# It's Legal For Demos To Write In Ike Vote

AUSTIN, Oct. 16 (UP)—Texas Attorney General Price Daniel ruled Wednesday that Texans may legally write in Eisenhower and Nixon on the Democratic ticket.

The ruling, in answer to a request from Gov. Allan Shivers, said that votes of Texans who write in the Republican nominees over the names of the Democratic candidates would be legally counted.

However, Daniel and Shivers have broken with the Democratic nominee Adlai Stevenson, over the Illinois governor's opposition

to state ownership of the tidelands, and the two Texas officials have announced they will vote for Dwight D. Eisenhower, the Republican presidential candidate.

## AMERICAN CASUALTIES MOUNTING IN KOREA

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16 (UP)—American battle casualties in Korea now total 121,154, an increase of 885 over those reported last week, the Defense Department announced Wednesday. The casualties reported include those from the beginning of the

war whose next of kin have been notified through last Friday. It normally takes from one to three weeks to notify next-of-kin, so all casualties through last Friday are not included.

We lunched with the genial truck firm head Wednesday and while we pushed scalloped potatoes and chicken fried steak into the oval cavity, Wood was pouring a torrent of interesting grid gossip into our ears—words about Ranger Junior College's mighty promising Rangers.

"But—if you think we've got a good ball club this year," Alvis was saying as he reached for another piece of cornbread, "well, just wait until '53."

We swallowed, took a swig of milk, and listened more. A stranger in Ranger we are—and lots of briefing we need.

"Guess," he asked, "how many seniors are on this year's club?" We wore our usual dumb look.

He grinned triumphantly, raised a lone index finger. "One he said with emphasis. "Just one."

"Who's that?" we wanted to know, naturally.

"Oh, and we just nodded in kind well-Till-the-doggone fashion. Brother, we thought, what a powerhouse Dan's boy Boone will have a year hence!

And while we shared the booth at the Paramount Coffee Shop with Alvis yesterday, he was telling us, with a light in his eyes, that "he was really looking forward to the return of his wife who has been attending a women's church meeting in Ft. Worth."

Area football fans will get a chance to see the new, smooth-working TCU spread formation of the Ranger Junior College Rangers in action tonight at Bulldog Stadium in Ranger when the Purple & White collegians tangle with a band of reservists from North Texas State College, Denton, in a non-conference contest.

Opening kickoff of the inter-sectional contest is scheduled for 8 p.m. sharp, and a large attendance is expected.

Fans were disappointed at the last home showing of the Rangers two weeks ago on the Navarro Junior College Bulldogs, 12-0, in the first of a series of upsets which have exploded among Pioneer Conference teams.

However, after their breath-taking 12-7 conquest of highly-rated San Angelo last Saturday night, fan interest has again mounted and a big crowd is expected to be on hand at the Ranger Bulldog grid plant for tonight's opening kickoff whistle.

The Rangers won't have any lead-pipe cinch tonight, however. Late Wednesday, the starting lineup of the NTS "B" squad was released and a check over the starting string of 11 reveals that their offensive eleven averages 196 pounds per man. Lightest starter Randall, left half, 170 and beefiest bruiser, are a trio of 215-pounders—215-pound linemen Wyse, tackle; Puryear, center; and Bryant, end.

Coach Boone Yarbrough, RJC mentor, said late today that his Purple and White charges are in fine shape for their encounter with the NTS "B" and is hoping that an early assault by his first-stringers will pile up a substantial lead so his top performers will be able to spend most of the night on the bench for a needed rest preparatory to next week's crucial homecoming tilt with the Tarleton State Pioneers in a Pioneer Conference affair.

HAMRICK'S 35-YARD PUNTING AVERAGE IS TOPS IN CIRCUIT

Individual honors in the Pioneer Conference are evenly distributed as league teams reach the half way mark of their 1952 schedules this week.

