a loop on her.
The mad critter charged at Pickett's horse and he reached down and caught hold of her horns to keep his horse from being gored. The Negro cowboy gripped the horns so tightly the cow pulled him from the saddle. When he hit the ground he still had the frightened cow in his grasp, his horse had run off.
Seeing nothing else to do, he wrestled the cow to the ground by twisting her head and neck. He was so angry when the cow finally hit the ground that he sank his teeth in the animal's lips as the dogs had done.
When the ranch boss and cowboys had gathered around, the boss said, "Bill you're a regular bulldog."

Qualified Boys Will Compete At Seventh Annual Jaycee Rodeo

For the fifth consecutive year the Ranger Junior Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring the original West Texas Calf Scramble in the interest of promotion of better livestock in this area.
At the 1948 Ranger Jaycee Rodeo the organization sponsored their first scramble, giving away ten pure bred Angus and Hereford calves to ten outstanding FFA and 4-H Club boys of this area. Local and county merchants purchased these calves by contributing to the Jaycee program.
In the scramble at a performance of the rodeo, twenty qualified boys were allowed to compete for these calves. On catching a

calf and taking him across a designated line, each boy catching a calf was awarded that calf to feed and raise as his own, showing him in local livestock shows, under the guidance of his Vocational Agriculture teacher, or County Agent.
In 1949 this Calf Scramble was changed to what probably should be called a greased pig scramble. Local and county merchants went to great expense in securing ten high quality registered Jersey heifers to be awarded to the outstanding FFA and 4-H boys. Instead of scrambling for these Jersey heifers, pigs were used in the scramble in the arena, to avoid possible injury to these valuable

animals. The greased pigs scrambled for correspond to certain heifers.
The boys fortunate enough to catch a greased pig were given a Jersey heifer. In return, each boy getting a heifer was to care for, raise, and breed his heifer, and return his first heifer calf to the Jaycees. This calf would in turn be presented to another boy at the next annual rodeo in another calf scramble.
In 1950 the first heifer was returned to the Jaycees and five additional calves were purchased and given to the boys at the 1950 show.
In 1951 six calves were returned to the program and were given away at the scramble.
This year only one calf will be returned to the Jaycees from the

program, but four others are to be purchased, making a total of five to be given away for the 1952 Rodeo.

BAREBACK BRONC RIDING SAID ORIGINAL SPORT OF OLD WEST

Bareback bronc riding is perhaps the original sport of the west.

Starting back in Indian and frontier days, when saddles were rare and costly and horse yours where you found them—if you could ride them.

The fast and thrilling event is among the major contests scheduled for professional rodeo cowboys at the 7th Annual Jaycee Rodeo, July 16, 17, 18, and 19.

It is one of the more dangerous events of the show, because the rider has no control of the horse and the latter has its head all the time.

The contest is a risky proposition event after the rider completes his ten second ride on the back of the Mustang. The pickup men can only ride herd on the bronc until one of them can lift the cowboy from the back of the buckler. The pickup men must be surehanded so that the rider will not fall between the horses in the way of flying hooves.

Definite rules govern bareback bronc riding. It is a one-handed contest. The rider must keep one hand in the air at all times. The rider must leave the chute spurring the mount, and must continue this all during the ride to urge the horse to its most energetic effort.

Contestants are penalized for failure to spur or "scratch." They are also rated on the violence of the bucking they undergo. If a man draws a mount that does not make at least one jump the judges will permit him to draw another mount.

The bareback bronc riding will be one of the fastest contests of the Ranger rodeo. Horses are released in rapid succession as there are no halters or saddles to adjust before the rider takes his perch on the horse.

There are no cars in the seven-year-old bracket because of the halt in production during World War II.

