## New Administration for City—

# Officials Take Oaths Tonight

Dr. Calvin W. Harris will be administered the oath of office as the new mayor of the City of Ranger tonight at 7:30 o'clock at the City Hall.

Following completion of his oath, the new Mayor will then swear in the four new commissioners elected by citizens of Ranger during the municipal election held on Tuesday, April 7.

The new commissioners: L. T. (Lem) Rushing, police and fire commissioner. A. G. Koenig, finance commissioner. Frank Penn, street and park commissioner. O. L. (Lee) Cantrell, water commissioner.

A prayer will be offered by Rev. Garland Lavender, pastor of the First Methodist Church.

Following installation of the new mayor and four commission members, the city government group will immediately go into a regular business meeting.

## Final Rites For F. L. Drago, 77, This Afternoon

Funeral services for Fred L. Drago, 77-year-old long-time resident of Eastland County, will be held at the Hamner Funeral Home Chapel in Eastland this afternoon at 4:30 o'clock.

Officiating at the final rites for the Eastland man will be Rev. J. Morris Bailey, pastor of First Methodist Church, Eastland. Interment will be in Eastland Cemetery.

Mr. Drago, who was born in West Virginia on Jan. 6, 1876, had been a resident of Eastland for nearly a third of a century. He succumbed at his home Wednesday afternoon following an illness of several months.

Mr. Drago came to Eastland from Arkansas while in the employ of a gas company. But due to failing health had been retired for several years.

## Eastland and Stephens County Boys Will Attend Big Meeting; Court of Honor Saturday Night

The North District Camp-O-Ral of the Boy Scouts of America will be held at Haganam Lake near Ranger Saturday and Sunday, May 3 and 4.

Scores of Scouts representing troops in Stephens and Eastland Counties will attend the event which will open Saturday at 4:30 p.m.

Highlight of the twoday Scouting gathering will be a court of honor to be held Saturday night at 8 p.m. About 30 Boy Scouts will receive special awards during the ceremonies around the council fire, and all parents are especially urged to attend.

Each Scout will be graded on the following Scout skills, according to his rank:

For Tenderfoot Scouts—

I. Total of 20 points for Scout oath, laws, motto and slogan.  
II. 20 points. Safety precautions to take on highway and cross-country for day and night hiking. Correct way of walking and proper care of feet. How to make one-man latrine. Demonstration of 6 silent Scout signals for formations and field work.

III. 15 points. Demonstration of artificial respiration. How to treat arm and leg arterial bleeding. Treatment for sprained ankle.

IV. 40 points. Eight points of compass and reading. Determining 100 yards by measurement, 100 feet also. Location site and laying for fire. Sharpening knife and axe. Duck on rock.

For Second Class and above—

I. 35 points. Demonstration of artificial respiration. Triangular bandage for hand, knee, foot. Treatment for arterial bleeding of face, throat, arm, leg. Treatment for fractures upper arm, lower arm, lower leg, collar bone.

II. 15 points. How to select a good camp site. Lay out true north and south line with sun and then with compass.

III. 15 points. How to sharpen axe and knife. Two different types of lashings.

IV. 35 points. Build a fire without matches. Fifteen-word message, Morse Code-Flag. Duck on rock.

## Mental Health Week, May 3-9 To Be Observed

Chief J. C. Swadley of Grand Prairie, and president of the State Firemen and Fire Marshalls' Association, has requested that the fire alarm of every city and town in Texas sound Monday, May 4th, at noon, but its sound will mean more than a fire. The fire alarm will call attention to the statewide campaign being conducted to acquaint Texas with Mental Health problems.

Mental Health Week, which has been proclaimed by Congress and by Texas Governor Allan Shivers as May 3 to 9, will be "rung" by radio from New York. The sound to be heard will come from a bell which has been forged from chains and shackles formerly used in Mental Hospitals throughout the nation to restrain mental patients. The hospital at Bask Text, donated to this effort.

Our fire chief announced that more than 700 fire alarms through out the state would be rung Monday noon to signify the opening of the campaign. While its primary purpose is educational, and efforts are being made to place literature in the hands of a majority of Texans, the campaign will also attempt to raise \$148,796 which will be used to broaden the scope of mental health work at local, state and national levels.

E. L. Wheelock, Corsicana oil and cattleman, chairman of the Mental Health Fund campaign, said that every effort had been made to organize campaigns in every county of the state. He also said that campaign contributions could be made by anyone by addressing an envelope to "Mental Health", care of postmaster of any postoffice in Texas.