The Arlington State Rebels retain the lead in total offense with a net gain of 1,681 yards in five games. Ranger leads in running with 1,078 yards in five games but the San Angelo Rams have the best running average with a total gain of 1,043 yards in four games. The Rams' average is 260 yards per game.

Arlington State leads in passing with a total of 645 yards in five games. The Tarleton State Pioneers have the best passing average per game with a total overall gain of 528 yards in four games, an average of 132 yards per contest.

Gene Henderson, classy San Angelo quarterback, is the loop's leading runner with a total gain of 316 yards in 35 carries, an average of 9 yards per carry. Durwood Watkins of Schreiner is runner-up with 34 carries for 253 yards.

Sam Howard, Arlington State quarterback, is far in front of the passers with 37 completions out of 87 pitches for 617 yards, an average of 17.2 yards per completion. Bobby Bowmer, Conference passing champion last year, pulled into second place last week-end. Bowmer

## Lone Star Floats Largest Loan To Continue Expansion; Texas And Oklahoma Rates Been Increased

DALLAS, Oct. 16—Lone Star Gas Company Wednesday, completed a \$110 million loan with the Prudential Insurance Company of America. Proceeds from the new loan will retire the outstanding debt, help finance continuing expansion programs, and augment working capital until additional revenue is realized under the system-wide program seeking increased rates.

Eighty-five million dollars will go toward the retirement of all present outstanding funded debt, and part of the remaining \$25 million, combined with revenue derived from operations, will be used for reinforcements and additions to physical properties throughout the line of Lone Star's operating territory in Texas and Oklahoma.

The financial transaction with Prudential was described as one of the largest ever "closed" in Texas. Announcement was authorized by Lone Star President, D. A. Hulcy, of Dallas, shortly after 10 a.m. when formal "closing" ceremonies got under way in the board room of the Republic National Bank of Dallas.

The new loan bears annual interest at the rate of 3 and one-half per cent and has a term of 25 years, beginning Oct. 1, 1952.

Negotiations for the loan were conducted by D. A. Hulcy, president of Lone Star, who dealt mainly with Charles Fleetwood, of Houston, vice-president in charge of the Southwestern home office of the Prudential Insurance Company of America.

Mr. Hulcy states that the new funds from the Prudential will be used to bring the working capital up to requirement levels, in addition to increased revenues which are expected to be realized from new rates which are being "earnestly sought" throughout Lone Star's operating territory in which Lone Star serves more than 660,000 customers in 387 cities.

## US Infantryman Capture Korean Hill In Big Push

SEATTLE, Oct. 16 (UP)—American infantrymen captured "Jane Russell" hill on lowering Triangle mountain Thursday, completing a conquest that cost the Chinese Communists more than 2,500 casualties in three days of savage fighting.

A hard-hitting assault by fighting men of the Seventh division's 31st regiment battered the Chinese Reds from the hotly-contested peak and gave the UN troops all three heights on the central front hill mass—Jane Russell, Sandy hill and Triangle itself.

However, the Reds clung desperately to their last foothold on Pike's peak, a knob on the northeast corner of the mountain.

U. S. soldiers took the knob against little resistance, but the Reds counter-attacked and forced the Allied troops back 300 to 400 yards.

Estimate 2,535 Casualties

Seventh division officers estimated that in three days of fighting for Triangle, a total of 2,535 Communist soldiers was killed, wounded or taken prisoner. Only 27 were counted killed in action, but another 266 were estimated killed and 1,192 wounded.

Warplanes from six Fifth Air Force fighter-bomber units flew more than 100 sorties in support of Allied ground soldiers in the Korean area. In addition to hits on bunkers, gun emplacements, shelters and caves, pilots reported exploding Red ammunition.

South Korean troops at nearby Sniper ridge said they had "retirely well cleaned up" stray Chinese by dropping TNT charges into the mouths of caves where it was suspected the Reds were hiding.

