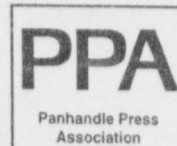

Lazbuddie graduation set

Lazbuddie High School's graduation exercises will be held at 8 p.m. Friday.

The bittersweet occasion for graduates will feature speeches by valedictorian Josh Morris, salutatorian Shena Seaton and historian Seth Black.

Morris, the son of Melvin and Vickie Morris, maintained a 96.75 grade-point average. He plans to attend Texas A&M University.

Seaton's GPA was a point lower, at 95.69, to earn her salutatorian honors. She is the daughter of Rick and Mandi Seaton and will be attending Oklahoma State University.

The class historian is Seth Black. The son of Ricky and Sarah Black carried a 94.99 GPA and will attend Angelo State University.

Recipe for a chile preserve

The feds have the hots for a chile. In a move called the first of its kind, the Forest Service will create a 4-square-mile wilderness reserve in southern Arizona's Coronado National Forest for the wild chiltepine chile.

Preservation of the hot pepper will assure searchers an opportunity to expose how its fiery chemicals work and how they may aid medicine, experts said.

The chiltepine, an ancient plant known to Incas, Aztecs and Mayans, is a wild relative of virtually all common commercial peppers, including jalapeños and serranos.

Scientists have discovered that an ingredient called capsaicin may be a potent insecticide and could help treat indigestion, arthritis and mouth cancer.

The preserve, 50 miles south of Tucson, will be dedicated in June.

Weevil eradication office in high gear

Terry Futch has been hired to run the Boll Weevil Eradication Program's zone office in Muleshoe, and remodeling is under way on the district office near the old airport.

Futch has been with the program since 1996, first as a district supervisor in Haskell and then as assistant zone manager there.

Previously, he farmed cotton for about 14 years, he said.

Futch said Friday that he is already hiring his staff. "Right now, we have our district supervisors — one for Littlefield and Springlake, Ronald Hardin (he'll have two districts); Rodney Smith in Friona and Kevin Grant in Muleshoe.

He said there were more than 50 applicants and "we got the cream of the crop up here."

"We're interviewing field monitors and should have them hired by next week. We hope to have them at work by June 1," he said.

Each one will be responsible for monitoring weevils on 300,000 acres, he added.

"We're also interviewing for a zone secretary. We have five interviews today and will get them to work as soon as possible," Futch said.

"If there's anybody still interested and wants to apply, we'd like to consider them," he said.

City grant to aid dairy expansion

The city of Muleshoe has approved a \$150,000 economic development grant to help with the expansion of Boehning Dairy Farms east of town.

Susie Pierce, the city's economic development director, said the dairy plans a \$1 million expansion project plus adding 1,500 cows at that cost.

She said the project is expected to add 15 jobs in addition to retaining the current 10.

She added that these are viewed as permanent jobs and won the board's support "due to the fact that they (Boehning) are very much being targeted by other communities, plus the fact that we have really targeted dairies."

She said the contract with the dairy will require quarterly reports to be filed with the city for a year after the year-long expansion period, for a total of two years.

The money will not be paid until the expansion is complete, Pierce said.

She added that the dairy project provided a greater incentive to help than did the boll weevil program offices, which will provide a shot in the arm for the local economy but may not be long-term.

Fathers' Day Festival gearing up June 18-20

Judging from past years' response, it's a safe bet that the crowds and the good times will be there for Muleshoe's fourth annual Father's Day Festival on June 18-20.

The big draw is a softball tournament. Alberto Daniel, one of the organizers, said Thursday that nine teams entered last year's tournament, coming from Hereford and places in New Mexico. He has had people come from Lubbock and Lamesa, too, he added.

Aside from the ball games, the festival features music and food.

For the second straight year, the city of Muleshoe is kicking in \$1,000 in hotel-motel tax revenue to help promote the event. Two years ago, the city began helping out by paying for \$831 in advertising.

In this year's letter to the city asking for the promotional help, Daniel stated that the tournament usually

draws about 750 people and the festival itself another 200.

While no specific figures are available, Mayor Robert Montgomery told the city council before approval of this year's funding that "obviously there are people who come and stay the three days."

Before the council voted, Councilor Juan Chávez expressed concern that the requests for funding from the hotel-motel tax increase each year, adding that the council should exercise some caution about approving increases for everyone.

City Manager Rick Hanna agreed, but said the fund had a balance of about \$27,000 before expenditures were made for Cinco de Mayo and the doll show.

"As Rick said, there's a lot of pressure on this account, and we need to be fair to everyone," Montgomery said.

This year's winners include:

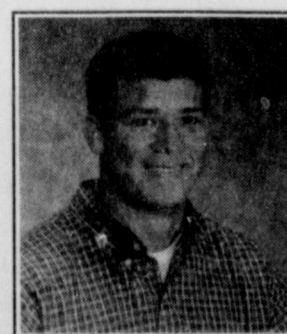

SPC to conduct law enforcement classes

LEVELLAND — South Plains College's law enforcement program will offer two law enforcement short courses, "Intermediate Use of Force" and "Intermediate Child Abuse Investigation." Both will be taught at the Morton Activity Building.