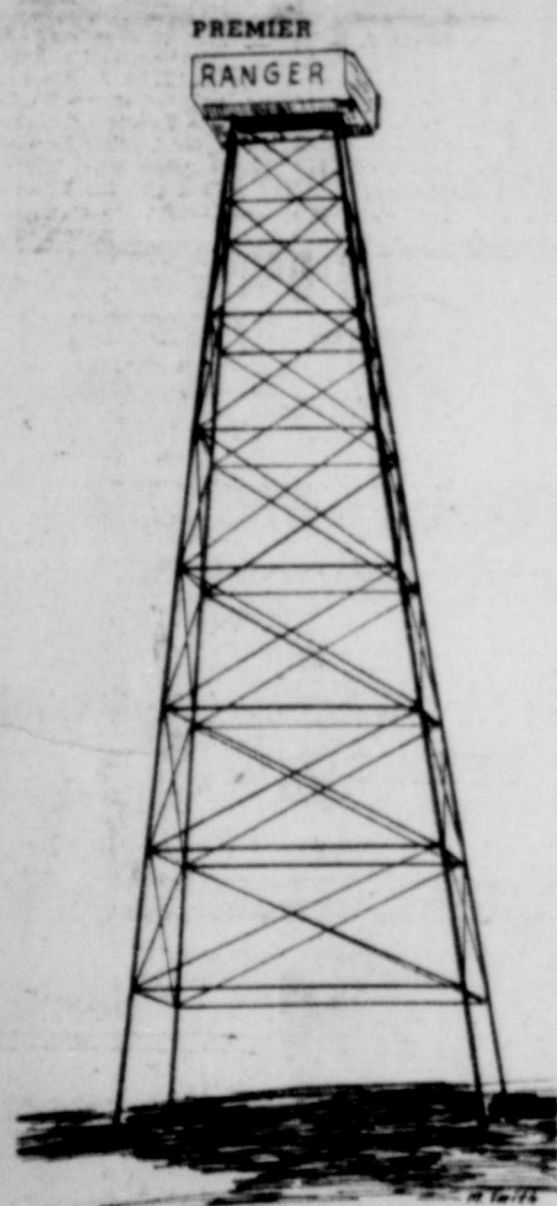

Wage And Price Control Failure

WASHINGTON—The complete debacle that over took the wage-price program in the steel crisis, says the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, shows how ill conceived the program has turned out to be. The program, the Chamber contends, should be brought to an immediate end.

"While the steel dispute," the Chamber explains in its current Labor Relations Letter, "has turned the light on critical economic and political problems, it should not be assumed that the Wage Board's policies will be changed so long as a combination of labor and so-called public members of board are in control."

"The contrary is true. For the same majority that prevailed in the steel controversy has also succeeded in ramming through union shop recommendations in other dispute cases."

"Whether the wage board shall be continued must be answered soon by Congress, since the Defense Production Act expires June 30. The sooner the board no longer exists the better. The controls program has supplied a breeding ground for things abhorrent to American tradition. It has brought a government imposed squeeze on legitimate corporation earnings. It has fostered government decreed union shops. And it has given the country not bargained wage adjustments, but government stimulated wage increases."

It appears, says the Chamber, that the Wage Board is attempting to speed up non-wage decisions before Congress can act to curtail its designs to sweep all of America's industry into compulsory unionism.

When creation of the board was under discussion, the Chamber urged that issues other than wages not be turned over to the Board for settlement. In its Labor Relations Letter, the Chamber cites two current cases in which a majority consisting of a combination of labor and public members have insisted on compulsory unionization. One involves the Douglas Aircraft Company of California and the other the Boeing Airplane Company of Wichita, Kansas. All other issues in these two disputes had been resolved by disputants themselves. But the board intervened in the unionization issue.

The National Chamber has taken pains to point out that the President erred when he ignored taxes in his statement citing large steel profits. Truman said steel profits average \$19.50 a ton. Steel officials estimated a 1951 profit after taxes of \$6.50 a ton.

The Chamber cites Bureau of

The cost of living, the Chamber points out, has risen 11 per cent since Korea, while steel workers' earnings have advanced 13 1-2 per cent.

RCA PROTECTS FANS AND CONTESTANTS AT RODEO

The rodeo Cowboy's Association, more commonly known as the R.C.A., is a national organization of cowboys, contract performers, and producers who are dedicated to the advancement and promotion of the rodeo as a sport, and for the protection of both themselves and the rodeo going public from unscrupulous promoters and producers.

Originally the skills of the cowboys were displayed in wild west Shows in which each individual cowboy was paid to display his skills. As time went on and as the shows became more popular the cowboys saw the possibility of better shows by contesting their skills; however they were immediately beset by promoters who saw the opportunity to produce their shows and pay the contestants with their own entry fees.

Finally the cowboys, outraged by unscrupulous and scheming practices of a few promoters, met in New York City in 1931 and organized their own association, then called the Cowboy's Turtle Association. They were very concerned about the practice of the promoters in staging rodeos without contributing themselves to the performers. The Turtle association felt that the participants would have a fair share of the gate receipts as prize money for their competition.

The organization by-laws and rules provided not only for the

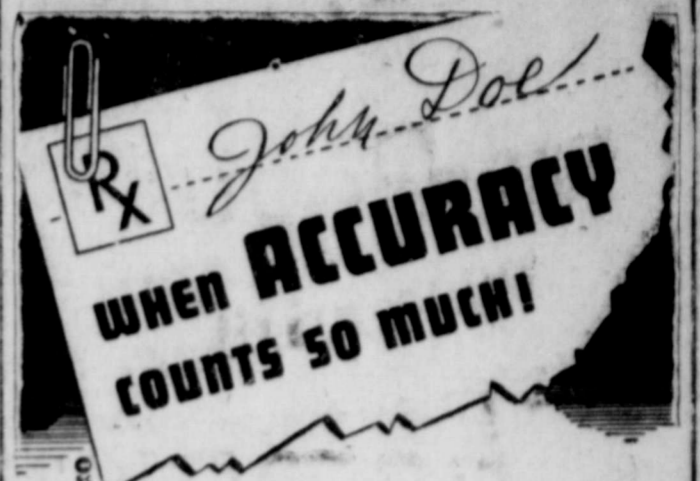
protection of the cowboys and contract performers, but also protected the producers and promoters who became members by establishing rules and regulations covering member's conduct.

