





Is there a counterpart of our American "Bill of Rights?" Texas lawyers believe that for every guaranteed RIGHT, there is a corresponding RESPONSIBILITY on the part of every citizen.

Recently the American Citizenship Committee of the State Bar was presented an award by the Freedom Foundation for its work during 1950-51. One of its projects during the time, and one factor in earning the award, was the development of the following "Bill of Responsibilities."

I. It shall be the duty of every citizen to render undivided allegiance to the Constitution of the United States, to work for its betterment and perpetuation, to respect the sovereignty of the people's government, and to defend the nation against all its enemies whomsoever.

II. It shall be the duty of every citizen to be familiar with the Constitution of the United States and to be informed as to what rights and liberties are his, and to use these rights in such manner as is consistent with his own welfare and the welfare of his fellow

III. It shall be the duty of every citizen to defend with his life the rights and liberties granted to him and to his fellow citizens by the Constitution, to obey the laws of the land and aid in their enforcement, and to oppose vigorously any persons whose intention is to transgress to law or to oppress the rights of others.

IV. It shall be the duty of every citizen to make honest, wise and courageous use of the free and secret ballot at every election; to exercise freedom of thought, speech, and worship; to protect the press; to safeguard the right of trial by jury and to render willing jury service when called upon, and to perform all other acts conducive to the perpetuation of the rights set forth in the Constitution.

V. It shall be the duty of every citizen to protect and sustain the unwritten liberties and rights vested in him by custom and usage and to perpetuate the ideals of the equality and dignity of the individual, upon which the Constitution is founded.

VI. It shall be the duty of every citizen to be active in the political party of his choice, and to be vigilant of the public officers, to render all possible aid to them, and to serve in public office by appointment or election when qualified and when called upon to do so. He shall be his duty to strive for the selection of public officers of ability and upright character; and when holding public office, to serve in such a manner as will subordinate private or minority interest to those of the people at large.

VII. It shall be the duty of every citizen to achieve the highest practicable level of education, and to work for the advancement of education by supporting and improving the public schools and by fostering the desire for education among his fellow citizens.

VIII. It shall be the duty of every citizen to defend the right to buy and sell, to own land and other property, to engage in commerce, and to work and earn a living wage, as a fundamental guarantee of the freedom and welfare of the nation.

IX. It shall be the duty of every citizen to instruct his children in the principles of freedom and to spread the ideals of democratic government at home and abroad.

X. It shall be the duty of every citizen to preserve an attitude of self-reliance, and to use all legitimate means to achieve financial independence and security; to practice thrift and economy in his own affairs and to require the same of local, state and federal government.

### "Porgy and Bess" Goes To Europe

HOLLYWOOD, July 17 UP—Thanks to a Kansas millionaire, a company of "Porgy and Bess" goes to Europe this fall to fight Red whispers that American Negroes don't have a chance to be artistic.

A capitalist named Blevins Davis put up more than \$200,000 to send the all-Negro opera by George Gershwin overseas. He figured it also will prove that all American culture isn't borrowed from Europeans.

"These 50 Negroes are wonderful musicians and singers," explained lyricist Ira Gershwin, brother of the late composer. "We'll show Europe that Negroes have advanced to a high cultural point."

European cities have the welcome mat out for the good-will company, too. The troupe, now appearing in Chicago, will play in Berlin, Vienna, Paris and London. Yugoslavia asked for the show. But the state department, backing the tour, ruled the opera couldn't ring up the curtain behind the Iron Curtain.

Sent Ballet Company  
"Davis is a dedicated man," Gershwin went on. "He wants peace in the world and he wants nations to be happy and free. He thought 'Porgy and Bess' was a wonderful thing to send aboard."

"Last year Davis sent an American ballet company over there. This is a non-profit tour, too, so he'll be allowed to only break even."

The American opera was applauded by the critics but was lukewarm at the boxoffice when it opened in New York in 1935. But tunes like "Summertime" later became hits and made the revival a success in 1942.

"Porgy and Bess" once was staged in Zurich Switzerland. But the all-white Swiss cast played a bowling game on the stage instead of the traditional American craps.

A Copenhagen company produced the opera in black-face, too. But the rest of Europe has never seen the show.

Heard In Every City  
"I've had more than 80 offers to sell 'Porgy and Bess' to the movies," Gershwin added. "But we won't sell it until after it's toured for a few more years."

"In fact, there's so much activity with George's and my music that I can't keep track of it. Every big city has a Gershwin memorial concert each summer."