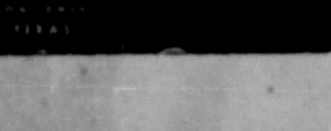

## Washing Blankets Rendered Easy-To-Do Lightens Spring Cleaning



IT'S SPRING—well, almost—and blankets must be stored for the summer. Using a new blue all-purpose detergent for the job, the homemaker finds washing the blankets has become an "easy-do" job these days.

IN THE OLD DAYS blanket washing was a back-breaking task. That day is done, for by using a few explicit directions plus a new detergent with the blue-magic formula custom built for this arduous or light, you'll get stunning results in no time at all. Here's how:

Measure blanket for reblocking guide. Shake well to remove dirt. Rub any excessively soiled spots with a soft sponge or cloth dipped in warm water and the blue-magic detergent. Fill washer with warm water and add detergent. Put in one double or two single blankets at a time. The actual washing time should be short, 1 1/2 to 2 minutes. (Overagitation tends to shrink and mat woolen blankets.) If you're using an automatic washer, hold the

extraction to the minimum time; if using a wringer washer, put tension to lowest position. Rinse quickly and again give a short spin or put through the wringer with tension at the lowest position. Reshape by pulling gently, going from one side of the blanket to the other. This is especially important for electric blankets for it straightens the wires in their channels. Dry on parallel lines if possible to avoid a heavy line mark. Wrap the clothesline in clean old linen, and turn the blanket during drying—it dries more evenly and quickly. For ironing the binding, use a press cloth and set the iron to "rayon" heat.

New "Brain" Goes to Work for \$300 an Hour



OPERATION of IBM's newest electronic "brain" was inaugurated recently by board chairman Thomas J. Watson (seated) and Dr. Cuthbert C. Hurd, director of the organization's applied science division, at the company's World Headquarters in New York. Composed of eleven compact units, this new calculator is known as the Electronic Data Processing Machine, or, more commonly, as the "701." Having more than seventeen miles of wire, 4,000 electronic tubes and 13,600 germanium diodes, it is the first calculator of comparable capacity to be manufactured by production line techniques. Current plans call for the production of eighteen within a year. With almost unlimited "memory," it can add and subtract more than 16,000 times a second and multiply and divide more than 2,000 times a second. While solving a typical problem it is capable of performing 14,000 mathematical operations a second. From the control center, above, one operator can supervise the calculator and, when necessary, easily change the course of a problem.



IT'S THE LAW in Texas

HOW BAIL IS SET IN CRIMINAL CASES EXPLAINED BY BAR

Why persons accused of crime are released on bail is a subject on which most of us have little knowledge but considerable curiosity, according to the State Bar of Texas. In the United States a defendant in a criminal action is presumed to be innocent until his guilt is established beyond a reasonable doubt. His guilt or innocence is established at his trial, not when he is arrested. With this concept in mind it is not hard to see why the right to bail in criminal cases is guaranteed by the Constitution of the United States, with the exception of capital cases. A capital crime is one in which the punishment may be death. In Texas murder, treason, rape and robbery with firearms are capital offenses. All prisoners are bailable in Texas except where the proof is evident that a capital offense has been committed and it is probable that a jury will assess the death penalty. An officer making an arrest is required by law to take the accused promptly before a magistrate. It is the duty of the magistrate to examine into the truth

of the accusation made. He determines whether the accused should be discharged or bailed or held without bail. If bail is set for the accused, the amount of bail is set by the magistrate. The Constitution also says that bail may not be set in excessive amount. What is considered a reasonable amount depends largely upon the circumstances and the risk involved. Bail must be set high enough to assure the court and the state that the person will not run away, but will return and submit to trial on the date set. The judge usually will set the prosecuting attorney for a recommendation as to the amount of bail. The accused's attorney may then ask that the amount recommended be reduced, giving his reasons. The judge will settle on an amount, he believes reasonable to assure the accused's presence at the trial. (This column, based on Texas laws, is written to inform—not advise. defendant, the magistrate must determine the amount. The law provides a procedure for reviewing these decisions before the Court of Criminal Appeals. When an accused is on bail when his trial commences he has the right to remain on bail during the trial of his case. Where the punishment of a defendant has been assessed at confinement in the penitentiary for fifteen years or less the defendant has the right to remain on bail pending the appeal of his case. If the penalty is more than fifteen years the defendant is kept in custody from the moment the jury returns its verdict. The Constitution also says that bail may not be set in excessive amount.