An era of prosperity and of advancement such as the sporting world had never know followed and rodeo came to rank as a major national sport. Finally the membership became so large, and the business of such magnitude, that it was necessary to reorganize and in 1945 the Rodeo Cowboy's Association came into being with national headquarters in Ft. Worth; a full-time paid business manager and an annually elected board of unpaid directors each elected from the contest in which he worked.

The board transacts the business of the association, passing on prize lists, approving dates to avoid a minimum of conflict among shows, disqualifying members for misconduct, and representing the interest of the sport while promoting its welfare and protecting the public from unfair promotional schemes and inferior showmanship by cowboy talent.

The membership of the RCA are proud of their organization and the rodeo sport. Rodeos now plays to more people in more places, both indoors and outdoors for paid admissions than any other sport.

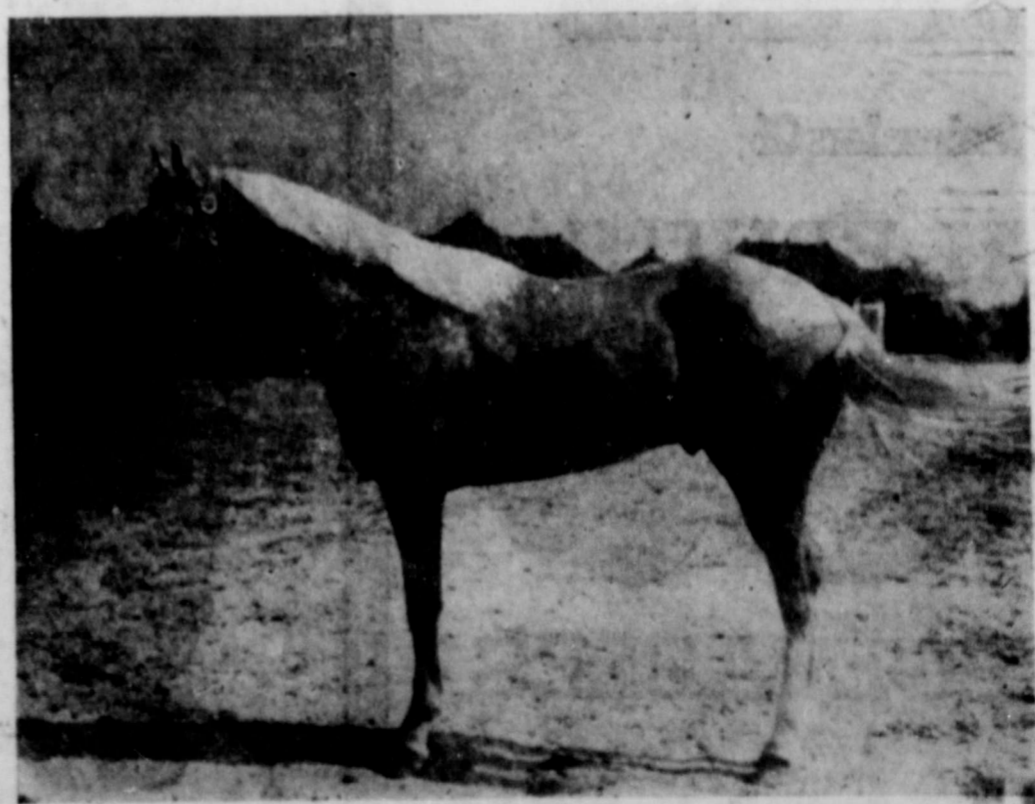

Progress Noted In Texas Hog Production By Swine Breeders

COLLEGE STATION—Better hogs are being raised in Texas. This improvement has resulted from the long time improvement program sponsored by the swine breeders association, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and other educational agencies.

Figures from the annual report of Extension Swine Husbandman, E. M. Regenbrecht, show that last year Texas farmers produced 2,308,000 hogs. He points out that Texas production could be increased and cites as an example what has happened in one corn belt state. In this state, 45 per cent of the grain feed produced is utilized for hog production. If this were done in Texas, Regenbrecht says, the state could profitably produce 4,000,000 head of swine.

Even though Texas may not be producing the maximum amount of

hogs, progress has been made in increasing quality and the number of pigs per litter. A look at swine statistics for Texas in the past reveals that litters of pigs have been very small. Hogs on the open range in East Texas and other range hog areas are included in the statistics, and the small litters from these areas pull down the average for the state.

