



General Pick's Army Career Is In Dire Straits

WASHINGTON, Aug. 29 (UP)—Lt. Gen. Lewis A. Pick, chief of Army Engineering, may face a Pentagon showdown on congressional charges of waste and extravagance three months before ending a 35-year military career.

Pentagon sources refused to speculate on charges that Pick will be called on the carpet by Army Secretary Frank Pace, Jr. The Defense Department said Pick is due to return here tomorrow and will resume "routine" duties.

The department denied reports that Pick had been recalled from an Alabama inspection trip for a conference on charges that he tried to mislead congressional investigation on construction of a \$300 million North African air-base project.

Pace told the Senate Preparedness subcommittee Thursday his charges will get his "utmost careful attention." He said in a letter to Chairman Lyndon B. Johnson (D-Tex.) that he had turned the subcommittee's report over to Gen. J. Lawton Collins, Army chief of staff.

The Defense Department said no meeting has been scheduled for Pick with either Pace or Collins. Pick has insisted that the subcommittee was "over critical" of the projects which the group claimed will cost hundreds of millions more than had been planned. He recently reported to Pace that two of the controversial bases could be brought up to standard for an additional \$1,160,000.

Meantime, House waste hunters reported that the Air Force has trimmed by \$87,498,000 its plans for barracks construction in the United States.

Rep. Porter Harby, Jr. (D-Va.) said the Air Force acted after his subcommittee on government spending found that 30 per cent of the planned housing actually would not be needed.

Teaser Attempts Suicide In Leap From Window

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 29 (UP)—Strip-teaser Dawn Glory Friday nursed bumps and bruises suffered when she jumped in a suicide try from the second floor of the burlesque house where she performs.

The stripper, whose real name is Dorothy Hart Barkenstock, jumped Thursday while clad only in panties and a bra.

"I did it because I want to," the statuesque red-haired dancer told police after first claiming the fall was an accident.

Comedian George Beetlepus Lewis, a friend of the girl, said she had been despondent and had lashed her wrists a week ago.

Burlesque producer Bob Biggs identified her as "Miss New Orleans of 1946."

She was hospitalized at General hospital where her injuries were reported as not serious.

Red POW Dies In Compound Disturbance

MUNSAN, Korea, Aug. 29 (UP)—The United Nations reported Friday that additional incidents at UN prison camps have resulted in the death of one prisoner and injuries to 26 others since Aug. 24.

On top of casualties announced from previous incidents, the latest report brought the July and August toll to six prisoners dead and 77 injured.

Previous reports provoked shrill protests from the Communists, whose truce negotiators demanded that the UN stop "slaughtering" prisoners.

The latest death occurred Aug. 24 in the camp at Munsan when flying rocks from a blasting explosion near an enclosure accidentally killed a prisoner of a work detail and injured another.

On Aug. 25, a South Korean guard accidentally shot a prisoner who was reported Friday to be in "satisfactory condition" at a UN hospital. The guard was disciplined.

Nine prisoners were injured in Camp No. 11 Aug. 26 when an infantry company had to move in with tear gas to break up a demonstration. Another 15 prisoners

Marines To Aid Exes To Secure Muster Out Pay

A plan for aiding present and former Marine Corps reservists in filing for "muster out" pay was announced today by Eight Marine Corps Reserve District headquarters at New Orleans.

Veterans need two forms: (1) A special application blank, and (2) the original or a certified copy of their report of separation from the service, Form DD 214.

Some reservists will be able to obtain the application blank locally, from recruiting stations of the armed forces, Veterans Administration representatives and Veterans Service offices. Many received and kept the original of their separation form.

However, a large number may lack either the application blank or the proper separation form, or both. Instructions to Marine reservists in various categories are as follows:

Members of Organized Marine Corps Reserve units may obtain application blank and certified copy of separation form from their unit.

Members of the Volunteer Reserve on inactive duty may obtain application blank from recruiting stations, VA representatives or the nearest Organized Marine Corps Reserve unit. However, application blanks as well as certified copies of separation Form DD 214 may also be obtained from the Director, Eight Marine Corps Reserve District, 632 Federal Building, New Orleans, Louisiana.

Former members of the Marine Corps Reserve who have been discharged, whether or not later reenlisted apply directly to Commandant of the Marine Corps (Code-DGK), Headquarters, U. S. Marine Corps, Washington 25, D. C. Application should be on the proper blank, and if the original of the Separation form is not available, the circumstances of loss or non-

Air Express To Celebrate It's 25th Anniversary

The air express industry celebrates the 25th birthday of the service today. L. P. Stambaugh local agent, Railway Express Agency has announced. He stated that the air express carried on the scheduled air transportation systems of the United States began operations on Sept. 1927.

From the days of the wood, wire and cloth airplane, air express service has steadily progressed, keeping pace with the tremendous growth of the air transport industry.

In 1928 the first full year of operation the total number of air express shipments carried was 17,000 and in 1951 there were 4,300,000 with a revenue of about thirty million dollars.

At the start only 26 cities were served by the airlines and today there are over 1100 air express offices in airport cities. These are closely coordinated with rail express service so that 23,000 communities throughout the country have the benefit of air express service. Air Express also extends to Alaska, Canada, Hawaii and Cuba.



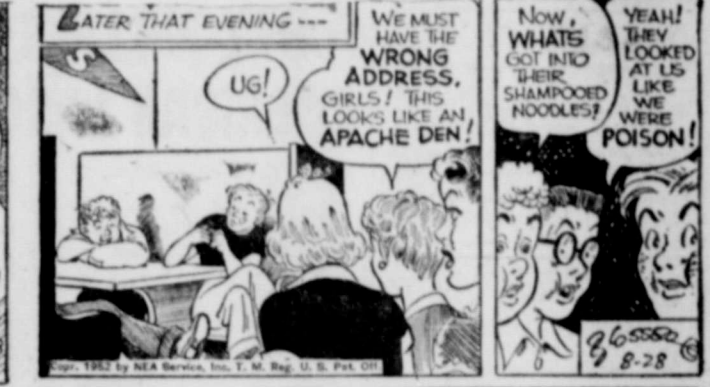
