

## Battle of Undefeated Conference Teams

### Grid Foes Risk Title Hopes in Crucial Tilt Here Friday Night

A bitter struggle is in the offing here Friday night when two of the top football teams in District 2-A clash in a very crucial contest that may well decide who is to rule the District and win the conference crown.

Arch rivals this year as in all other years are the strong Dimmitt Bobcats of Coach Leo Fields and the high flying Springlake Wolverines of Coach Colie Huffman. So popular has this game become down through the years that a capacity crowd of from 2,000 to 2,500 fans are expected to jam Bobcat Stadium Friday night when the kickoff whistle sounds at 8 o'clock.

Huffman will bring one of his finest squads to Dimmitt; a team that boasts a season record of six wins and one defeat. The shifty Wolverine team runs from the T formation and will field a slightly heavier backfield than Dimmitt. On the other hand the Bobcats

have the weight advantage in the line and will bank heavy on this factor.

The Springlake eleven can run and throw but prides itself mainly on a good running attack. Coach Fields believes the Wolverines will be the toughest team his eleven has met all season with the exception of the powerful Hale Center Owls. The Wolverines have a fast and shifty quarterback in Jimmy Hadaway who weighs 165 pounds and capable runners in Halback DeWayne Louder and Fullback Rex Loftis. Loftis was hurt earlier in the season but will play against Dimmitt.

The Bobcats will be at full strength with the exception of Quarterback Richard Wood who was injured in workouts two weeks ago. Don Mobley is expected to carry the load at this position, though, and did a good job last week against the Friona Chiefs.

Both Dimmitt and Springlake are undefeated in conference action. Less points have been scored against the locals and would seem to give them the advantage on defense. Both teams have demonstrated a "free wheeling" offense by racking up impressive victories.

The winner of this game will be a strong bidder for the District championship as Amherst will be their only serious competitor for the crown. The Bulldogs are darkhorses and could be full of surprises before the season is over, however.

Fields is looking for his first victory over a Springlake team and will probably pull every trick out of the bag to win it. The worried coach stated Tuesday that the game will be a very tough ballgame. He said, "These two ball teams are fairly evenly matched and it looks to me that the team that wants it the worse may win."

### Pioneer Castro Resident Buried Here Wednesday

George T. Abbott, 83-year-old retired farmer-stockman of the Sunnyside Community, passed away at the Castro County Hospital here Monday at 7 p. Services for the pioneer Castro settler were conducted Wednesday at 3 p. m. from Sunnyside Baptist Church. Dr. A. Hope Owen, president of Wayland College, officiated. He was assisted by Rev. C. M. Rogers, pastor of Sunnyside Church, and Deary Bryan Robinson of Wayland College. Dennis Funeral Home was in charge of burial, which was in the Dimmitt Cemetery.

A resident of Castro county since 1890, Mr. Abbott had suffered several heart attacks and had been in ill health since 1946. Born in Walla Walla, South Carolina in 1871, Mr. Abbott came to Parker county with his family when he was 13-years-old. He went to work on the XIT Ranch in this area in 1891. In 1896 Mr. Abbott filed on four sections of land in Castro county and in later years became one of the county's most successful cattlemen and farmers. He is listed as the first qualified voter in the county.

Mr. Abbott was a member of the Masonic Lodge and the Baptist Church. He leaves his wife, Mrs. Millburne Abbott; one daughter, Mrs. Walter Graham of Happy; a brother, Press Abbott of Bovina; and four grandchildren and one great granddaughter. The accident occurred just two miles inside the Castro county line when Meyer's car left the highway and turned over several times. Time of the mishap was 5:05 p. m.

The body of the 29-year-old Amarilloan was taken to Amarillo where funeral services and burial were held Wednesday. The victim was a nephew of Dimmitt City Marshal Wilbur Cook and was enroute to visit here when the tragedy happened.