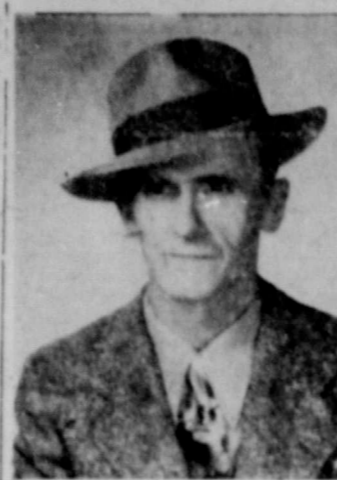
The average number of pigs raised per litter for Texas from 1938 to 1947, spring farrowed, was 5.9 pigs while the fall average for the same period was 6.1 pigs. The corresponding national average for the same period was 6.21 for fall, and 6.37 for spring. While the cornbelt averages were 6.32 and 6.5 respectively.

The Texas figures for pigs saved has risen, and in 1951 Texas surpassed the national average for both spring and fall litters and

also surpassed the corn belt for fall litters. The Texas fall average in 1951 was 6.17 pigs per litter, Regenbrecht says.

Twenty-seven hundred thirty-two white 4-H club boys in 165 Texas counties and Negro 4-H boys in 50 counties last year participated in a program of herd improvement. The Sears-Roebuck Foundation has for many years cooperated in this program by supplying pure bred breeding stock. Sows owned by these 4-H members last year farrowed an average of 8 plus pigs per litter.

Reasons given by Regenbrecht for this improvement start with the use of better breeding stock. As a result of demonstrations conducted by 4-H members and adults and supervised by county agricultural agents, Texas farmers are using improved practices such as better hog lot equipment, improved rations, grazing crops, sanitation and control of diseases and parasites. The use of these practices has helped to make hog raising in Texas more profitable.

TIPS TO LONGER LIFE FOR YOUR OUTBOARD MOTOR GIVEN

What can you do to help your outboard motor deliver all the years of service the manufacturer built into it?

The answer is to treat the motor as carefully as you do your car's engine. Those who do, it is pointed out, are still being rewarded with good service from motors they bought 25 years ago.

Outboard motors don't need babying. They're far easier to break in and maintain than new cars, for example. But they all need periodic attention, though, and some of them never get it. We saw the evidence of this recently from a service check among more than 3,500 dealers. An astonishingly large number of motors brought in to them for repair showed serious neglect—the likes of which no motorist would think of letting happen to his car.

The Johnson survey revealed a pattern of neglect problems which occur most frequently in the repair of all makes of motors. Based on this, they have prepared a "care" checklist which if followed will help keep a motor in top running order for years to come.

1. When breaking in a new motor don't operate it continuously at full throttle for the first hour. Run it at part throttle for 15

minutes, then open it up for a few seconds. Repeat this procedure during the first hour of operation.

2. After use in salt water (if it can be conveniently done) run the motor several minutes in a tank of fresh water. Rinse all exposed parts with fresh water and wipe them with an oily cloth. Never let the lower unit remain submerged when the motor is not in use. Remove the motor covers periodically and check for corrosion, which should be removed and the area covered with a film of oil.

3. Use the exact fuel mixture the manufacturer specifies—carefully and thoroughly mixed. This varies among motors. Too much oil carbons the motor; too little means excessive wear of moving parts.

4. Get all the water out of the motor cooling system after each use. Store in an upright position to completely drain the cooling system to avoid effects of salt water corrosion and to guard against bursting of the water jackets and/or channels during cold weather.

5. Keep water out of the cylinders by refraining from tilting the lower unit higher than the power head when there's water in the housing. (Otherwise water can enter the cylinders via the underwater exhaust stack and ports to

cause rusting.)

6. Use fresh fuel mixtures always to avoid gum accumulation, and also to permit easier starting of the motor.

7. Lubricate the motor before storage by removing drain and vent plugs in the gear case, emptying the grease or oil and water accumulation, and refilling with the proper lubricant. Remove the sparkplugs and pour a tablespoon of clean oil into the openings. Then turn the flywheel slowly to coat the cylinder walls with the oil. Replace the sparkplugs.

And at least once a year—before and after storage—have your motor checked at an authorized motor service station. This may save you costly repair bills or the need to buy a new motor long before your present one should have outlived its usefulness.

Sheep Parasite Put On Spot At Cornell

ITHACA, N. Y.—A hitherto-unrecorded parasite in the brain and spinal cord of sheep has been discovered by veterinary research workers at Cornell University.

The parasite is a worm about one-inch long which crawls through a sheep's spinal cord and brain and destroys tissue as it goes, said Dr. John H. Whitlock, Peter C. Kennedy and Steven J. Roberts.

Some animals are made completely helpless by the damage done by the parasite.

The parasite, they said, probably is transmitted by mosquitoes or biting flies. The likelihood is that some other animal than sheep is its natural host. The three scientists said the disease has never before been described in this country. A similar disease is known in Asia, they added, but there it has been attributed to a different parasite.