South Korean officers estimated they killed or wounded 571 Chinese Communists in the battle for Sniper, besides capturing 50,000 rounds of small arms ammunition, 850 hand grenades and a handful of rifles and burp guns.

Mop Up on Hill

Seventh division infantrymen were "mopping up" on Jane Russell hill, scouring out surviving Red soldiers.

United Press war correspondent Fred Painton reported from the scene, however, that the Reds were "constantly" building up their forces on a northern finger leading to Triangle. He said reinforcements were believed coming from a regiment of about 3,000 men hidden in nearby foothills.

Some 700 bugle-blowing, screaming Red from the hidden regiment assailed the Americans on Triangle during the night, but got nowhere.

## Attack Broken Up

"We had good foxholes," an officer said. "Our wire was up and machineguns zeroed in. We didn't give an inch. We completely busted up the attack. We cut them down with machineguns when they got close."

Painton reported 30 UN troop carrier planes flew over the Seventh division sector in the Triangle area. There were no reports of parachute landings along the front, however, and the flight of paratroop planes was believed part of the elaborate training exercise feint which saw U. S. soldier fake an invasion on the Korean east coast Wednesday.

United Press MovieNews camera man Tom McAllen reported that seven American sailors were wounded in Wednesday's seaborne feint when a shell from a Communist shore battery splattered a U. S. destroyer with shrapnel.

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Eisenhower was campaigning in New Jersey following a swing through Texas, Louisiana and Tennessee in a bid to woo the South's traditionally Democratic votes. The GOP candidate said he "had a fine trip," during which he said a Stevenson victory Nov. 4 "might tangle us into still greater conflict" than the Korean war.

In a speech prepared for delivery on the state capitol steps in Sacramento, Calif., Stevenson said Republicans are talking at both sides of their mouths. He said they know they can't win on the GOP platform.

No Compromises Left

Mr. Truman launched a three-day whistle stop tour of New England by scoffing at published reports, attributed to Eisenhower aides, that "the Republican candidates' compromises are all behind him." In an address prepared for delivery at Hartford, Conn., Mr. Truman said Eisenhower "doesn't have much left to compromise," having already compromised his belief in foreign policy and national defense to get support from the GOP's "isolationist" wing.

