Arrangements for the Castro County Fair moved right along this week, with considerable interest being shown by committees and officers.

Dog Show Will Be Held After Fair Parade

The dog show idea held in the past in connection with the county fair, has been revived and will be held this year under the directorship of Edd C. McLeroy, farm representative of the first State Bank.

The dog show will be held immediately after the fair parade makes its rounds Saturday morning. The parade starts at 10 o'clock, so the dog show should start about 10:30. McLeroy urged all dog-owning children, 16-years-old and under to be on hand and lead their dog in the parade. The dog show will be held on the east side of the courthouse square and an out-of-town judge will be obtained.

White Girl, 16, In County Jail For Prostitution

A 16-year-old white girl, the wife of a migratory field hand, is being held in Castro County jail pending word from her parents and husband somewhere in California.

She was apprehended following several acts of prostitution at Mexican labor camps over the county.

According to the Sheriff's office, the girl, her husband, and her parents worked for a while in Castro County recently. During this period the girl began associating with a Mexican man, Robert Lopez. The parents and husband then loaded up and left for California, leaving the girl behind.

Shortly thereafter, Lopez began procuring for the girl from among Mexican laborers. He was fined \$200 and costs in county court and sentenced to 30 days in jail for soliciting. Another companion, Angel Chapa, was charged and fined for vagrancy.

Mrs. Rawlings Named Acting Postmaster Here

Tom Bice Retiring On September 18th After Long Service

Mrs. Tina Rawlings, a long-time Dimmitt resident, has been appointed acting postmaster of the Dimmitt Post Office to replace Thomas F. Bice, who retires in two weeks.

Mrs. Rawlings will assume her new duties Saturday, September 19th. Mr. Bice's last day will be the preceding Friday.

Mr. Bice said this week it is a "peculiar feeling" to be leaving the postmaster's job after so many years in Dimmitt. He has no plans at present concerning his future.

Mrs. Rawlings is well-known in Dimmitt, having lived here since 1936. She operated Dimmitt Drug Store, now known as Bond Pharmacy from 1936 until 1949 when she sold out to Don Gladman. In 1942 Mr. and Mrs. Rawlings purchased the hotel they now operate from Arthur Haddaway.

"I plan to devote my full time to the work of acting postmaster," Mrs. Rawlings said this week, "and I will have no concern for any other business interests."

Mrs. Rawlings and her husband, J. C. Rawlings, have two daughters, Mrs. Jack Rogers of Midland and Mrs. Billy Jones of Dimmitt. Mrs. Rawlings holds a bachelor of science degree from Knox College in Galesburg, Illinois.

She will be the acting postmaster until such time as a civil service examination is given applicants for the position of postmaster. At present the time of this test is not known. It will be set at the discretion of the Post Office Department.

Bus Rides Free To High Plains Station Tours

Two buses will be provided to take visitors from Castro County to the High Plains Station Field Day at Halfway on September 24.

According to Steve Taylor, one of the local directors of the Station and the man who is arranging for the trip, the buses will hold 82 people and will be furnished by New Mexico Transportation Company.

There will be no charge made for the trip, Taylor said, and anyone, farmer or businessman, is welcome to make use of the buses. They will leave about noon September 24th, early enough to take part in the guided tours of the station which begin at 1:30 p.m.

Those riding the buses will be treated to a free barbecue supper at 6:30 before returning to Dimmitt. The buses will leave from the Courthouse Square.

Local businesses which are connected directly with the farming industry are paying for the buses, Taylor said. The names of these firms will be made public later.

This will be the third annual field day for the station. Staff members and scientists from the Extension service, soil conservation service, Texas Experimental Station and agricultural representatives of commercial companies will be at designated stops to discuss the research being conducted. The tours will cover such experimental research as cotton fertilization, grain sorghum varieties and fertilization experiments, irrigation efficiency on cotton, re-charge well and bench levelling, cotton skiprow and interplanting, soybean fertilization and rate of seeding and row spacing tests, castor bean variety and fertilizer tests.

Last Rites For Mr. Mark Cowser, Pioneer Businessman, Here Friday

Funeral services for Mark Matthew Cowser, 85, will be held Friday, September 11, in Dennis Memorial Chapel at 3 p.m. Rev. Darris Egger, First Methodist Church will officiate. Interment will be in the Castro Memorial Gardens.

Mr. Cowser, a resident of 300 SW 4th in Dimmitt, was visiting a daughter in Roscoe when he became ill. He was taken to a hospital in Sweetwater where he died at 2:10 p.m. on Wednesday, September 9. He was born on October 5, 1874 in Ukiah, California and was married to Minta Rayner on March 10, 1897 who predeceased him in death on April 28, 1948.

