# Ike Carries County!

#### **GOP** Nominee **Wins Terrific Eastland Vote**

Dwight D. Elsenhewer carried Eastland County by a large maj-ority in Tuesday's general election and became the first Republican presidential candidate in history to carry the normally solidly Democratic area.

Although the state of Texas went Republican for the GOP candidate Herbert Hoover back in 1928, Eastland County remained loyal to the Democratic party.

Cisco and Eastland gave Eisenhower heavy majorities over his opponent, Gov. Adlai Stevenson of Illinois, but Ranger's two boxes went Democratic during the day's balloting which brought out a record number of voters in the county's 26 precincts.

Ex-president Herbert Hoover carried Texas over his Democratic opponent, Gov. Alfred E. Smith of New York, in 1928.


**Contracts For New Water Supply**

All preliminary construction details and plans, including acquisition of land needed for the big project are progress-ing at a rapid rate, the board members announced, and actual work may begin around December 1, a few days after the contract is let.






