### Bird Populace Change Places

Some feathered housekeeping places are changing hands down on the Aransas National Wildlife Refuge on the Gulf Coast, according to reports to the Executive Secretary of the Game and Fish Commission.

The shifting occurred unusually early this year, reports state, with the estimated 80,000 waterfowl on the refuge setting the pace undoubtedly because of open weather northward.

Even the giant Whooping Cranes presumably are poised for their long hop to the far north although they usually remain until mid-April.

As the northern nesting species leave the vast Blackjack Peninsula protectorate, some of the room they vacate is taken over by other birds which winter in the far south and summer on the coast.

Conspicuous among the birds due to begin summer housekeeping at the refuge are the Roseate Spoonbills which leave about mid-October for deep Mexico, Central America and Honduras. These exotic birds usually concentrate about this time of the year on a few ancestral coastal nesting areas, including small islands of Aransas refuge, Galveston Bay and San Benito. One favorite place is Carroll Island, off Aransas, which the National Audubon Society protects with a special watchman in the summer.

Julian Howard, manager of the Aransas Refuge, said the departure of the Whooping Cranes is very mysterious. They begin disappearing, apparently moving out at night, he said. Howard's maximum winter census count was 21 Whoopers.

## Form of ACTH Useful In Dairy Cow's Disease

A new form of the drug ACTH shows promise for use in controlling ketosis in dairy cows, the Armour Veterinary Laboratories has announced.

The special form of ACTH is called adrenomone. It is not safe for humans.

J. C. Shaw, professor of dairy husbandry at the University of Maryland, which cooperated in the experiments, said that in most cases a single injection of adrenomone cleared up the disease. He said cows resumed normal milk production in three to 12 days.

Ketosis, known by many other names, is a metabolic disease in cows. Veterinarians estimate it costs the dairy farmer more than \$10,000,000 a year. The major effect of the disease is to reduce milk production. It results in the animal producing large quantities of ketone bodies which may give a characteristic choleform-like flavor to the milk. Cause of ketosis is not known.

### Early Neglect Add Big Toll Of Diphtheria

Diphtheria is a disease of neglect, declared Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. If all babies, beginning at three months of age, were taken to a physician or clinic for immunization against diphtheria, the infant deaths from this disease would cease.

Diphtheria occurs most frequently in early childhood. It is caused by a germ that grows in the nose and throat and throws out a toxin or poison into the blood stream. This poison may attack the heart muscle or it may cause a paralysis known as peripheral neuritis.

Diphtheria is a dangerous disease for a child to have and it is highly infectious to other children. It starts with a sore throat, fever, and sometimes croup and hoarseness.

Adequate immunization early in life is the main defense against diphtheria. It helps the body build up immunity against the dangerous malady.

About a year after completion of the initial triple immunization against diphtheria, whooping cough, and tetanus a booster injection may be given and another at four to six years of age. Some physicians advise a further injection at nine to ten years of age.

Although the death rate from diphtheria has been markedly reduced in the past twenty years, infants were unsafe without immunization. It is only when all babies are immunized early in life that the conquest of diphtheria will be accomplished.

### Plastic Tent For Plant Cuttings

A simple and effective method of rooting plant cuttings under a plastic tent has been developed at Harvard University's Arnold Arboretum in Jamaica Plain.

Perfected by Lewis Lipp, chief propagator at the arboretum, the device can be used by both amateur and professional gardeners. The big feature of the Lipp propagating flat, in which shoots are placed, is that once the cuttings receive their first watering they can be left alone for a month or more. The flat should be kept at normal room temperature and should receive about one hour of sun each day. It is easy to use from a shallow wooden box.

The box is filled level with a mixture of one-third finely shredded and thoroughly moistened peat, one-third sand, and one-third styrofoam (which aerates the mixture so wet that it cannot be over-watered). Plant cuttings, two or three inches long, are placed in this mixture and treated with any plant food.

Heavy wires, such as coat hangers, are then bent over the box making curved grids for 1 1/2 x 3 x 3/4 inch damp cheese cloth, used to keep the humidity in the flat constant, is stretched over the wire followed by a tight outside covering of polyethylene plastic which is wrapped around the entire box, bottom included.

### Mobil Lab Is Fighting Crime

CAMP GORDON, Ga. — The Army's newest weapon for its war against crime is a mobile laboratory equipped with latest devices for examining evidence.

The crime laboratory—a 35-foot trailer truck based here—is a modern schoolroom for soldiers learning to investigate possible sabotage or other crime at Army installations.

Manned by seven technicians, the lab has a chemical analysis laboratory, a photographic darkroom, equipment for identifying fingerprints, firearms, and documents, and telephone and radio communications equipment.

The lab section for identifying firearms, documents and fingerprints is equipped with a photographic camera which reproduces pictures of minute writing or engraving. It also has a bullet recovery tube, a padded container from which bullets can be extracted easily.

DEVON POINTERS for home painters

What to do with paint leftovers—don't throw away. If full of lumps, strain through old nylon or silk stocking before using again.

How to apply varnish or enamel quickly—use a roller coater and finish by smoothing lightly with tip of brush.

Easy way to wipe up paint spatter—slip a pair of old socks over your shoes and "skate-up" paint drops on floor.

Tip for painting chairs and tables—Drive a nail part way into each leg-end. This prevents smearing the floor.

How to keep can clean while painting—Drive several nail holes into lip of can so paint flows back when brush is wiped on an edge.

For painting masonry surfaces—use a nylon brush for longer wear. Better ask for a "Super-kleen" Nylon brush.

If paint runs down brush handle when painting ceiling, you're dipping brush too deep. Also don't "press" too hard—use tips of bristle.