A long-time resident and businessman of Castro County, Mr. Cowser was a self-trained lawyer and abstractor who was appointed to be the first county attorney in 1909. His abstract business, in which his son Jack Cowser became associated with him in 1942, is the second oldest business in Castro County.

Mr. Cowser is survived by four daughters, two sons, 14 grandchildren, and nine great grandchildren. The daughters are Mrs. C. B. (Helen) Killgore of Roscoe, Texas; Mrs. Charles (Mary) Scheeling of Houston; Mrs. Hugh (Josephine) Russell of Corpus Christi; Mrs. Harold (Norma) Gladman of Dimmitt. The sons are Ray Cowser of Hereford, and Jack Cowser of Dimmitt.

Tenant Provision In Conservation Reserve Changed

Castro County ASC office has received a notice of change concerning the tenant provision on applications to participate in the 1960 Conservation Reserve Program.

The previous regulations stated that no land with tenant history during 1958 or 1959 would be eligible unless a tenant participated in the contract.

Under the new regulations, land with tenant history can be placed in the reserve without the tenant participating in the contract provided the tenant left the land of his own free will. In cases of this type a statement must be furnished by the tenant that he did leave the farm of his own free will.

Any questions concerning this provisions should be directed to the ASC office.

Sept. 30 Deadline For Conservation Rates

September 30 is the final date for farmers to apply for payment rates under the 1960 Conservation Reserve Program. Although the drought in 1953 and 1956 affects the payment rates drastically, the ASC office urges any farmer who is interested in the program to apply for rates. These applications are not binding and a farmer can make up his mind after the committee has set the rate.

Farmers applying for rates need to furnish the crop record and yields for the land offered for the years 1955 through 1958.

Farm Bureau Sponsors Talks Here By Bangs Disease Experts Saturday

The Castro County Farm Bureau will meet at the local office Saturday night at 8 o'clock to hear talks brucellosis, better known as bangs in the cattle industry.

The present legislature has provided a law passed during this session to clean brucellosis out of the counties in Texas, although the disease problem in this area is not as great as the eastern area of the state. However as a result of our disease problem, we have a difficult marketing problem. All the counties in the United States that are in a certified area, have stringent rules covering animals. These rules cover the counties that originate in brucellosis infected areas. The extra expense of shipping Texas cattle into out-of-state markets occasioned by these restricted result in a steadily declining market for our crop of susceptible and feeder cattle. The majority of our competition in the western states have an edge in that they have already achieved a modified certified status.

High Plains Water Dist. Reports Less Tail-Water Waste

The High Plains Underground Water Conservation District reports that the waste of agricultural "tail-water" within the bounds of the District is not nearly so pronounced this year as it has been in years past; however, the District adds that there is still room for needed improvement.

District officials state that waste of agricultural water is not only unwise from an economic standpoint but that other implications are involved as well.

First, if waste of irrigation water is tolerated additional pumping costs are involved. The cost of pumping and distributing water is ultimately unused results in higher operating costs which unnecessarily cut into annual profits.

Secondly, waste of irrigation water requires of the landowner a part of his capital investment for which he receives no monetary return. When irrigated farm land purchased, the water in storage beneath the farm represents a very real and actual part of the market price of the farm. Consequently, when a portion of the water is pumped but is not used to produce a crop, which in turn produces income, then the expenditure of that part of the capital investment returns zero dollars. The landowner has given away a part of his original investment.

Thirdly, and perhaps the most important implication involved in the waste of irrigation water, is the effect it has politically. In Texas underground water is private property. However, there are many persons from throughout the state that believe underground water should be owned by the state government and be apportioned to various users of underground water in quantities determined adequate by a central controlling agency. It can readily be seen that irrigated agriculture could perhaps be in a most disadvantageous position should an appropriate doctrine be advanced in Texas. In other state that have doctrines of public ownership of water resources, municipal and industrial water uses are generally deemed to more necessary uses than are agricultural uses. Consequently, waste of agricultural irrigation water is dangerous because it weakens efforts to maintain private ownership of underground water.

The High Plains Water District asks that each irrigator think about these implications of waste and then devise a plan whereby he can use for beneficial purposes all the underground water pumped to the surface from beneath his land.

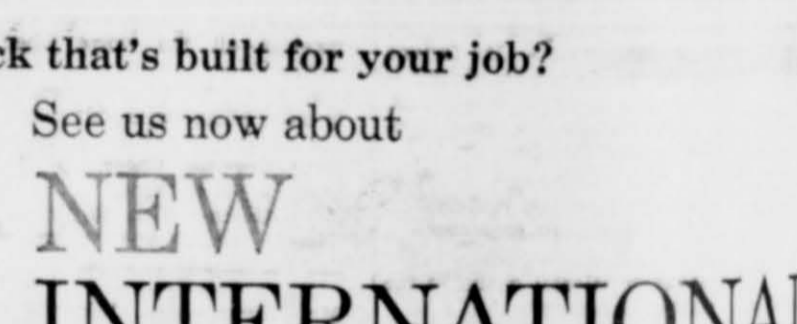

Your Fire Department was not called on to extinguish any fires in the past week. BUSINESS IS SLOW AND WE LIKE IT. We had our regular business meeting on Thursday night the third of September. There were nineteen members present for the meeting. We set the date for our annual Fireman of the Year Supper to be held on Thursday night September 24, and a lengthy discussion was held on procurement of new members for the department.

