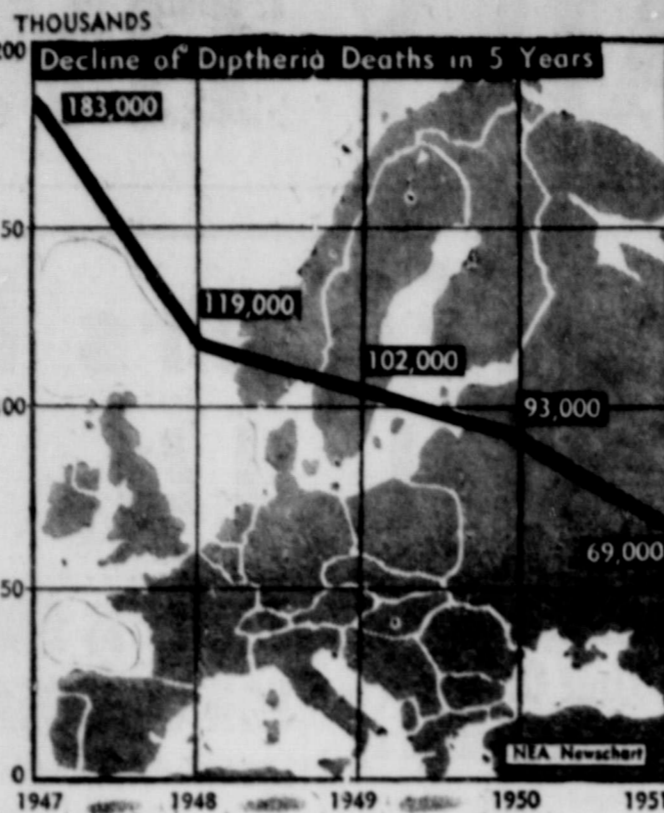

All packages should be securely wrapped and packed in mailable containers that will not crush. Corrugated boxes are good. Pack articles solidly so that nothing is loose. Tie with good, strong twine. For an extra Christmas touch wrap each article separately in Christmas wrapping paper and attach a few seals or ribbons. Boxes will only get washed, so place ribbon on flatly. Some suggested articles for these air-mail packages are: any sort of reading material, pocket-size books, magazines, fruit cakes, candy, cookies, snapshots, of the home folks, film, hand warmers but not the fluid. White gasoline may be used in the warmers, and it is used on army field ranges. Inflammable material may not be sent through the mails.

Feeding Hints Are Offered For Stock Raisers: The stage is set for another winter of narrow nutritive margins for livestock. The continuing drought is responsible, says C. M. Patterson, veterinarian for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, for conditions that can cause trouble for livestock producers unless corrective measures are taken. Animals during the past month, have had little chance to build up reserves of vitamin A for carrying them through the winter and according to Patterson, it appears that conditions are becoming favorable for the recurrence of "white-muscle disease." This disease caused heavy livestock losses last winter in the northeast fourth of the state. Patterson warns that unless rations of pastured animals are supplemented, with vitamin A rich feeds, respiratory troubles will increase as changes in the weather become more sudden. If the lack of rainfall prevents the growing of winter grazing crops, green hay or vitamin A enriched concentrates must be supplied. In addition to bronchitis and pneumonia prevention, the veterinarian points out that vitamin A also plays a very important role in animal reproduction. The large number of aborted, still-born or weak and deformed calves cropped last spring, he adds, was a direct result of the lack of green feed last fall and winter.

The condition known as "white-muscle disease" also results from dry weather. A deficiency of vitamins A, E and C, ordinarily furnished in ample amounts by native forages, develops as a result of disturbed processes of storage of vitamin E in the cured grass and the inability of the animals to store normal amounts of other vitamins during the periods when grass is ordinarily green and succulent. The lack of these essential nutrients, points out the veterinarian, prevents the normal metabolic processes which are essential to the proper functioning of the muscles. As a result of this interference, muscle tissues, primarily of the rear legs, loins and heart, degenerate causing paralysis and usually death of the affected animal. Dr. Patterson urges livestock producers to plant crops for winter grazing but if moisture is not sufficient for growth of these crops, then, he says, other sources of supplies must be provided. He recommends the feeding of good quality hay, silage and or vitamin A enriched concentrates.

Each morning, Father Willnets dons a rough shirt, trousers and cap and drives 35 children some 25 miles into New Straitsville to



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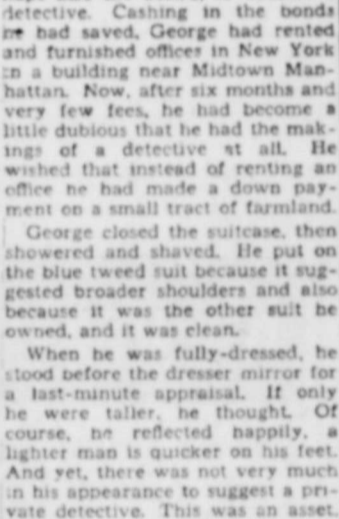
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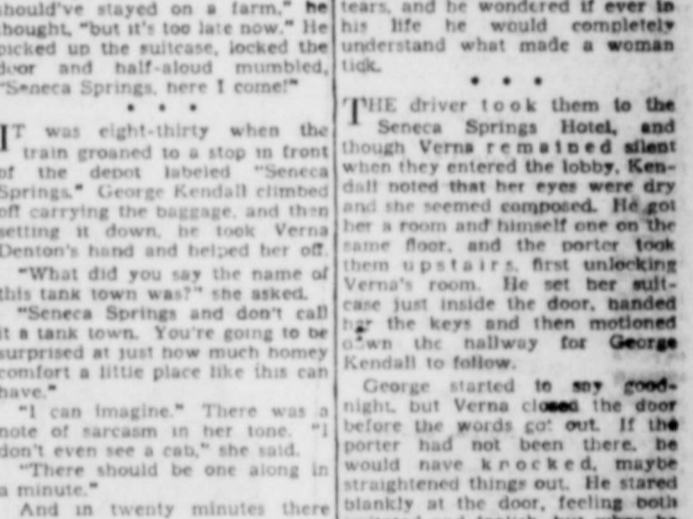

Here's a dish that has a winning way with left-over roast beef and plenty of good vegetables. It's practically a meal in itself, and it takes so little time to prepare.

Your meat pie with corn bread topping can be served at the table in its baking dish. As the serving spoon breaks through the corn bread crust, you'll love the wonderful aroma that greets you, and really welcome the good flavor that has been sealed in by the corn bread. There will be no cold second helpings because the corn bread tends to hold the heat in.

Meat Pie With Corn Bread Topping
(A good way to use left-over meat and vegetables.)

Filling:
1 cup cooked, diced carrots
1 cup cooked, diced celery
1/2 cup cooked peas

Topping:
1 tablespoon grated onion
3 cups diced left-over roast beef
2 cups celery
1/2 cup corn meal
1/2 cup flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon baking powder
1 egg yolk
1/2 cup milk
1 tablespoon melted butter or margarine

(If self-rising corn meal and flour are used, omit salt and baking powder.)

Combine all filling ingredients in a 1 1/2-quart greased casserole. Sift together corn meal and other dry ingredients. Combine beaten egg yolk, milk, and melted fat. Add to dry ingredients, mixing only until moistened. Pour batter evenly over meat and vegetables in casserole. Bake in a 400° F. oven, for 20 to 25 minutes, until the corn bread just starts to shrink from the sides of the casserole. Yield: 6 servings.
