A Dallas gent—former radio news commentator who attended the Potsdam and Yalta conferences—declares that he does not believe Russia will start a war with the United States.

He's Harrison Wood, vice president of the Red Ball Motor Freight Company and former World War II radio reporter for the American Broadcasting Company and the Mutual networks, said he thought the only conflict likely to arise from Stalin's death would be a "palace revolution."

"Stalin's body may not be cold in its coffin before Beria, the ruthless head of the secret police, tries to take over," Wood said.

"I predict fireworks in the Kremlin before the month is out, although the trouble will stay inside Russia."

The Russian army is the key to what happens in Russia now, Wood believes.

"The army put Stalin in power, exiled Trotsky to Mexico where he was later murdered, and will decide who Stalin's ultimate successor will be."

The former radioman said that Beria is the only top-ranking Russian with ruthless personal ambition, one who would stop at nothing to gain top power.

Ranking Russians, especially new Premier Malenkov who has been head of the five-year plans, want war, Wood believes.

"They know that we are too strong militarily and economically, and they're too smart to start anything."

4-H Club Lamp Show Will Open On March 23rd

Over 100 lamps are expected to be entered in the Eastland County 4-H Club boys and girls Electric Lamp Show to compete for the \$25 cash prizes at the Texas Electric Service Company's office in Eastland, March 23 to April 4.

It will be a classification show and each lamp entered will receive a ribbon. The first four place lamps will receive cash prizes in the amount of \$10, \$7.50, \$5 and \$2.50. The ribbons and the prize money is being awarded through the courtesy of the Texas Electric Service Company. T. D. Wheeler, representative of the company has been cooperating with Miss Roselle Winston, Assistant County Home Demonstration Agent and Bob Williams, Assistant County Agricultural Agent in working with 4-H Club members in the contest.

Several lamps have been or will soon be on display at the utility company office at Gorman and Ranger as well as at the offices of the West Texas Utility Company in Cisco and Rising Star until time to bring them to Eastland for the county show on the above date.

The lamps will be judged by out of the county officials on April 2 and then on April 4 all of the club boys and girls from over the county who attend the Annual Eastland County Rally Day will see all of the lamps entered and those participating will receive their ribbons or cash prizes.

Baugh Speaks At Banquet Of O'Backs Tonight

A distinguished athlete—Samuel Adrian Baugh, one of the greatest football stars of all time—will be a visitor in Eastland County tonight.

Baugh, known far and wide as "Mr. Forward Pass" and former pro star with the Washington Redskins who now is dividing his time between being a Roman ranchman and assistant grid mentor at Hardin-Simmons University, Abilene, will be the featured speaker at tonight's banquet of the Eastland Quarterback Club in Eastland.

During his sixteen years of pro grid play, Slingshot Sammy the Sweetwater flash, smashed 16 records. Baugh joined the Redskins fresh from Texas Christian in 1937.

A native Texan, born in Temple, he first starred as a football player while in high school at Sweetwater. The rest is history—history well and widely known by ardent pigskin fans from coast to coast and around the world.

Sam is married and has five children—four sons and a daughter.

He's retired from the pro grid game, but by accepting a post as associate coach at Hardin-Simmons, the former big gun of the collegiate Purple and the pro Washingtonians can continue his association with the great gridiron sport.

"Football has been mighty good to me," Sammy says with his usual humbleness (he never changed head size despite his fame), "and I hope I may contribute something to the game by coaching."

In addition to the privilege of hearing him speak, fans attending the Eastland Quarterback Club session tonight also will see a special football film which the grid ace will bring along for screening following the banquet.

Ducats for the big event are on sale by members of the ticket committee, or they may be secured at the door.

The affair, to be held in the Connelley Hotel in Eastland, will honor Eastland High's Mavericks of 1952.

U. S. Employment At Record High
The Department of Commerce estimated Wednesday that employment in February at 60,924,000 was higher than in any previous February. It exceeded the level of a year ago by more than 1,000,000.

There was a rise of nearly 500,000 in nonfarm employment during the month, but farm employment continued its midwinter slide, falling off 86,000 or about 1.5 per cent. Nonfarm employment the February was nearly 2,000,000 higher than a year before.