Scientist Detecting Spread of Cancer

SAN FRANCISCO, UP—An aid to finding out why cancer spreads through body tissues has been devised by Dr. J. F. Rinehart, pathologist at the University of California hospital.

The announcement was made by the American Cancer Society, which supports research at the university and its hospital with an institutional research grant.

Dr. Rinehart has devised three new stains which will aid in discovering how cancer manages to penetrate tough connective tissue, known as basement membrane, one type of which separates skin from underlying tissues. This ability gives the disease its invasive quality.

Dr. Rinehart stains tissues and, under the microscope, attempts to determine whether the basement membrane is defective in the early stage of cancer development, permitting cells to break through.

He also will make chemical tests to see whether some compound in the tumor reduces the tough restraining membrane to a jelly-like or watery consistency as the cancer moves into adjacent tissues. Some scientists believe that tumors possess a "spreading factor" which has such an effect.

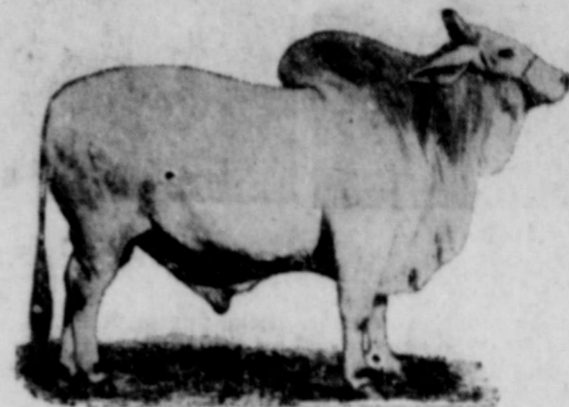

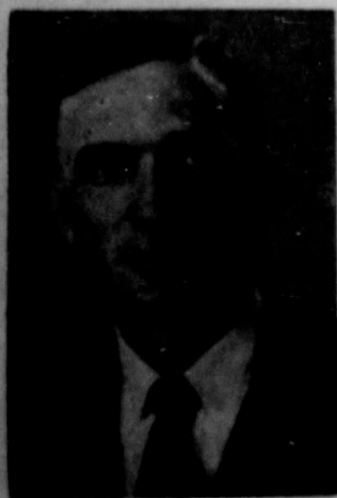

DEPRESSION IN TEXTILES COMING, ENGLAND FEARS

LONDON, March (UP)—The shadow of depression hangs over England's "Black Country" again. The industrial midlands and north face, the worst slump in the textile industry since the '30's.

Government and business leaders are scanning statistics of dropping employment and production in Lancashire and Cheshire, Britain's great cotton processing counties.

Concern was reflected in a debate in the House of Commons. Labor Party members originally planned a vote of censure on the government for the present plight of the textile industry. However, they thought it more prudent not to try to pin responsibility for the situation too closely.

Political scapegoats would be difficult to find for a situation that exists throughout the cotton-producing world.

Figures issued by trade sources show that about 60,000 people are wholly or partially unemployed in Lancashire, representing 17 per cent of the cotton industry's labor

force. Production in both spinning and weaving has dropped from 13 to 22 per cent in recent weeks. In the last week of February, 43 of Lancashire's 400 mills were closed and in the following week 28 were shut down.

Serious unemployment started about nine months ago when the post-war and Korea war buying spree ended. Consumers, wholesalers and retailers have been buying, and stocks stood at an all-time high.

As a result of world-wide overproduction of cotton goods, prices dropped and probably will have to drop more.

Following sterling area import restrictions to combat inflation—such as the drastic cuts imposed recently by Australia, one of Britain's best customers—export markets will continue to be sluggish. Domestic markets appear to have settled down at a lower level.

Competition will be fierce in what export markets there are left. Japanese competition is increasing; India, once Lancashire's

He propped the floor and started looking around for something that would hold the floor and the press. He decided on a pool table.

great market, is now a large exporter; Pakistan is building up her own export industry; and there are others.

The Manchester Guardian commented editorially that "it is deviously attractive to try to focus discontent on such things as the Australian import cuts and on Japanese competition, but—it is more to the point to consider whether we are not now witnessing the uncovering of a great structural change in the world market for textiles, such as was disclosed with so much pain to Lancashire when the great post-war boom collapsed in 1922."

The Guardian, long the bible of Britain's cottonmen, added that the new pattern of world trade "presents a bleak picture." The paper pointed out that while demand for cotton goods is increasing with increasing population, the actual volume of imported textiles is falling as more and more countries make and consume their own.

One bright spot in the gloomy Manchester scene was the statement by George Hardy, president of the Federation of Master Cotton Spinners Associations, that "none of the causes of recession need to be lasting."

Hardy said at the annual meeting of the federation that the

world situation indicated that defense orders would continue in a steady stream, though he warned that "there is no room for complacency in the long run."

He suggested that if the treasury allocated more dollars for purchase of cotton from the United States, it would help to bring down the level of prices in other producing countries. Lancashire users of American cotton would then not be at such a disadvantage with their competitors in raw material costs.

