Seeks To Confirm **Einstein Theory**

Albert Einstein's theories about the sun and stars may be verified

The exacting work is being done by Prof. George A. Van Biesbroeck, a member of the Yerkes Ob-servatory staff at the University plates here to use Yale's precision measuring engine, the largest on of its kind in the country.

Einstein in 1916 proposed that stars are not always where they seem to be because the gravitaional pull of the sun bends starlight on its way to earth. As a esult, an observer on earth sees the stars in an incorrect position in relation to the sun.


