James Savage, medical student, testified he performed an autopsy on the body that same night, and found evidence that three bullets and entered Campbell's head. (Captain Fritz later identified them as .25-caliber automatic pistol bullets.) One had entered through the left ear and penetrated into the right lobe of the brain; another was removed from between the first vertebra and the base of the skull.

Another slug evidently had torn into Campbell's left jaw, knocking out several teeth and lacerating the tongue. The cartridge's copper jacket was found partially bedded in the tongue. An X-ray picture taken later, said Savage, indicated that the lead slug lodg ed in the neck, behind the mouth Campbell's body had fourth de-
