**NATION'S NUMBER ONE LANDOWNER**  
**Government Owns 24 Per Cent Of All Land In United States**

WASHINGTON — The feudal lords of the Middle Ages had nothing on Uncle Sam. He now owns 24 per cent of all the land in the United States, and is adding to his holdings by leaps and bounds. The recent announcement of plans by the Federal Government to build an enormous atomic energy plant in Ohio prompted the Chamber of Commerce of the United States to look into Uncle Sam's real estate operations. According to the latest available figures, compiled by Congressman Russell V. Mack (R-Wash.), the federal land empire totals 455,145,726 acres, or 741,156 square miles. That's more land than there is in Japan, Italy, France, Germany, Belgium, The Netherlands, Switzerland, and Portugal put together. The government's holdings represent an area equal to the combined area of Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, Massachusetts, Connecticut, Rhode Island, New York, Pennsylvania, Delaware, New Jersey, Maryland and the District of Columbia. Most of the land owned by Uncle Sam is west of the Mississippi. Some of the states in that region can hardly call their land their own. In Nevada, for example, over 85 per cent is owned and managed by various Federal bureaus, with headquarters a couple of thousand miles away in Washington. The big catch in Uncle Sam's operations as a landowner according to the National Chamber, is that Uncle pays no state taxes. But private landowners, naturally do. All of which means, the Chamber says, that you pay not only your share of state taxes but for what the federal government doesn't pay. And, on top of that, you also pay extra federal taxes to support the federal bureaus which manage Uncle's holdings. Those feudal lords of long ago couldn't hold a candle to Uncle Sam when it comes to real estate and how to get it.

Pehl family of Stonewall, Texas, seven-year-old Dorothy, was admitted to the polio ward of Robert B. Green hospital Wednesday night, after undergoing a spinal tap. The Pehl children's cousin, Dorlene Engle, 10, of Luckenbach, Texas and a playmate, Marvin Klein, 13, of Stonewall, also were stricken. Staff doctors at the hospital said another Pehl cousin contracted polio after visiting in Texas several weeks ago and is hospitalized at Memphis, Tenn. Hospital officials Thursday urged epidemiologists to investigate Gillespie county where Stonewall is located. Dr. Lawrence Seller, Gillespie county health officer, said he understood the Pehl farm will be inspected for possible sources of polio such as stagnant pools. But a physician said the Pehl children probably were very susceptible to polio because they lived in a rural area and had not been exposed to polio as much as city dwellers. "When one gets it, it just ran through the others like wildfire," he said. The Klein youth became ill first. He was admitted to the hospital Aug. 17. Then Dayton Pehl, 14, was brought to the hospital on Aug. 26, followed two days later by the Engle girl. Wednesday four others of the Pehl's seven children were brought to the hospital—Dan, 15; George, 10; Elaine, 9; and Paul, Jr., 11.

**Soil Testing At A&M Continually On The Increase**

COLLEGE STATION — The soil testing laboratory operated by the Agricultural Extension Service of the Texas A&M Col-

lege System has been a busy place during the past year. According to M. K. Thornton, agricultural chemist and in charge of the lab, 9,550 soil samples have been analyzed.

He says the number of samples submitted has steadily increased since the lab was opened on Nov. 1, 1950. Determinations made by the laboratory include the amount

of organic matter, nitrogen (computed), soil reaction, available phosphoric acid, available potash, available lime and soluble salts for each sample. Recommendations for the best land use based upon the soil analysis are returned to the sender along with the report on the sample.

Thornton reminds farmers that right now is the time to submit samples from the fields on which winter legumes and small grains will be planted this fall. Thornton points out that the samples submitted must be representative of the field if they are to be of value. He encourages farmers to contact their local county agent for detailed information on how to take a representative sample.

Farmers who have submitted soil samples report that the analysis and recommendations have been very useful to them. First, they find that often times different

grades and amounts of fertilizer from that normally used are needed to improve their crop yields; that low yields are not always the result of low soil fertility and third that savings can be made on the purchase of fertilizers when only the recommended amounts are used.

Local county agents can supply details on taking, and mailing samples and can give assistance in putting the recommendations into practice, says Thornton.

**Galveston Votes Results Probed**

Galveston county authorities faced the task of opening another 53 voting machines Thursday to compare the machine vote with tally sheets in last month's hotly-contested congressional runoff between incumbent Clark W. Thompson and Sheriff T. W. "Buckshot" Lane.

The investigation into conduct of the runoff, which Thompson won by only 252 votes out of nearly 60,000 cast, opened Wednesday.

Galveston county clerk John Platte, District Judge Charles G. Dibrell and representatives for both Lane and Thompson opened 24 voting machines at Texas City and two at Dickinson.

They wrote down the figures, but haven't yet compared them with original tally sheets, which also have been impounded. Dibrell said.

Thompson, meanwhile, filed an answer Wednesday to Lane's civil court challenge of conduct of the election, filed just before he and another Wharton county citizen alleged fraud and called for an attorney general's investigation of the election.

Texas City voting machines were opened first so they would be freed by Rangers in time for a municipal election Saturday, Dibrell said.