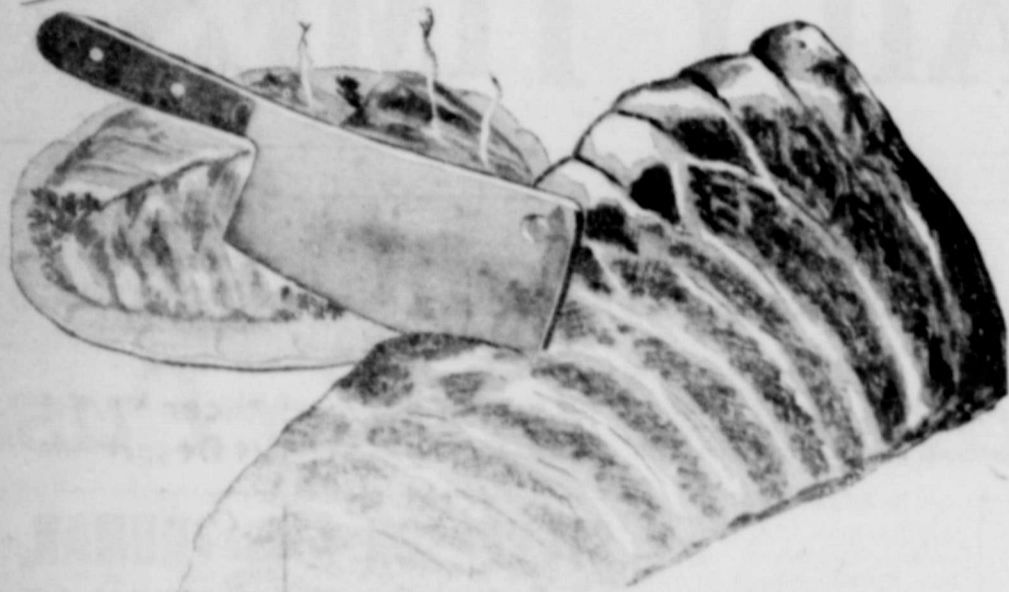

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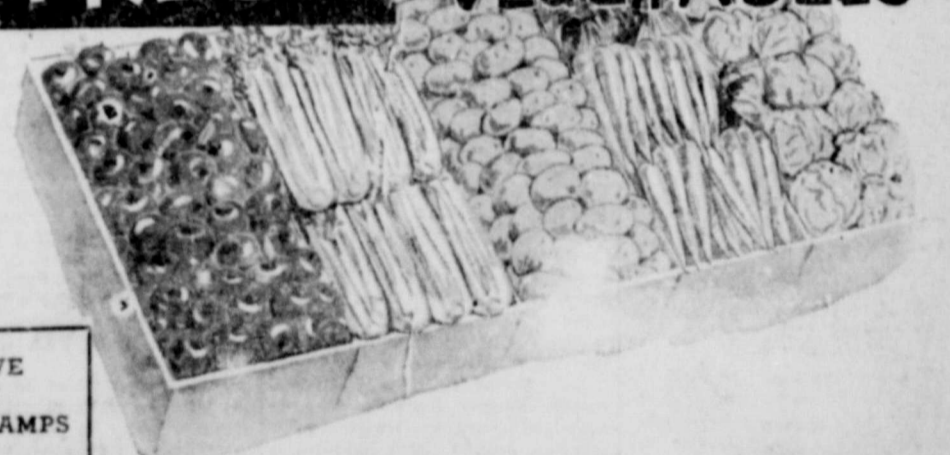

### County's Castor Bean Crop Ready For Market

Eastland county's first car load of castor beans left Carbon on Monday of this week. The beans, a new crop here, are the first ever to be grown in this county. The crop this year is somewhat short, due to the drought, yet many farmers in the southern portion of the county will harvest a fair crop.

A second car will be shelled and shipped from Carbon this week, according to E. E. Powell, of the Production Marketing Administration. Some 3,500 acres of the beans have been grown this season, and in all probability the acreage will be greatly increased next season.

The county has some 25,000 acres of peanuts, and harvesting, in a limited way, has begun. Mr. Powell reports that some farmers are baling their vines for hay, as a light frost fell in some sections of the county recently. Elsewhere the vines are still growing, and something like a half normal crop is expected.

(Continued from Page 1) and towns in Texas and Oklahoma. He pointed out that rate increases, which are greatly needed, are currently approved and are being put into effect in quite a number of cities and towns.

Mr. Puley stated that "the loan reflects great growth and development by Lone Star and while adequate rates are now being requested and needed, it is good evidence that strong financial institutions believe in the future of our company and have faith in the vast territory we serve in Texas and Oklahoma."

"Growth experienced by Lone Star since World War II," he continued, "has exceeded our predictions. We have met that growth, but it has been accomplished during a time when all costs have been constantly rising. Under these circumstances we have been required to rely substantially on long term borrowed capital, for large scale expansion."

Rapid Growth "Lone Star's growth," he pointed out, "is shown in the fact that since January 1947, net property additions have been in the amount of \$115 million and property has

been almost doubled in less than six years. Projection estimates call for expenditures of approximately \$80 million for additions to properties during the next four years."

Mr. Puley said that expansion will include construction of gathering and transmission lines, compressor stations, exploration and the drilling of wells, adding of new gas reserves, development of underground gas storage facilities, extensions and additions to local gas distribution systems, "all of which will enable the company to meet the demands for its service."