"Intermediate Use of Force" will focus on laws pertaining to use of force, chapter 9 of the Texas Penal Code and case law involving liability of officers in situations where force is used. The class is required for intermediate certification by the Texas Commission of Law Enforcement Officers Standards and Education. Cost for the class is \$15 and it will be taught from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. June 3 and 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. June 4. Advance registration is required.

"Intermediate Child Abuse Investigation" provides 24 hours of TCLEOSE credit. Topics include the nature, cause and effects of child abuse and neglect; investigative strategies; and responsibilities of the law enforcement officer. The class will be offered from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. July 6-8. Cost is \$24 and registration deadline is July 5.

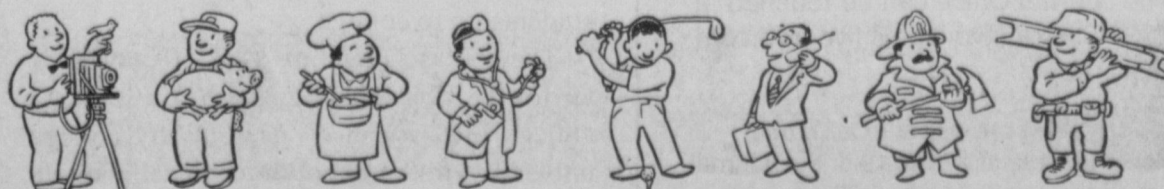

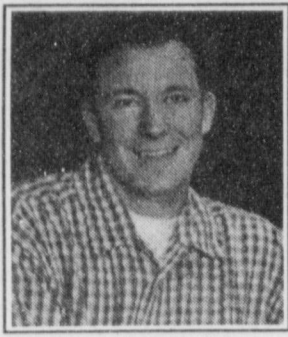

Writer decrys politics in Three Way School Board decision

My husband and I, along with several others, attended the board meeting held at Three Way School on May 13.

We were there in support of my brother, Bud Holmes, and his wife, Venus. It didn't take us long to figure out that "justice" was not going to be served that night.

The meeting was scheduled to start at 6 p.m. A little after 6 p.m., the superintendent came to the door and invited us in. Chairs were brought in to accommodate the crowd.

As soon as everyone was seated, the president of the board said he was going to call the meeting into executive session and all of us would have to leave.

Bud and Venus were given 20 minutes each to state their case before the board — which was not anywhere near enough time to explain all the problems they've had. The board then went into closed session.

We were made to wait outside until a little after 9 p.m., when we were once again "invited" in.

A motion was asked for on each of the grievances. The board member whose daughter was part of the original problem, along with the daughter of the superintendent, made both motions to deny the grievances. Somehow, this seems to be a slight conflict of interest to me.

Bud and Venus asked for this meeting to be open to the public. They wanted everybody to hear the whole story, but the board decided against that. The superintendent says he can't comment on this because of "employee's rights." What "rights"? So far, they haven't had any.

Telling the real story would not be to the superintendent's best interest.

The sad part is, this should have never reached this point, and wouldn't have, if these two fathers had only admitted their daughters were in the wrong.

Bud and Venus are an honest, hardworking couple who have two young sons to support. They have been an asset to the Three Way community since 1988 when Bud went to work at

the school as head of transportation and maintenance.

He has put in many hours of over time without extra pay and has done a good job. This was never taken into consideration.

Someday, this superintendent will move on to greener pastures not caring about the mess he's left behind. However, these board members will still be around to face their neighbors and explain how a thing like this could happen. The community is suffering and so is the school. People no longer feel they can depend on the board's help if a problem arises, especially if this problem involves the superintendent.

I'd like to thank Murray Davis for having the courage to vote in favor of Bud and Venus. Mr. Davis, your vote was much appreciated.

As for the rest of the board, have you ever read Deuteronomy 5:20? Personally, I'm working on "forgiveness." It's really hard to sit back and see a few people

try to destroy my brother's life and not hold a grudge. As I said, I'm working on it and with God's help, I'll make it.

Hanna also stressed that there are tough state regulations regarding paying out from the fund, but if Chicanos Unidos — the organization sponsoring the Father's Day events — has federal recognition as a 501(c)3 organization, all it needs to do is present receipts for reimbursement.

Mayor Pro Tem Cliff Black made the motion to approve \$1,000 for the June event rather than the \$1,250 Daniel had requested, and the council voted unanimously to do that.

white quail populations," said Dr. Dale Rollins, Extension wildlife specialist based in San Angelo.

"We conducted a series of quail appreciation days at four West Texas sites last October and the response was overwhelmingly positive.

