New Law Says No Livestock On Highway

Safety reminded Texas cattle owners today that a new law went into effect July 1 aimed at controlling

The new law makes it illegal for a person knowingly to permit his mestic livestock to roam at large with anything they can they are not guilty of such offenses eral highways. It applies regardless of whether or not the highway right-of-way is fenced. Maximum

> Farm to market roads are excepted from the law. The new aw also gives law enforcement officers the authority to have such livestock picked up, when unable to locate the owner, and turned over the sheriff or constable in the

The law does not prohibit the driving or hearding of livestock across or along the highways. It gives peace officers the authority enforce provisions of the act without a warrant.

Average Farm Workday was 10.1 **Hours on June 1**

Texas farmers and ranchers had an average workday of 10 hours, 6 minutes on June 1, according to the U.S. Department of Agricul-

That's half-hour less than the average for farmers in all states of the nation, more than two hours less than the Wisconsin farm workday, but a full hour more than Nevada and Florida farmers put in. This was brought out in the farm labor report issued by USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service, based on reports from federal-state Crop Reporting Service

offices in each state. The national average was 10.6 lours. Wisconsin led with 12.2 hours, while Nevada and Florida were lowest with 9.1 hours, Colorado farmers averaged 11.2 hours; Kansas, 10.9; New Mexico, 10.7;

Farm operators in the nation average about an hour more each day than their hired hands.

Seasonal length of the farm workday has changed very little in this area during the last three years, although a slowness in the rop season was evident in some locations when the June 1 survey was made. The June 1 average for Texas in 1950 was 11.6 hours, In the war year of 1943, it was 12.8 55 Cents Per Hour