Axtell is presenting to the county library a fireplace made of fluorescent rocks which she and the late Mr. Axtell gathered as they traveled across the United States during the last few years. In daylight the stones are drab and uninteresting, but framed in black-lined curtains and reflecting a black light, the colors are indescribably lovely. Mrs. Axtell herself, during her recent visit to her home here, placed the stones on the fireplace, following a definite pattern with the colors, and arranged for the lighting and hanging of the curtains. This was a long-planned project of the Axtells and one which Mr. Axtell especially wished his wife to complete.

The Dimmitt Book Club, sponsor of the library, is presenting this gift at the annual open house Wednesday afternoon, Nov. 10, immediately following the monthly book review, which begins in the district courtroom at 4 p. m. Visitors are always welcome to hear reviews and everyone is cordially invited to attend the open house and see the fireplace.

Included in the Axtell gift were about 250 books, many of them beautifully illustrated children's books; a large book case brought west long ago from Tennessee by the family; a cabinet filled with figures made from shells, along with a collection of shells for the children to use in making more figures; several Indian vases and a number of small articles.

# Lions Cite City Needs; Seek Community Help

Will Dimmitt's future be marked by progress and prosperity or by over-crowded conditions and inadequate commercial and recreational facilities?

Dimmitt Lion Club members, meeting in regular session Tuesday, were without the services of a crystal ball but never-the-less each member did some serious thinking about the above mentioned question and all voiced themselves as being in favor of many needed "community building" projects.

The urgent need for new building facilities was scored by Dimmitt School Superintendent R. S. Vestal who deplored present over-crowded facilities at the high school by citing the vast increase in total enrollment which in the

past five years has soared from 525 to 1,009. Vestal stated, "Four new classrooms are full and sooner or later a new school building will have to be constructed. Men are here every day seeking farmland and building new homes. We must have a new school building soon to accommodate mounting enrollment!" Vestal also pointed out that high school enrollment has jumped from 110 to 241 since 1947.

The urgent need for new projects and critical remarks concerning lack of enthusiasm and initiative in regard to these needs were provoked by Lion Glen Youts who called for a survey among Lion members as to our "current city needs." Some of the things that members classed as

urgently needed now were a new post office, school building, Scout hut, community center, city park and fire zoning.

Brief excerpts of comments made by members follow:

Bruce Wooddell: "If we don't obtain a location for a city park now we will find later that there will not be a suitable place to locate one. The location is important and will determine the success of our new park."

D. W. Brashear: "I believe \$230,000 has been earmarked by the government for a post office here and it is a matter of time before it will be built. We also need a community center building or a central point of meeting. On our recent trip for the Highway 51 Association we found most towns this size had a central place of meeting."

Russel Moran: "We need to be zoning our town to prevent fire traps from springing up. Concrete tennis courts for the children of the community would also be money well spent."

L. G. Manning: "We need to watch our water supply for in a few years we may find ourselves confronted with the same problems that exists in drought areas."

Ray Stalcup: "We need to clean up Dimmitt. Let us meet as a body and get these projects underway so that they may become realities."

T. A. Singer: "We must sell our people on the things we need. We are already sold, but the people need to be sold."

In other business President Buck Clewinger called the group's attention to the Lion Zone meet to be held here Tuesday night, Nov. 9, and urged as many members as possible to attend.

Funeral services were conducted Friday at 3 p. m. from the Dimmitt First Baptist Church for Homer T. Bartlett, pioneer Castro settler who for the last 30 years had made his home at Dimmitt. The Rev. Mr. Bartlett, well-known in this area, had been ill for the past two years. He died at 8:30 p. m. Thursday in the Castro County Hospital.

A retired stock farmer, Mr. Bartlett was born in Hill County, Texas in 1889. When just a youth he moved with his family to Lamesa in Dawson county in 1903. He married Lois Irma Hill at Lamesa in 1908 and they moved to Baker Flat, New Mexico, a short time later where he filed a claim Mr. and Mrs. Bartlett returned to Dawson county in 1914 and he farmed for several years before taking over the operation of a service station and garage in Lamesa. The Bartletts and their family later moved to Lubbock and resided there for three years before he came to Dimmitt in 1924. After making a success in the farming and cattle business, his wife and family followed him to Dimmitt in 1932. Mr. Bartlett was active until recent years when he was forced to retire because of poor health.

