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Now It's Pumps Instead of Pills For Seasickness

Scientists at Stamford, Calif., have come up with something better than the anti-seasickness pill. It's a gadget that keeps ships from rolling.
A working model, dubbed the "U.S.S. Minorsky" after the Stanford professor who designed it, and built by the Navy, actually looks more like a big teeter-totter than a ship.
When the electrically operated springs and levers which simulate waves and ocean swells start rocking the "boat," pumps controlled by instruments start pumping water from a tank on the down side to a tank on the up side. The shift of weight returns the ship to an even keel.
Joseph H. Chadwick Jr. and Albert J. Morris, who described the stabilizer to the Society of Naval Architects and Marine Engineers, said it can be installed in most existing types of ocean-going vessels, adding only about three per cent to total displacement.

phone rang, recently, and there he was calling from the Queen Mary.

"I hear London's having an unseasonable fog," said Bob. "Will you pull our files on fog gags and air-mail them to me tonight? Need them in London day after tomorrow."

A trip to Mr. Hope's joke files is almost like a visit to Fort Knox, according to Marjorie. He couldn't guard them more carefully if they were gold nuggets. They're ensconced in a concrete and steel vault, and they constitute the entertainment world's most fabulous collection of rib-tickers—about 100,000 in all, collected over a period of years.

File headings include such items as "Fat Ladies," "Football," "Santa Claus," and almost anything else you can think of. Alongside most of the gags is a scribbled coding in Mr. Hope's own handwriting, for he reads and evaluates every joke produced by his writers. An unmarked joke means he considers it a dud. A checked gag line indicates "a maybe—pretty funny." And he enthusiastically circles the "sure-fires," which often become meat for the five-minute monologues that open each of his TV, radio and personal appearances.

One of Miss Hughes' problems is trying to keep up with Mr. Hope's penchant for making his own schedules. "We in the office are never surprised," she says, "to find that he's left town. We may come in one morning and find a

note: 'Gone to Alaska—back soon.' It's quite usual for him to be here at noon and aboard a plane heading for Europe by nightfall. He's always adding to the more than 2,000,000 miles he's already travelled, on every continent, since 1941.

Dictation from Mr. Hope is nothing for an awestruck girl. "As first I thought I was on the receiving end of a verbal machine gun," says Marjorie. "But now I'm used to it. I've never bothered to check, but he probably dictates at least 160 words a minute."

Mr. Hope makes most of his own appointments, she says, leaving the routine to his office people. He knows thousands of people; his staff has never heard of many of them acquaintances made while appearing around the world. He works all hours, sometimes all night. Gag-hatching sessions, with Mr. Hope as master of ceremonies, frequently last till dawn, particularly right before a show. Top-flight comedy doesn't just happen.
