CITY CLEAN UP CAMPAIGN GOOD FOR HEALTH OF COMMUNITY

Austin, Texas—A good old fash-ioned spring house cleaning in every city and community in Texas would do a great deal toward furthering good health in this state, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, who said in Austin today,"From a practical standpoint the old adage that 'Cleanliness is next to Godliness' is still well worth emphasizing."

A general clean-up program of state-wide proportions with the ob-jective of bettering health conditons for our citzenship should include surface cleaning, drainage. the graveling of streets and alleys, the cleaning of all parks and play. grounds and the clearing of weeds and rubbish off vacant lots.

"The destruction of mosquito breeding places and rat harborage, the proper disposal of garbage and trash and the eneral cleaning up of all premises will be," said Dr. moval of all waste matter in and around yards and homes in order to abate the danger of such diseases, and insure good health protection throughout the State.



This means that your farm equipment dealers must operate from now on, on a 20 percent less working margin than they had before May 10, 1946.

This means that your service dealer, even though his operating costs have mounted tremendously during this war period, must operate on a lesser margin than he had during World War II. When all other industries nationwide were demanding increases for their products, your farm equipment retailers did not ask for any increase.

This decrease means that many of your farm equipment retailers will be forced to curtail the services that have made it possible for you to operate during these emergency periods with many obsolete machines even when new repair parts were not available.
