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## Weather, Helped Foil Landy's Attempt at a Record Mile

NEW YORK-(NEA)-Perhaps it was prophetic vision that inspired John Landy, the fawstest miler in the world if you sye with a cockney h'accent, to comment before his recent attack on the four-minute mile "I'll run a fawst mile, but whether it will be under four minutes