At the same time, Hardy said that if cotton prices dropped too low, American farmers would switch to food production, which would tend to keep prices high for the available cotton.

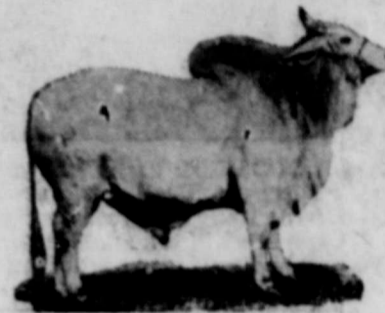

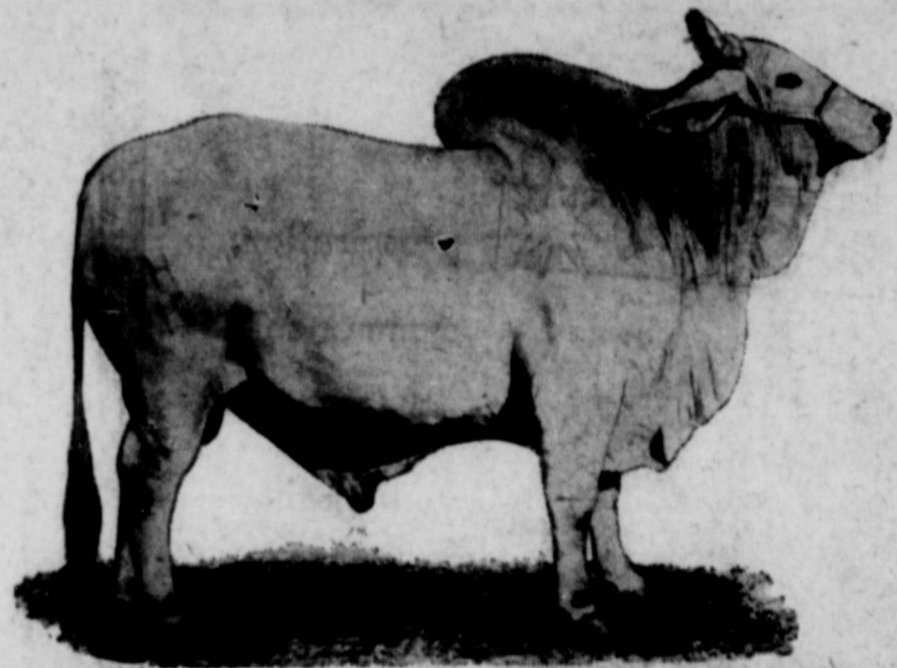

Progress Marks 7 Years Jaycee Existence

Principal Aim Is Promotion Of Agriculture And Stock Raising

"Bigger and better each year" seems to be the objective of the Ranger Junior Chamber of Commerce in their annual undertakings. This year is the seventh since the founding of the non-political non-profit service club in 1946.

The Jaycees were organized to promote and encourage better agriculture and stock raising in this area. With their main effort being the Future Farmers and 4-H Clubs in this objective.

The Club Extension Committee of the Abilene Junior Chamber of Commerce "mothered" the Ranger club. Ranger was among a number of clubs they assisted in getting organized that year, an undertaking for which they received national recognition from the U. S. Junior Chamber.

The organizational meeting for this Jaycee organization was held in the Gholson Hotel in the spring of 1946. The original club had about twenty charter members. Price Crawley was the first president.

The first World's Championship Rodeo was held that year. With the rodeo arena and facilities being constructed from the time they were chartered until the opening day of the Rodeo. The final bit of welding was done on the arena a few minutes prior to the first performance.

The land and facilities were built through issuance of \$12,000 in stock to local merchants and supporters of the Jaycee program. The grounds and equipment are worth much more than that, due to a large part of the work being done free and materials furnished at no cost.

In the past six performances only one of them has failed to make money for support of the Jaycee program. That was due to rain on the final night of the rodeo. The loss was not great and the Jaycees were able to survive this blow and continue their work.

Abilene Jaycees who had helped in the organization of the club here are Dave Adams, Oliver Howard, Jimmy Partin, Gene Bradshaw, and Alec Bickley, and others.

Price Crawley was succeeded as president by the late J. P. Morris in 1947; Perry Horton followed Morris, but moved during the term and Morris Newnam took over the reins of the club and directed its operation; in 1949 Wilson Guest was elected president.

Guest succeeded Newnam; C. E. May succeeded him and Allen Full was May's successor; Charles Milliken is the present president.

The Tri-County Livestock Show barn is a profit of the Jaycee Rodeo operations in past years. The Jaycees hold this show annually unassisted in the hope that it will further their aims in improving agriculture and stock raising in this area.