"Those who attend will be updated on wildlife research, they'll learn how to troubleshoot habitat problems that can affect quail populations, and they'll engage in hands-on activities such as quail necropsies, dummy nest transects and plant identification."

Quail and quail hunting are valuable resources for Texas landowners, Rollins noted.

"Texas is one of the last strongholds for wild quail hunting. By hosting these quail appreciation days, we help ensure that farmers, ranchers and landowners appreciate the value of good quail habitat as a potential revenue stream," he said. "In some cases, for example, landowners may be able to earn more revenue from a quail hunting lease than from a livestock grazing lease."

The Texas Rolling Plains is renowned for its quail habitat and hunting, but Rollins cautioned landowners not to become complacent about wildlife and habitat management.

"A good quail crop is really a tenuous situation. Everything

has to hit just right to produce a bumper population, but there are some things landowners can do to help this species flourish," Rollins said. "Landowners and land managers can learn these techniques and how to work with Mother Nature to promote wildlife at our June 1 appreciation day."

Registration for Quail Appreciation Day costs \$10 per person on until Monday and \$20 per person thereafter. This fee covers lunch, refreshments and handout materials, the specialist said.

I've been singing that refrain a lot lately as I've been juggling

sprinklers to try to keep my yard (a bigger yard than anybody really needs) from dying.

Yes, I was very thankful for the inch or so that most of us around Bailey County got a week or two ago, but am I the only ingrate who noticed that almost every other county in our area got more? We were in Lubbock that same weekend and watched the rain pour down by bucketloads.

Not here. At least, not for long. I'm sure it's no virtue to feel sorry for ourselves, but the pattern of rain makes it dead sure that nobody else in surrounding, and wetter, counties will be worried much that Bailey County is still dry as bug dust.

I finally went out Saturday afternoon and turned the water off since it was 90+ degrees and the wailing wind was blowing some-

where toward Friona any smidgens of moisture that might, in theory, have hit the ground.

And here I am wailing when all I have is a yard to burn up and not a crop to plant.

But I'll tell you, folks, this dry spell makes a preacher-type wax theological.

An old man named Job once went through some terrible suffering much worse than any drought. The "friends" who came to comfort him (and who were worse than no comfort) all subscribed to the theory that good folks always prosper and wicked folks always suffer. Since Job was suffering a lot, they concluded that there must be some hidden sin in his life, it must've been a real doozy, and he really had better "fess up!"

Now, I know that goodness brings real benefit and wickedness brings real pain, usually both here and hereafter. But this world is just not as simple as Job's friends, then and now, tend to think. If you accidentally fall, break your leg, and end up in a hospital bed asking yourself, "What did I do to deserve this?," the answer is probably, "Nothing. Life's not that tidy. Not that simple." And, in my better moments, I'm very glad it isn't. (Think about it . . .)

The fact that it rained hard in Lubbock and hardly in Bailey County probably doesn't say a lot more than, well, just what it says.

Maybe our forefathers shouldn't have built in a virtual desert. But whether we're the just, the unjust, or just really dry, this preacher's still praying for rain.

Panhandle water monitoring project wins award

AMARILLO—Designers of a croplands monitoring network that saved 20 billion gallons of water a year in the Texas North Plains has received the prestigious Texas Environmental Excellence Award from Gov. George W. Bush in ceremonies in Austin.

Eleven winners of the award, representing the best environmental ideas and programs in the state, were selected from more than 200 applications.

The awards program is administered by the Texas Natural Resource Conser-

vation Commission. Accepting the agricultural category award were representatives of the Panhandle-based units of the Texas A&M University System's Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and Texas Agriculture Extension Service and USDA-Agricultural Research Service.

These included Texas A&M's Brent Bean, Thomas Marek, Jerry Michels and Leon New and the USDA's Don Dusek and Terry Howell.

The award-winning project, the North Plains Potential Evapotranspiration Network, was developed in

1994 to raise awareness of sound agricultural water management policies and to provide daily data and analysis to help maintain high yields and save water.

The network operates 10 weather stations in the Texas Panhandle to record rainfall, humidity, wind speed and solar radiation.

The collected data is used to calculate the potential loss of water by evaporation and plant transpiration, which is then faxed by 6 a.m. to more than 325 farmers, consultants and media outlets. Estimated savings: 20 billion gallons of groundwater a year.

Others receiving the awards included Holloway Middle School National Junior Honor Society, Whitehouse; FHA Chapter — Earth 2000, Thrall;

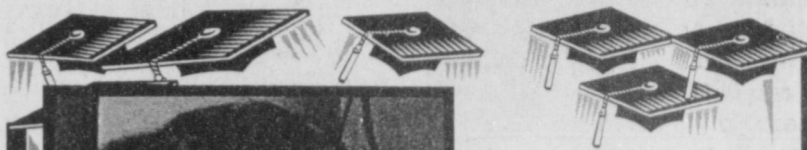
Motorola Austin Sites, Austin; Habitat Suites, Austin; Dow Chemical