SCRANTON DUE NEW LINKS WITH 2 PAVED HIGHWAYS

The little village of Scranton, once the seat of learning in this area with its Scranton Academy, will soon be connected with the outside world by two paved roads.

The paved farm road westward from Cisco which dead-ended about two miles from Scranton is to be extended. And it will push westward through the little village, make a turn at the Scranton cemetery, turn west and connect with the Putnam and Cross Plains farm-to-market highway.

Already forces have been set back for work to proceed on grading west of Scranton. The new paved road will enable Scranton residents and farmers to make a fast motor trip to Cross Plains, Putnam and Cisco.

Northwest of Scranton grading has been completed on a new farm-to-market highway from a mile east of Putnam to Moran, giving Putnam and Scranton still another highway outlet.

It is understood that the only difficulty encountered in securing widened right-of-way on the Scranton and Putnam farm-to-market route was at the Scranton cemetery. Here the highway officials desire to round off the corner of that graveyard, with some small opposition arising.

The S-curves on the highway between Cisco and Breckenridge where the highway crossed the old defunct Cisco and Northeastern Railroad grade have been straightened. Even a hill, just north of the intersection of the Eastland-Breckenridge highway, has been cut through to remove a bad death curve.

Rangerites See Silage Benefits In Cook County

A trio of Rangerites—Charlie Joe Owen, B. S. Dudley, Jr., and R. V. (Rip) Galloway—were bubbling over with enthusiasm today following a rural tour of Cook County in the Gainesville area Tuesday.

Owen, president of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce, Dudley, local vocational agriculture instructor, and Galloway, C-C secretary-manager, made the junket to Gainesville to gain valuable information and ideas for the proposed silage program now being pushed for adoption in this area by the agricultural committee of the Ranger chamber group.

The Range trio saw—firsthand—the marvelous benefits resulting from a silage program being carried on in Cook County by the First State Bank, Gainesville, the office of the county agricultural agent and cooperating farmers.

Ranger's Charlie Joe Owen, local C-C proxy, said that the visiting delegation found Gainesville business men highly enthusiastic over the results of the silage program and noted that they all seemed especially interested in the farmers' problems and welfare.

The Soil Conservation Service is also an important cog in the cooperation effort there, the Rangerites report.

On their brief tour, the Ranger men inspected many trench and upright silos, and saw several trench silos which were being fed out of directly. One of these, Galloway said, was two years old.

Silage played an important role in enabling Cook County farmers and dairymen to successfully weather the terrific, ravaging drought period of the past two years. With pasture lands depleted by the moistureless stretch, silage storage really paid off.

The Ranger men also noted soil conservation practices which had resulted in impressive improvements. Many Bermuda grass waterways are stopping soil erosion. And clovers are being successfully grown as cover crops and for pasture.

Conducting the Ranger delegation on the tour were Claude Jones, executive vice president of the First State Bank, Gainesville; H. F. Scheniderjon and his son, Ted, Cook County farmers; Bob Meyers, John Deere dealer; Jack McFadden, technician for the Soil Conservation Service, and Gerald York, county agricultural agent of the Texas A&M College Extension Service.

The Ranger Chamber of Commerce is planning to sponsor purchase of an ensilage cutter for use of farmers and ranchmen in the Ranger area. The project is pending the approval and interest of farmers and ranchmen who are invited to express their views to local chamber leaders and members of the group's agricultural committee.

An important meeting relative to the proposed silage program in this area will be held at the Chamber of Commerce office in Ranger in the near future, President Owen said.

