16-year-old white girl, the wife of a migratory field hand, is being held in Castro County jail pending word from her parents and husband somewhere in Calif-




Local businesses which are connected directly with the farming industry are paying for the buses, Taylor said. The names of these firms will be made public later. This will be the third annual field day for the station. Staff members and scientists from the Extension service, soil conservation Service, Texas Experimental Station and agricultural representatives of commercial companies will be at designated stops to discuss the research being conducted. The tours will cover such experimental research as cotton fertilization, grain sorghum varieties and fertilization experiments, irrigation efficiency on cotton, recharge well and bench levelling, cotton skiprow and interplanting, soybean fertilization and rate of seeding and row spacing tests, easter bean variety and fertilizer tests.
