

H. J. R .- House Joint Resolution. S. J. R .- Senate Joint Resolution. Female Juries: The last stronghold of the Texas male is now seriously threatened. Women are on the threshold of serving on our juries. H. J. R. 16, which will permit women to serve on juries in Texas courts, has now been passed by the House of Representatives and is awaiting action in the Sen-ate. 