The original west Texas Calf Scramble is a major factor in aiding the FFA and 4-H Club boys in raising better livestock. The original scramble was for stecker cattle, this was later changed, and the Jaycees, with the help of merchants and surrounding banks, give away each year registered Jersey Heifers.

The chosen club boys scramble for numbered pigs at a performance of the rodeo that correspond with helpers they will receive for catching the pigs.

Some of the activities of which the Jaycees have supported in past years are a meeting here of the West Cross Timbers Sheep and Goat Raisers Association in 1949; had Murray Cox here twice to promote and advertise their livestock program at the stock show; conducted "Pay Your Poll Tax" campaigning; and sponsored a Christmas program that provided 1000 toys for underprivileged children.

The Jaycees in the past six years have become a needed part of Ranger and a boost to agriculture and stock raisers in this area. The members give their time

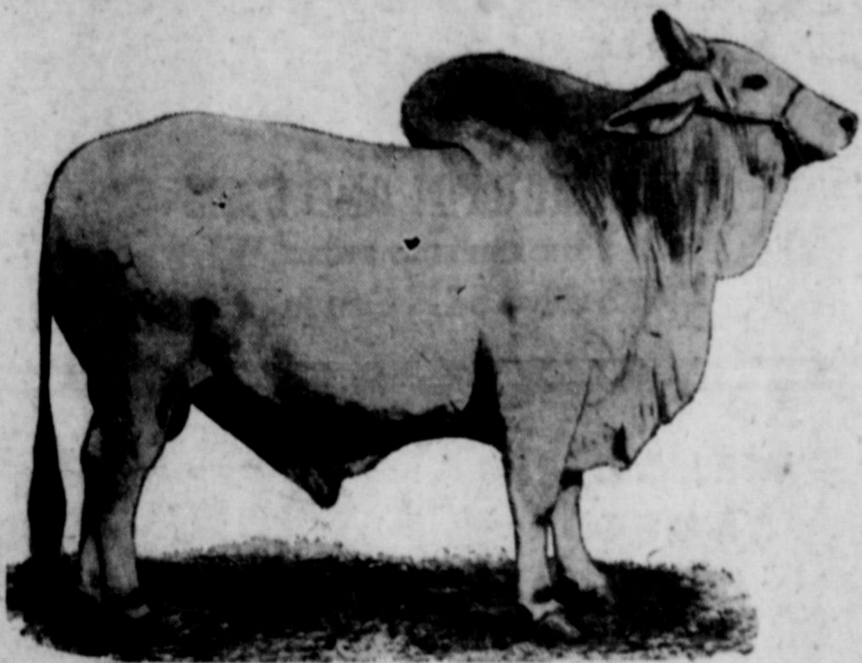

Spur Scientist Named Tops Among Agricultural Leaders

RENNER, Texas, May — The tough and aggressive mesquite infests more than 55 million acres of land in Texas. It is estimated that each year from the grazing of livestock millions of dollars of potential profits are lost.

Today 14 years of research in an effort to control this hardy member of the Mimosa family paid off handsomely for a young Texas scientist.

Charles E. Fisher, 41, Superintendent of Texas Agricultural Experiment Station Substation No. 7 at Spur, was named winner of the Hoblitzelle award recognizing him as the "Texas agricultural scientist who in the past three years has made the greatest contribution to agriculture in the State." Consisting of \$5,000.00 in cash and a gold medal, the award was presented at the annual open house of Texas Research Foundation here.

Fisher's research resulted last year in the control of mesquite on more than 400 thousand acres of Texas pasture. The control method is simple: A low flying airplane "bombs" the mesquite trees with coarse droplets of an oil-water emulsion loaded with a new chemical herbicide. Flying just above the tree tops, the pilot sprays a wide swath of mesquite as he goes. One pound of the hormone-type chemical, 2,4,5-T, is recommended per acre. Cost of treating: About \$200 per acre.

The panel of judges in selecting the work on mesquite control over that of thirty other Texas agricultural scientists whose research had been entered, pointed out:

"No absolute method for the final eradication of mesquite has been perfected, but the research of C. E. Fisher provides new hope to the farmer and rancher of Texas and the Southwest through the provision of an economic effective means of controlling the brush. His research has immediate and significant widespread application."

Fisher's control method not only kills about 98 per cent of the mesquite to ground level, but invades its bud zone area below ground and prevents a high percentage of the plants from sprout-

ing again.

The chemical "bombing" of the brush not only knocks out the mesquite, but many other range pests such as the cocklebur and sunflower. The treatment can be administered while cattle and other livestock are grazing the land. The chemical has no effect on either the cattle or the native grasses upon which they graze. Care must be exercised in the application of the chemical, however, for even in trace amounts it will damage highly susceptible crops such as cotton, alfalfa, clover, grapes, tomatoes and many others.

Fisher, with the assistance of his staff conducted hundreds and hundreds of experiments in his long fight against mesquite brush before the method of airplane control with 2,4,5-T was perfected.