"During the past year," the Lone Star president stated, "Lone Star has added more than 59,000 new customers. A gas utility like ours must install distribution mains and other facilities before homes are completed and occupied. Conservation Of Water Now Given Thought

Texas is experiencing its worst drought in history, more devastating than those of 1916-18, 1932-34 and even the record breaker of 1885 to 1887 according to U. S. Soil Conservation Service. On the eve of the eighth annual convention of the Texas Water Conservation Association, which opens a three-day session next Sunday at Mineral Wells, the president sees an even more insidious catastrophe for Texas than the recurring droughts.

"I refer to the 'paramount rights' theory of the United States Supreme Court," Judge Guy C. Jackson of Anahuac, the Association's president, said today. "Texans, generally speaking, are a brave breed of hardy folk who have come up the hard, rocky way and can take drought, floods and other natural disasters in stride. We are making progress in our plans to conserve our water so as to be prepared for recurring droughts."

But "paramount rights," Judge Jackson said, "is the medium the federal government expects to use to get its feet in the door of every property owner and finally to walk right on in and tell us what they expect to do with our property."

"It was these two words 'paramount rights' that a minority of the United States supreme court used to kick us in the face with and endeavor to steal our Texas lands. It was the same two words the federal government used when it told 14,000 farmers in California that the government owned the water on their lands. 'Texans can't forever laugh off these threats. Some of them tell us to even go ahead and vote for candidates for president and vice-president who say they are for the paramount right theory. I say in all seriousness we may be running out of time on ever getting another opportunity to vote for candidates who are against this pernicious theory," Jackson said.

Overloading, operator faulty equipment and improperly registered trucks accounted for the greater number of arrests. The law fixes the maximum gross allowable on Texas highways at 55,420 pounds, but according to the reports, loads have been apprehended weighing over 130,000 pounds. An Austin trucking firm was fined \$49 in Justice Court at Round Rock last June when caught with a truck and load weighing 130,100 pounds.

The total operating cost during the past year for the License and Weight Division, including equipment, traveling expenses and salaries for the 65 men was less than \$456,999 approved by the 52nd Legislature for this type of highway protection. As a result of the highway law violation cases filed by the department, the counties and State road funds were enriched to the tune of \$1,322,113.

D. C. Greer, State Highway Engineer, said the State was losing approximately seven millions dollars a year because truck owner register their vehicles for smaller loads than they are actually hauling on the highways. Major Odum's report also shows truck owners paid County Tax Collectors \$867,000 in addition

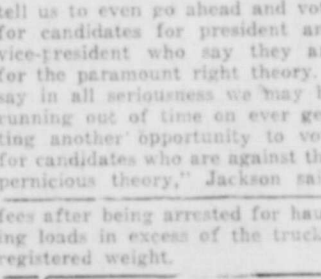

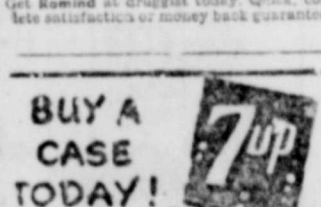

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**Foreign Boxers Dominate New NBA Rating List**

WASHINGTON, (UP) — The National Boxing Association's quarterly ratings showed a distinct foreign flavor with U. S. fighters heading only four of the eight weight divisions.

Noting that few new American names appear on its list, the NBA blamed television for curbing the development of young boxers in the U.S.

The NBA pointed out that television is killing off small fight clubs to such an extent that the young boxers in many parts of the country have no place to learn the game or build a professional reputation.

**Many Foreign Titles**

NBA President George A. Barton explained foreign fighters have advanced to the forefront so fast that the welterweight title currently is held by Cuba, the lightweight championship by Mexico, the bantamweight crown by South Africa and the flyweight title by Japan.

Adding to the foreign dominance was the fact that all three logical contenders for Ray Robinson's middleweight championship are from outside the U.S. while the No. 1 featherweight challenger is Ray Farnoch of France.

The NBA recommended two bouts — one between Fernando Gagnon of Quebec and Pappy Gault of South Carolina to determine a challenger for the bantamweight title now held by Vic Towell of South Africa, and another bout between Black Pico of Cuba