Since a paid fireman was hired by the City Commission on May 1, 1959, you Insurance Key Rate has been lowered from \$32 to \$22 or a reduction of \$10. According to State laws, we can lower the key rate only if we have more than a minimum of \$20. This factor along with a sustained low fire loss will mean a great savings to the people of Dimmitt in Fire Insurance. You will be able to purchase a great deal more protection for the same premium, but this will hold true only as long as we hold our fire losses down, so each of us should do his part and more be careful and become more fire conscious and help us to maintain this city one of the lowest fire insurance rate cities in the State. There were no insured fire losses reported during the month of July and only one small Insured Claim during the month of August, but the months to come during the winter season is the time when the greatest fire hazards because of the greater use of heating facilities but if these facilities are properly checked and maintained, the hazard becomes less. Each of you should begin now to get your furnaces checked and cleaned out before lighting them and those of

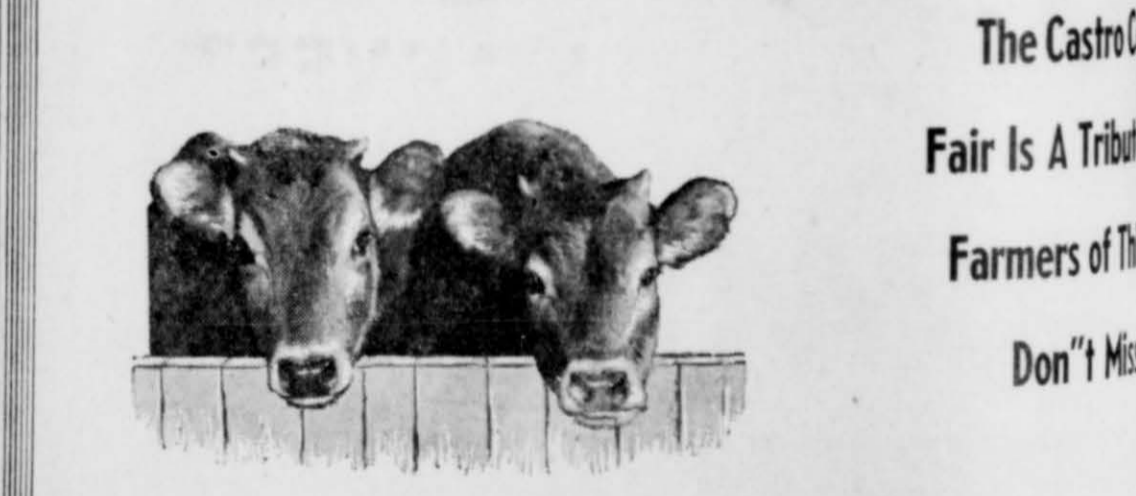

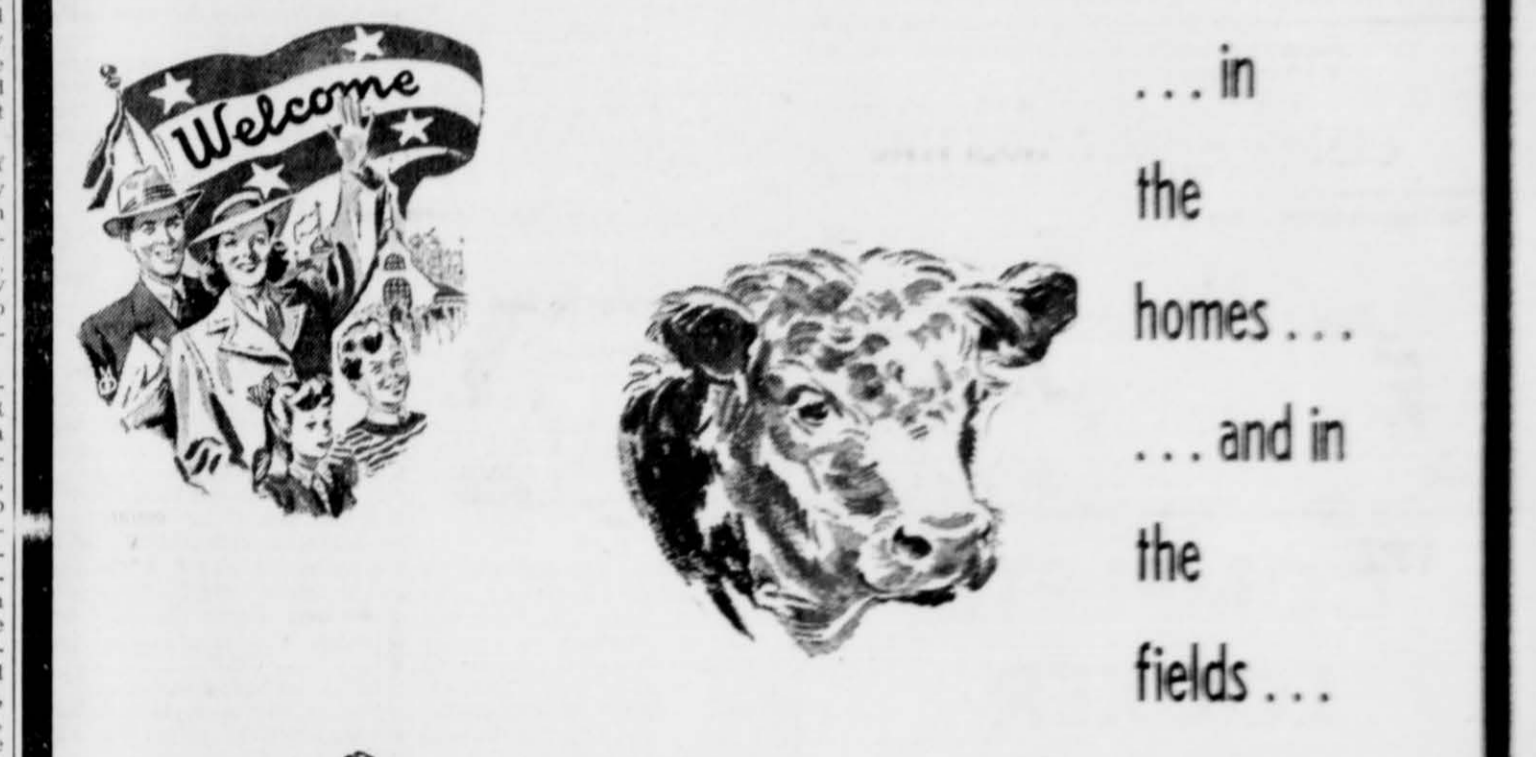

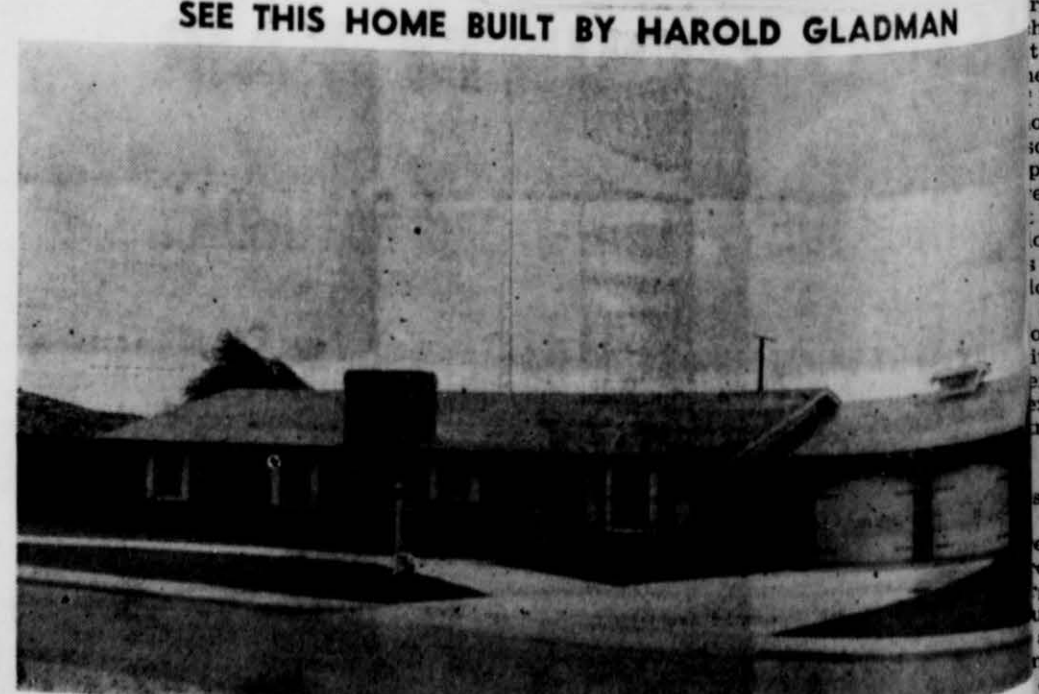