Three fold benefits result from the solution to this problem peculiar to the ranges of Texas:

1. It is much easier to handle and care for livestock in cleared areas.

2. Improved growth of native grasses helps to rebuild the soil and aids in conservation.

3. Cleared areas afford better grazing. During the past three years in experiments conducted at Spur, steers gained 28 per cent more weight on cleared pastures than in brush pastures.

The section of the Hoblitzelle award winner was made by a committee from outstanding Texas educators and agriculturists. The Committee was composed of Lewis P. Merrill, Regional Conservator, Soil Conservation Service, Ft. Worth, Texas; Dr. R. J. Williams, Professor of Chemistry, University of Texas, Austin, Texas; Dr. R. D. Lewis Director, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Texas A. & M. College Station, Texas; and Dr. D. M. Wiggins, President, Texas Technological College, Lubbock, Texas.

Duck Prospects Reported Good

AUSTIN, July—Reports of favorable waterfowl nesting conditions were brought back to Austin from a Central Flyway Council meeting at Bismarck, N. D.

The Assistant Executive Secretary of the Texas Game & Fish Commission (W. J. Cutbirth, Jr.) who attended the conference, said preliminary information presages a good hatch both in the northern states and in the Canadian provinces.

The conference named the Executive Secretary of the Game & Fish Commission (Howard D. Dodgen) as one of two representatives of the Central Council to attend the National Waterfowl Council in Washington D. C., early in August.

That meeting will be attended by both private and governmental authorities on ducks and geese. The conclusions are expected to help shape the 1952 shooting regulations.

Japanese Opinion Poll Backs Recent U. S. Pact

TOKYO UP—Seventy per cent off Tokyotels were satisfied with the Japanese peace treaty signed in San Francisco last September according to an official public opinion survey here.

The results indicated that some 70 per cent considered the peace treaty satisfactory for a defeated nation. Twelve per cent found it unsatisfactory even for a defeated nation and the remainder not-satisfactory but acceptable.



Rodeo Fans May See Jaycees Ride L. R. Pearson's Buffalo

An animal that at one time covered the entire west, but has since become nearly extinct, will be a featured attraction at the Seventh Annual Ranger Jaycees Rodeo, July 16-19. Representative L. R. Pearson of Ranger has given the Ranger Jaycees permission to use his herd of buffalo in their rodeo.

The only catch to the deal was that the Jaycees pen them on his ranch about eight miles west of Ranger. Judge Pearson said he would furnish transportation to and from the rodeo, the animals, only if the Jaycees would undertake to pen the untamed beasts.

That doesn't sound like to big a job. But a chat with Pearson will enlighten you about buffalo. They must be penned on foot with extreme caution. Any sudden movement or action will send the herd of ten scattering in ever direction. And on a section of land that will be no small undertaking for the city boys.

Pearson, who is a lawyer, rancher, oilman and state representative, explains that buffalo are highly allergic to horses, with or without riders. "A hundred cowboys on horseback couldn't pen those ten buffalo on that little section of land," Pearson said. A buffalo will not turn and run from a horse. They will turn to face the animal and either charge it with murderous intent or the entire herd will scatter to the four winds when approached by a man on horseback.

This rare collection of these animals started a number of years ago when Pearson was given a pair of the animals from the Goodfellow Ranch. Since the heifers do not calve until four years, the herd numbers only ten in the many years they have been on the Pearson Ranch.

As Pearson said, "the buffalo will be available if the Jaycees pen them", and if they are able to corral the herd the rodeo goes will get to watch a rare feature when the Jaycees come out of the chutes at the arena on these descendants of the old west.

The rodeo being in a measure the work and play of the cowboy on the ranch, is the only sport to spring from an industry.

It is considered the most dangerous of sports, and while its casualty list is larger than in most any other sport, its participants wear no helmets, breast protectors, shin guards or other safety devices. They depend solely upon their own skill and agility to keep them from being injured and this oft times fall far short.

The contestants pay an entrance fee for the privilege of

making their necks in the quest of the large cash prizes, and each contestant is required to sign a release or waiver absolving the management or producers from liability in case of accident or injury.

Contestants have no choice in selecting the stock for their trials. All stock is drawn for and each contestant must attempt to ride, rope, or wrestle the animal drawn for them.

Bareback bronc riding, saddle bronc riding, bull riding, calf roping and steer wrestling are con-

sidered the five major events of rodeo. Some rodeos also have contests of wild cow milking, steer roping, wild horse races, team roping, cutting horse contest, barrel races, etc.

Fancy ropers, trick riders, clowns and specialty acts are known as contract performers and are paid a salary or stipulated amount. They are used to round out a complete and diversified program.

The contestants appreciate your applause of their efforts, just as much as do fancy ropers, trick riders, and other contract performers, but don't expect the contest-

ants to be profuse in their acknowledgement of your applause. It's an idea handed down for generations that in contests profuse acknowledgement of applause is akin to grandstanding.