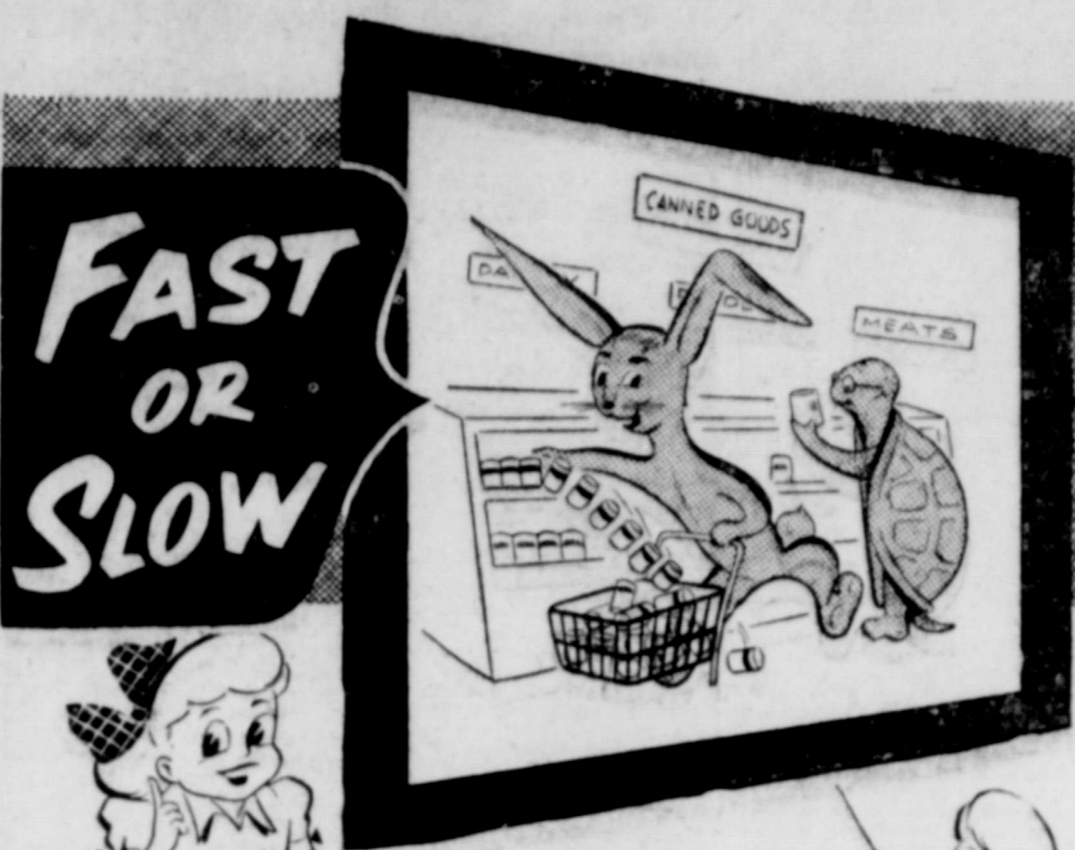
Insurance Takes Risk Out Of All Credit Buying

Take the risk out of installment buying by credit life and credit disability insurance. Alson J. Smith advises in April Farm and Ranch.

Through the protection of credit life, no longer need the homemaker fear that, if the man of the house becomes ill or dies, the finance company will claim the family car, TV set, or other property. Anybody between the ages of 18 and 65 can buy credit life insurance without an examination and with a minimum of red tape.

Until the loan is paid up, it provides the same protection as ordinary life insurance. Moreover, the policies are broad, paying off for death from any cause, including suicide or military service, Mr. Smith says. The companies, recognizing the value of speed and a lack of red tape as big selling points, make it a practice to pay claims on the day they are received, with no questions asked.

With credit disability insurance, after a specified number of days—usually 14—it begins paying off a loan after the maker has been incapacitated, and keeps it up until he is able to go back to work or the loan is paid. Like credit life, it requires no medical examination and pays off in event of disability from almost any cause.

