By being conservative and not willfully wasting water now we may be able to make our supply cover the period from now until

The Bureau of Labor Statistics reported Thursday that food prices rose nine-tenths of one cent between July 28 and Aug. 15, with pork and chicken leading the way. The rise more than offset a slight drop in retail food prices between July 15 and July 28 and indicated the government's forthcoming cost of living index for the month ending Aug. 15 would hit a new high.