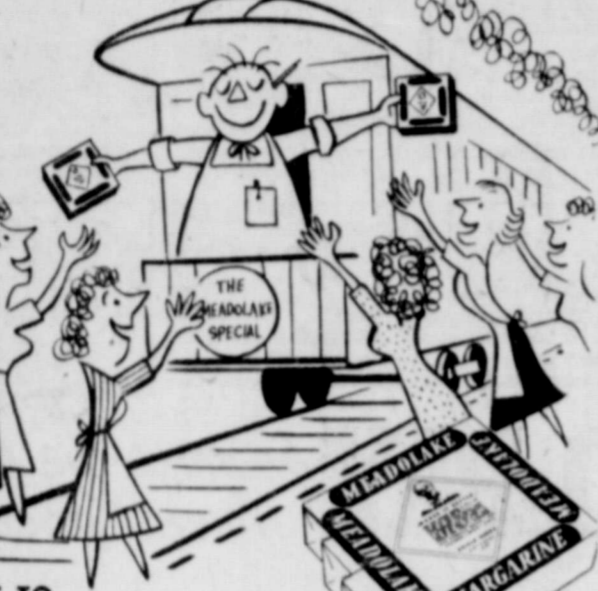

## Lightning Is Dangerous; Be On Your Guard

NEW YORK, N. Y.—People who work or play outdoors were warned today that the summer season, with its sudden and violent thunderstorms, is the period of the greatest danger from lightning.

Lightning takes approximately 300 lives a year in the United States, statisticians of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company pointed out, adding that many of these lives could have been saved if the victims had sought safe shelter.

One of the most dangerous places during a storm is under a tree—especially an isolated one. About one fourth of all the deaths from lightning occur among persons who seek shelter under or near trees. After striking a tree, the bolt may flash sideways or it may run along the ground and kill anyone in its path.

## TELEVISION APT TO CHANGE POLITICAL CONVENTION WAYS

NEW YORK, July 17 —The Democrats are huddling with television experts this week to see how much they can profit from technical and production errors committed by the Republicans in the first presidential convention to be televised nationally.

The consensus was the GOP put on an absorbing, slam-bang affair, but got nowhere near all it could from using television's unblinking eye as a vote attracter.

Most authorities predicted that both the Democrats and Republicans would have to change their political shows from the ground up by the time 1956 rolls around.

**Must Watch Make-Up**  
For example, they said the so-called "Fourth of July" orator has been given his death notice. In his place will come the politician who watches his make-up as carefully as his cohorts and values his

tailor side by side with his campaign manager.

"Those are only some of the obvious changes," said a veteran TV producer and director, Jeanne Harrison. "This year's convention should convince both parties they need entire staffs of stage managers."

"Some of the little things that happened were very bad showmanship," Miss Harrison said. "For instance, try to imagine Bishop Fulton Sheen or Milton Berle allowing various characters to wander around in back of them just as they reach the critical part of a sermon or comedy routine."

She said the political bosses at the GOP show might have been tingling with his tie or wiggling his sharp as tacks on their smoke-filled-room techniques, but none appeared aware of how easily the human eye is distracted.

**Loss Their Audience**  
"Even the most gifted speaker can lose his audience if there's some hanger-on behind him fidget-fingers," she pointed out. Our political leaders will have to learn to beware of what Hollywood calls "scene stealers."

About 42,000,000 United States workers will receive paid vacations during 1952. The tourist public is expected to spend \$12,000,000,000 on travel within the nation's borders.

A survey by Rogan showed that 14 per cent of the motoring vacations will travel 2,000 miles or more, while 47 per cent will top the 600-mile mark.

The survey also provided the following statistics:  
Two-thirds of the motoring tourists will stay overnight in motor courts, with 16.2 per cent stopping at commercial hotels and 12.1 per cent the guests of friends and relatives. Tourist homes will cater to the remaining five per cent.

Of each dollar spent, 29 cents will go for food, 25 cents for lodging, 15 cents for amusements, 10 cents for automobile expenses and the remaining 11 cents for miscellaneous items.

Grand Canyon will attract more than 700,000 visitors; the Blue Ridge Parkway will be traveled by 3,000,000 persons; more than 2,000,000 tourists will visit the Great Smoky Mountains National Park and 1,000,000 persons will visit Yellowstone Park.

Rogan estimated the minimum "comfortable" expense for a couple traveling 300 miles a day by car at \$22. He said the estimate included food, lodging, gas, oil but no extras.