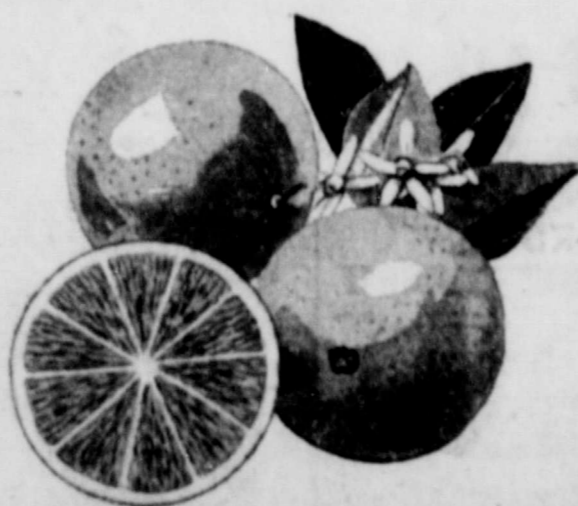

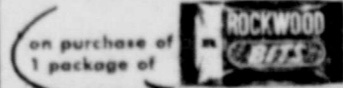

He said the enlarged activity centers around tagging the shrimp along a large stretch of the Gulf Coast. Heretofore this work, designed to determine vital data about the popular sea species, has been confined to the Port Aransas area.

The Chief Marine Biologist said tagged shrimp will be released close to shore and out into a maximum of fifty fathoms. This will place this activity beyond the limits of shrimping operations which ordinarily ends at approximately thirty fathoms.

Plans are to release up to five thousand tagged shrimp between the Galveston-Port Arthur area to Fort Isabel.

He said one primary purpose is to determine migration habits of the red shrimp since the life habits of the white shrimp already have been well charted.

The Chief Marine Biologist said anything bearing on the habits of shrimp will be of value to the huge shrimping industry. He explained the shrimpers are required to go into deeper water for their catches with consequent increase in operating costs.

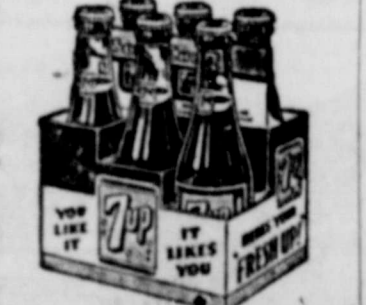

"Give the Parent-Teachers Association anything they want. They're helping every kid in Texas."

That's the way State Health Officer George W. Cox welcomed 400,000 new allies in the Department's campaign to establish tooth saving fluoridation programs in all Texas communities.

Members of the Texas PTA—11,541 of them—have pledged themselves to work for adoption of fluoridation in all areas where natural fluoride content of the community water supply is below the level of 1 part per million parts water as is recommended by practically every reputable health organization in the country.

Following the lead of the National Congress of Parents and Teachers which adopted a pro-fluoridation resolution in their convention just concluded in Chicago, a spokesman for the Texas organization said the entire membership is being urged to actively campaign for the measure "which will mean fewer decayed teeth for our children."

Twelve cities are already conducting carefully controlled programs of water treatment against insidious tooth decay. If the PTA is successful in its promotion project, many other cities will be undertaking similar programs.

And future children of any community where water is treated in the proper ratio will be better off than children in other communities whose leaders have shorter vision.

Long years of study show that children who use fluoride-treated water have 60 to 65 per cent fewer decayed teeth than children who are denied the benefits of such water.

This, says Dr. Cox, is why the health agency is giving unqualified approval of fluoridation, and why he enthusiastically welcomes the support of PTA.

More Families Participating In Group Plans

Families are becoming more conscious of the need for planning together. Learning to understand each family member, and to solve every-day problems together, was the trend for farm and rural families during 1952 according to Mrs. Eloise Johnson, family life education specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

As evidenced by the reports from County Extension agents, many families participated in the Extension program and activities which involved the family. These activities involved family counseling, recreation, work on the family history, including young married women in clubs, providing for children during meetings, and considering the needs of older family and community members.

Mrs. Johnson says county home demonstration agents assisted more than 18,000 farm and ranch families to analyze and solve certain problems through individual counseling. Group discussions and counseling enabled more than 40,000 farm families to solve some of their family relationship problems. Many more were given family life information through leaders trained by the specialist or agents.

