# 10 OPERATE ON OWN FUNDS

The Ranger City Commission last night unanimously approved an increase in the water rates for the City of Ranger to be effective October 1951.

INCREASE WILL ALLOW CITY

The raise in the minimum will up the present water rate from \$2.00 to \$2.50, an increase of fifty cents on the water rate; and raise the sewer assessment from \$0.50 to \$0.75 per month. This will make the total charge for up to three thousand gallons of water and sewer service a minimum of \$3.25 per month.

The set rate for use of water of the three thousand gallon minimum will be \$0.35 per thousand gallons up to fifty thousand gallons.





There are a lot of mighty good asons why farmers and live-lock producers should plant now applemental pastures. E. M. Trew, associate agronomist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service College Station, lists some of them

Because of the drouth, he says perennial pastures have taken a terrific beating and livestock should not be permitted to graze them until the pastures have had a chance to come back. Another mighty important rea son for planting pastures now is to supply the need for green feed. A ck of green feed or a good sub stitute over an extended period of ime can result in vitamin A defiiency and other troubles.


