

By United Press The price of a shave and a hair cut, in big cities at least, has risen tenfold since the good old days of the jingle about "two bits."

A spot check by United Press showed that barbershops in many large cities now charge \$1.50 for haircut and \$1.00 for a shave. In medium-sized cities, hair cuts generally run about \$1.25 and in smaller towns \$1.00 or less. A few scattered shops still charge the 50 cents that was the pre valent haircut price before World War II, but they are hard to






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