During 1952 farm and ranch families showed an increasing interest in neighborhood and community study and improvements. The agents and leaders assisted with more than 5,000 family life discussions at agricultural, home demonstration, civic and church meetings. Family life conferences were held in community and county groups to create an awareness

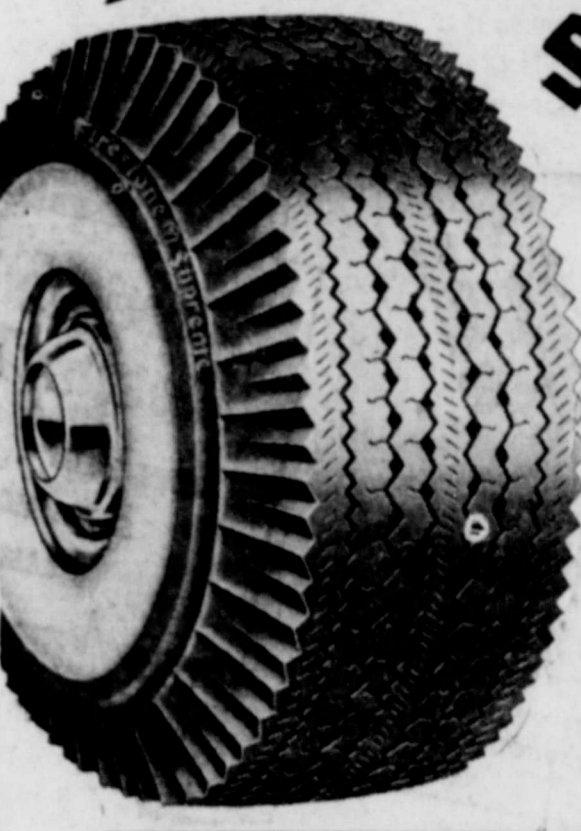

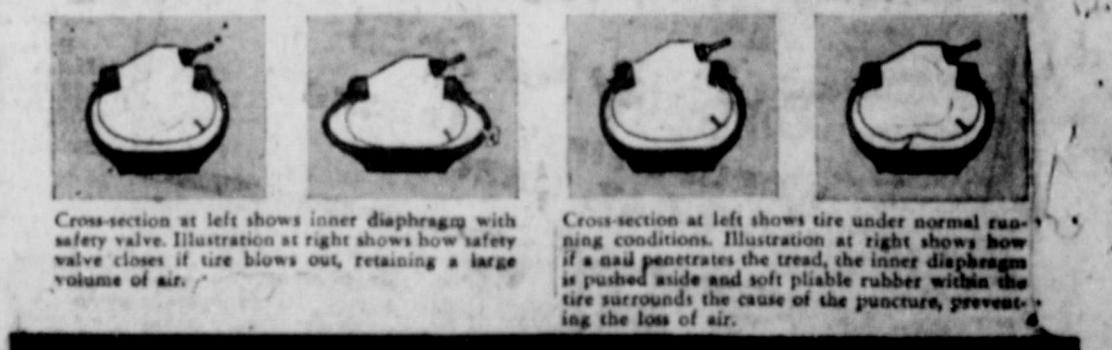

History Of American Red Cross

The Red Cross movement was conceived by Henri Dunant, a Swiss philanthropist, who witnessed the carnage at the battle of Solferino in 1859, was shocked by the lack of care given to the wounded left helpless on the battlefield.

In the United States, Dunant's cause was taken up by Clara Barton, who had done similar work for servicemen during the Civil War. The American Association of the Red Cross was incorporated in 1881, and the following year President Arthur signed the Red Cross Treaty of Geneva.

For 18 years the organization functioned primarily as a disaster agency. In 1905 a new congressional charter established certain definite duties and functions for the American National Red Cross. In the years following 1905 the great health and safety services were conceived and developed.

The American Red Cross came of age in World War I. Thousands

of nurses were recruited, hospital units were organized and sent to the fighting fronts, and an extensive welfare and recreational program was developed.

The year 1941 brought the American Red Cross its greatest challenge. Planning its work on the basis of World War I experience, the Red Cross mobilized all its resources and offered its services to American fighting men in every theatre of operation.

Following the war a reorganization was effected that gave chapters greater representation on the governing body, and, on May 8, 1947, the bill revising the Red Cross charter was signed by President Truman.

Out of World War II experience in recruiting of blood donors, the present Red Cross Blood Program was born. This program had its official inauguration with the opening of the Rochester, New York, Regional Blood Center on Jan. 12, 1948.

