180 Old Settlers at Reunion

About 180 Old Settlers gathered on the Court House lawn Friday for a general get-together, some speeches and a free barbecue com-

pliments of the Dimmitt Rodeo Association and Castro County Sheriff's Posse.

The welcoming address for the occasion was by Jack Miller, local attorney who recounted several episodes in Castro County history which are more often overlooked by people telling of the early days in this county.

"I appreciate what the old settlers have done for this county and area," Miller told the crowd, "because through your efforts we now have this fine community and all its advantages. It is also irrefutable logic that memories of the past are important in directing the course of the future and what you have learned can benefit us all."

Miller then went on to tell about the first major felony trial in this county. It seems there was a man living in Dimmitt who insured himself when his debts became intolerable. This happened some 45 years ago and one night his house burned down. Since it was a two-room house with one door at the front and two at the rear it was strange, indeed, when the man's tearful wife reported to neighbors that her husband had

been consumed in the blaze. Before the smoking embers had died away a collection of \$500 for the "widow" had been taken up and a sympathetic community had opened its arms to the distraught woman.

Sure enough, a quantity of burned flesh and bones were found in the burned out house and identified as the dead man's remains. A burial was performed after friends had set up with the bones and the widow moved to Canyon. But Castro County Sheriff John Flanagan couldn't quite get everything straight in his mind about the case because a good many points didn't add up. So he went to Canyon, told the widow he suspected foul play and set back to see what would happen. What happened would gladden the heart of any frustrated sleuth. The widow, as soon as the sheriff disappeared around a corner, hastily penned a letter addressed to herself in

the post office.

But Flanagan literally walked in to the post office as she walked out and when he saw the address on the envelope, he decided to go with the letter to Sweetwater.

Sure enough the man who called for the letter was the woman's presumably dead husband and Sheriff Flanagan nailed him on the spot.

The "remains" in the fire had been calf bones.

The jury, of which Tom Tate and Pres Dyer were members, sentenced the man to eight years for arson on December 14, 1916.

Another historical topic hit upon by Miller was the Great Rabbit Drive of April 1, 1925. Following successful rabbit drives in other parts of the country, the people of Castro County decided to do something about their own long-eared pests so they prepared to stage a rabbit drive. People came from far and near and ringed the perimeter of the county and began chasing jackrabbits into the center at Dimmitt where Goose Ramey had constructed some pens. A sandstorm came up, though, and when everyone reached Dimmitt there was not a single rabbit to be penned anywhere.

Loses Thumb on Right Hand

Jimmy Cluck, who was working on his farm 14 miles southeast of Dimmitt, caught his hand in the knives of an ensilage cutter Saturday morning and lost the thumb on his right hand. His other fingers were severely cut.

Cardinals Emerge Winners As Little League Season Ends

The 1959 Castro County Little League baseball season ended Monday night with the Cardinals emerging as the winner.

In Monday's game Steve Hutton pitched the Braves to a victory over the Gold Sox for the final game. Steve finished his little league career with the Gold Sox only getting three hits from his strong arm. The victory placed the Braves in second place for the second half of the season and in third place for the season.

Since the Cardinals won the first and second half of the season, President Dale Prather said there wasn't any need for a playoff. The Cardinals did not lose any of their games during the second half. The other three teams were well matched and each tried hard to down the league winners. The Redlegs gave the Cardinals a battle at their last encounter as did the Gold Sox before losing 9 to 11. The Braves led in the sixth inning but failed to come across and lost 5 to 6 when they last played the Cardinals.

For the season the Redlegs placed second. The team had some very fine players and a good pitcher in pitcher Ward. The Redlegs put on a good display of strength when they played their last game against the Braves. Pitcher Ward has his best night with a no hitter until the fourth inning.

The hapless Gold Sox had lots of bad luck during the second half of the season. Ted Shuffy said he had to replace too many boys during the second half which weakened his team. The boys moved up from the minors were good players and had lots of desire but lacked in experience.

The Braves finished strong and played good ball during the second half of the season. The placing of Tommy Stafford to catcher and moving Craig Fuller to shortstop greatly helped the team.

In the minor league, the Gold Sox won the first half of the season and the Cardinals just edged out the Gold Sox as winners for the second part of the season. For the season, the Gold Sox were

declared winners with more wins than losses over the other teams.

As this was the first year for Castro County to be in the affiliated Little League, the boys were not eligible for tournament play. President Prather said the league took care of about 150 boys for the summer and he expects the number to be greater next year if the league gets its charter.

The season was considered a success but there is still much work to be done to keep the franchise. Little League will depend on how much effort people will want to put out to continue the play. The Castro County Little League could become a very strong competitor in tournament play and lots of boys can learn much about sports.

The playing fields will need to be improved to keep the National Charter. The district director will inspect the playing fields to determine if the fields will qualify for Little League standards. President Prather said the playing fields will not qualify as they are now.

County Farm Tour to Stress Fertilizer, Water Information

The annual Castro County Farm Tour will be held Thursday (August 27th) beginning at the Sunnyside Community Center at 10 a.m.

After a series of talks ending at 12 noon, those attending will be guests at a meal furnished by the First State Bank of Dimmitt and prepared and served by women of the Sunnyside Community.

The tour is sponsored every year by the Running Water Soil Conservation District, Texas Extension Service, Soil Conservation and the First State Bank of Dimmitt.

Following the meal, the people attending will travel over the Community to see points of interest on farms in the area.

Between 10 and 12 o'clock

Thursday there will be two speakers at the Center. They are Dr. Alec Pope, of the Amarillo Experiment Station who will speak on experimental data on fertilizer trials of different varieties of wheat and irrigation of wheat; and Wayne Wyatt, engineer of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District, who will relate all the district has been

able to find out about the underground water situation in Castro County.

Wyatt's talk is expected to deal with recharge well work, the decline of the water table in this area; the general underground water picture, facts and figures on conservation and misuse of irrigation water and other fundamental topics. Dr. Pope will deal with virtually every aspect of efficient wheat farming and is a noted expert in this field for the Panhandle area.

On the tour part, farmers participating will see soybeans which mature ten days earlier than standard varieties; test plots of cotton sprayed with a growth stimulant, gibberellic acid; production of hybrid sudan; cattle grazing perennial sorgrass; dwarf corn; and other items and crops that should be of interest to most farmers.

Setting up the tour schedule will be Edd C. McLeroy, farm representative of the First State Bank, County Agent Charles Hotel, Bob West of the Soil Conservation Service and Gardner Sanderson, chairman of the Running Water Soil Conservation District. Other supervisors assisting with the program will be Elvis Burch, Fred Axe, M. L. McFarland and Wade Mills.

"We feel we have an outstanding farm tour this year," McLeroy said, "and we would like to see all who can make it to do so. This will be a definitely beneficial farm tour and things will be pointed out that were developed recently and that every farmer should know . . . everyone is invited."