Besides his wife, Mr. Bartlett is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Howard Scoggin of Dimmitt and Mrs. S. M. Carroll of Weslaco and three grandchildren.

## County Vote is Unusually Light

### Rogers Given Big Victory Margin

The heaviest vote in history in an off-year election was recorded when voters over the county went to the polls Tuesday. In Castro county, however, the vote was very light as only 625 ballots were cast. This figure represents slightly over half of the total in the November general election in 1950 when 1,128 ballots were cast.

In the only contested race in this area Democrat Walter Rogers polled 522 votes in the county compared to 190 for his Republican opponent R. L. "Pete" LaMaster. The voting by precincts in this race follows:

Precinct One—Rogers, 17, and LaMaster, 8; precinct two—Rogers, 91, and LaMaster, 26; Precinct three—Rogers, 113, and LaMaster, 33; precinct four—Rogers, 26, and LaMaster, 12; precinct five—Rogers, 15, and LaMaster, 4; precinct six—Rogers, 63, and LaMaster, 21; precinct seven—Rogers, 16, and LaMaster, 13; precinct eight—Rogers, 32, and LaMaster, 7; precinct nine—Rogers, 22, and LaMaster, 7; precinct ten—Rogers, 22 and LaMaster, 2; precinct 11—Rogers, 23, and LaMaster, 1; precinct 12—Rogers, 38, and LaMaster, 30; precinct 13—Rogers, 11, and LaMaster, 14; precinct 14—Rogers, 32, and LaMaster, 11; and precinct 15—(no votes cast).

Rogers carried all precincts in the county with the exception of precinct 13 where his opponent polled three more than he did. The Pampa Congressman's margin of victory was better than two to one. He also received his heaviest vote in precinct three.

An interesting sidelight in the election was the fact that two write-in votes were given J. O. Ayers, Jr., for commissioner in precinct four. Four write-in votes were also counted for Ralph Yarborough who was defeated for the office of governor in August by Allan Shivers.

Castro countians favored six of the constitutional amendments and opposed five. County vote on the amendments follows: number one—362 for and 213 against; number two—271 for and 306 against; number three—254 for and 302 against; number four—457 for and 137 against; number five—294 for and 276 against; number six—278 for and 275 against; number seven—274 for and 348 against; number eight—250 for and 370 against; number nine—193 for and 370 against; number 10—410 for and 151 against; and number 11—433 for and 257 against. The county was against jury service for women.

The Bobbies traveled to Farwell Tuesday night and soundly defeated the Farwell girl cagers 74-39. The Dimmitt "B" team also won its game 62-22. Margaret Odum registered 32 for Dimmitt to take high scoring honors. Darlene Cates netted 13; Mary Alley, 12; Faye Howard, nine; and Shirley DeLozier, 8. High point getter for the "B" team was Dove Smithson with 32.

Progress of the 1954 Census of Agriculture is being delayed because farmers have not completed the forms which were sent to them by mail. This word comes from the director of the census to Castro County Agent Charlie Hudson.

Failure to complete the census questionnaire slows down the enumerators and greatly reduces the number of farms which can be visited each day, explained Hudson.

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son. This makes the work of the enumerators more difficult and materially increases the cost of the undertaking.

The information which farmers are being asked to supply is not only valuable to them in planning future operations but to business men who supply the farm market's needs; agricultural leaders to whom farmers look for guidance and the agencies and organizations which service agriculture. Too, says Hudson, the census information of the nation's agricultural resources is of vital importance to the 163 million citizens of the country.

The nation's taxpayers are footing the bill for the census taking job and Hudson points out that anything which a farmer can do to speed up the work will reduce the cost. All farmers who have not completed the census questionnaire should give it immediate attention so it will be ready for the census taker when he visits the farm.

Northedge Club. Funds from the drawing will be used for club projects.


