Fresh Chinese **Troops Attack** 2nd Division

SEOUL, Korea., July 26leavily-armed Communists from fresh Chinese army raided U. S. Second Division troops on the central front Friday in a bold at tempt to seize prisoners and American weapons, it was revealed

The Red soldiers tried in three separate assults to overrun Americar and French positions with bat-

allion-sized attacks.
All of the assults were driven back by United Nations artillery barrages and the deadly machine gun and rifle fire of UN infantry-

Chinese Communists, picket from the freshly-supplied army, were assigned to battle UN positions guarding the Chorwon gate-way to South Korea.

The three Red battalions-about 600 men each-were equipped with submachine guns to give them ex-

traordinary attacking power. The Fifth Air Force, meanwhile. announced that eight Allied war planes-were lost in the past seven days to Communist ground fire and other unspecified causes.

Allied losses included two F-80 shooting stars, one F-84 Thunderjet, a propeller-driven F51 Mus-tang, a B-26 light bomber, all to Red ground fire, and one F-86 Sabrejet, one B26 and a Marine orsair to unknown causes.