### New Polio Record Set Past 7 Days

San Antonio reported its fourth resident poliomyelitis death this year Thursday, as a medical team from the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis visited the hard-hit Rio Grande valley.

Haskell J. Martin, a 34-year-old veteran from San Antonio, died at Brooke Army hospital after he was admitted as a polio case July 14.

The State Health Department announced only Wednesday that new record of 296 cases of polio were reported in Texas last week.

It was the third all-time record number of cases for a seven-day period within four weeks. And it marked the fifth consecutive week in which more than 100 cases of the dread disease were diagnosed in Texas.

Seven counties, Harris, Dallas, Tarrant, Bexar, Jefferson, Stephens and El Paso reported more than half of last week's 296 total. Harris Houston had 56 cases.

Six more cases were diagnosed Wednesday at Houston to bring its total to 526 for the year, including 20 deaths.

Dr. Herbert W. Wagner of the national foundation medical staff and Dr. Louis Lewellyn, regional medical consultant, said at Harlingen they were visiting in the Rio Grande valley for observation purposes only.

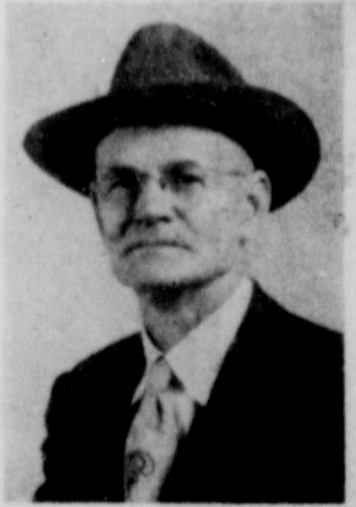

**More Enjoyable Summer Diet Is Voiced By Tech**

LUEBOCK, July —Substitution of fresh fruits and vegetables for heavy meats and potatoes will give more summer eating enjoyment.

Mrs. Jonnie Michie, head of the Texas Tech foods and nutrition department, says that with the arrival of hot summer months, wives and mothers dislike heating the house by preparing heavy meals usually ate during the middle of the winter. To give the women more leisure from the kitchen stove, Mrs. Michie gives some suggestions for summer meal planning.

Quick relief from summer heat can be obtained from the inside, Mrs. Michie said. A decrease in the protein diet, plus a reduction of fatty foods, will lower temperatures. An increase in vegetables of high water content, such as lettuce and tomatoes, give the body added moisture.

In preparing summer meals one hot dish will increase digestion, as give variety. Substituting for all cooked fruits and vegetables, and too much iced fruit and underripe fruit can be more than beneficial.

**Man's Rights Over Property Fading Away**

WASHINGTON, July 16—Students of land use planning are giving increasing attention to the idea that a man's right to do what he wants with his own property may soon be outmoded.

"The policy may prove successful as long as there is an abundance of land, food and employment, but there is no assurance that it will be compatible with the economic and social demands of the future when population pressures may be intensified."

So writes William H. Appel in the first issue of Yale Conservation Studies, reprinted in the current issue of "Soil Conservation," official organ of the Federal Soil Conservation Service.

"Basic Preconceptions"  
The right to own land and to

use it as the owner pleases is "held as one of the basic prerogatives of free men," Appel said. But the law has already divested the right to own land from the right to use it by establishing zoning regulations, and by giving the government the right to condemn property.

"Much-debated government control" over farm land sales might be necessary, he said, to curb the sale of productive farm land for non-farm uses.

J. C. Dykes, assistant chief of the Soil Conservation Service, pointed out that the article did not reflect government policy. But he agreed with Appel that the forgotten man in land use planning in the country real estate agent.

Assist Owners in Buying  
"The agent, like the soil technician, can assist owners in buying, selling and managing their property in more specially desirable fashion," wrote Appel. "He is in a position to reduce the destruction of healthy property units."

The Yale Conservation Club writer said there is no force to arguments that laws of supply and demand will force a healthy use of the land.

"Competition for residential, commercial, industrial and agricultural land creates artificial values," he said. Appel indicated he feared much farm production would be lost in the future if farm land is sold for immediate cash value, ignoring the time needs.

With no restrictions on the way in which productive farms can be broken up, or the uses for which they can be sold, Appel sees agriculture losing ground.

"Urban residents who own property in the country compete for it with local residents who become less and less able to meet the rising costs," he said.

"The only means of obtaining land is through accumulating capital, and the rural population finds it increasingly difficult to get this capital."

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