On Oct. 1, 1949, Gen. George C. Marshall was named President of the Red Cross by President Truman.

During these post war years the international situation was growing more tense; hostilities broke out in Korea on June 25, 1950. Immediately a revitalization of the whole organization was initiated.

Following an appointment as Secretary of Defense, General Marshall resigned as president of the American Red Cross. He was succeeded by E. Roland Harriman, long-time Red Cross volunteer, who took office on Dec. 1, 1950.

Under Mr. Harriman's leadership volunteers have been greater in number, and the entire organization has been streamlined and strengthened.

The American Red Cross is one of 71 member societies of the League of Red Cross Societies, which has its headquarters in Geneva, Switzerland.

The American Red Cross is divided geographically into four areas as follows: Eastern, 1,061

chapters; Midwestern, 1,815 chapters; Southeastern, 796 chapters; Pacific, 391 chapters.

There are also 7 insular chapters outside the continental US, making a total of 3,730 chapters in all.

Little Hope For More Rain In Eastland Area

There was still a possibility—but a rather remote one—for more rain in the Eastland County area today and tonight, the U. S. Weather Bureau said this morning.

However, the possibility loomed even more remote by noontime when a clear, azure sky and a beaming sun covered the area and

another stretch of balmy, mild and springlike weather appeared in prospect for the coming weekend.

"Fair to partly cloudy and mild today, tonight and Friday," said the Thursday morning communique of the Weather Bureau.

Forecasters said today's highest mercury reading would be around the 80-degree mark and tonight's low in the warmish mid-50s.

Friday afternoon may be slightly cooler, weathermen said, with the day's high slated in the lower 70s.

The West Texas forecast: "Clear to partly cloudy Thursday and Friday. No important temperature changes."

Females Gain In Population Reports Show

Females are increasing more rapidly in number than males in most areas of the world, statisticians of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company report. This trend is seen not only in countries where males are still in the majority, but also where females have long had superiority in numbers.

Females now outnumber males in almost all the European countries, the statisticians point out. This is particularly true in the Iron Curtain countries, where Eastern Germany, with 743 males for every 1,000 females, has the greatest imbalance of the sexes in Europe and probably in the world. The other satellite countries, except Bulgaria, also show relatively low rates of males to females. No postwar figures are available for the Soviet Union, but there is good reason to believe that it has a considerable deficit of males. In 1939, the ratio there was 920 males for every 1,000 females. With the heavy losses suffered by the Soviet Union in World War II, it is likely that the ratio is even lower now.

On our side of the Iron Curtain, Austria and Western Germany have the largest deficit of males. In Finland, France, Spain and the British Isles the number

of men is also well below that for women.

Emigration has been one of the major historic factors in depleting Europe's male population, at the same time building up surpluses of men in the New World. At the turn of the century there were 1,044 males for every 1,000 females in the United States, and males maintained their numerical superiority until recent years. In Australia and New Zealand, relatively newly settled areas, men are still in the majority by a slight margin.

The situation in Africa and Asia is more difficult to determine, the statisticians conclude, "since large parts of these continents have never been fully enumerated. The countries for which figures are available show a mixed picture. Egypt, Japan and Korea have more females than males. On the other hand, the Union of

South Africa, India, Pakistan, and the Philippine Islands have more males than females. In some of the Far Eastern countries the female population is reduced by infanticide and by a very high maternal mortality. There is also a tendency in that part of the world to underenumerate females in their censuses."

Advise Farmers To Preserve Our Wild Life

Wild life will benefit the eventual benefit of farmers, if the latter are not too thorough in reaping their harvests.

This suggestion was set forth in a message recently sent its customers by the farm equipment division of the Avco Manufacturing

Corp., at Coldwater, Mo. "Modern machines and modern harvest methods make hardship for the wild life on our farms," the message said. "The modern corn picker, which scarcely misses an ear or kernel, leaves slim picking for birds and animals.

"Farmers who wish to protect wild life and provide good hunting for themselves and friends can save animals by 'cutting corners.'"

"The idea is to cut diagonally across the back-corner of each field and harvest to leave a natural shelter and a little store of feed for your own wild life.
