Handouts From The Government

So many federal hand-out programs have grown up in the past 20 years that most people have lost track of the count long ago. That's why testimony that there are more than 40 federal grants-in-aid programs currently on the books is more than a little startling.

The testimony was submitted to a House subcommittee recently by A. D. Marshall, chairman of the Social Legislation Committee of

the Chamber of Commerce of the United States.

The grants-in-aid programs he listed ranged from school lunch programs and highway-building through water pollution control and mental health activities. These programs cost \$2.3 billion in 1952. Marshall pointed out that this

money has come from federal taxes and has reduced the funds available in the states for state-supported education and other functions which are traditionally outside Uncle Sam's bailiwick.

Enlarge Your Garden Area By Growing Plants in Air



Pole lima beans make fruitful and handsome garden background.

Vine crops, such as cucumbers, muskmelons, squash, and pole beans, both shaps and limas, are usually considered beyond the reach of the home gardener with limited space, because of the room these crops require.

By using the air rights of his garden, however, its effective area can be increased, and some of these luxury crops enjoyed on the same ground area. A picket fence 3 feet tall on the north, east and west sides of a 1,000 square foot area will add almost half as much again to its effective size.

European gardeners have long used garden walls for climbing crops; but in our hot summers walls would reflect too much heat. A picket fence allows air to pass through freely, cooling the plants and keeping them free from mildew.

All the vine crops are tender, and should not be sown until the ground has warmed up and all danger of frost is ended.

Cucumbers, melons and squash are all natural climbers. They are grown as such in greenhouses, but in commercial production outdoors are allowed to sprawl on the ground, because of the expense which supporting them would involve.

Any variety of cucumbers may be grown without providing extra support for the fruit, but the larger melons and squash would require this. Smaller melons and squash are easily supported by the vines.

Seed may be sown in rows about a foot from the fence. Soil should be enriched by spreading commercial plant food in a shallow trench a few inches away from the seed drill, using a pint of plant food for 25 feet of row. When the seeds come up start immediately to dust the seedling plants with lindane, to kill the cucumber beetle, which infests all three of these vine crops. Lindane is a new formulation, which does everything that D.D.T. will do, but is not harmful to the vine crops, while D.D.T. is under suspicion of stunting these plants when applied too freely.

Cucumber beetles concentrate in the growing end of the vine, and not only eat the new growth, but carry a disease which may destroy the vine just when it begins to bear.

To protect the vines the growing end must be dusted every few days so that new growth is covered, until the vine is two feet tall. Cords or wires must be stretched to support the cucumber, melon and squash vines until they are well developed and begin to cling to the fence pickets.

Snap and lima beans of vining varieties give a much heavier yield for the same space than the bush varieties, but take longer to bear.

In addition to the food yield, the leaves of the vine crops provide an attractive background, fully equal to a hedge or shrubbery border in decorative value, but without competing with other crops for nutriment, as shrubs always do.

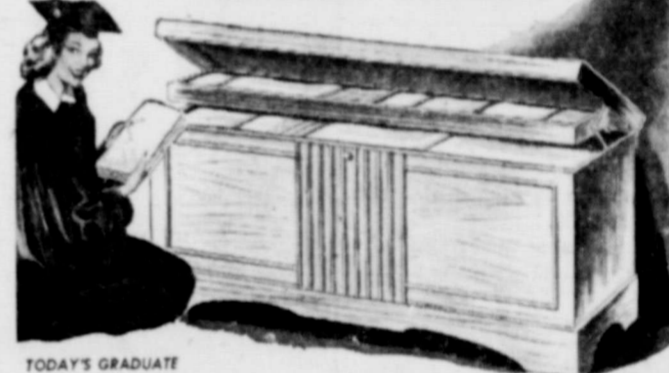

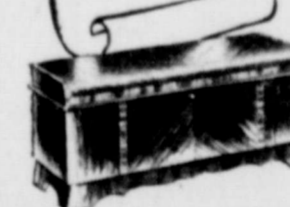

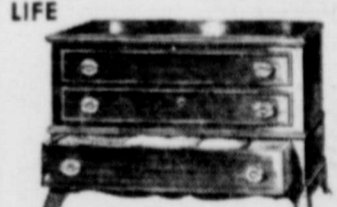

With farm income down, the American Foundation for Animal Health today suggested a 6-point plan to help farmers make up some of this year's reduced profits.

"Millions can be added to farm incomes by a 6-way program of combatting the losses usually caused by livestock diseases," Foundation spokesmen said. Here are the disease-prevention steps suggested:

1. Isolate newly-purchased livestock long enough to be sure they are not disease carriers.
2. Prevent tracking of disease from one farm to another. Diseases

and salesmen can bring in a livestock infection on their clothing or shoes.

3. Make war on rats. They can carry germs from farm to farm.
4. Use only trucks which have been disinfected before hauling livestock. Keep rendering trucks away from livestock areas on the farm.

5. Get rid of crows and pigeons. Some diseases may be carried by birds.

6. Obtain a diagnosis when first disease symptoms are noticed—and warn neighbors so they can safeguard their livestock, too.

U.S. WOMEN LEADING MEN IN EDUCATION

Women have more years of schooling than men in the United States, and their educational level is advancing the more rapidly, the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company's statisticians report.

In 1950 women at ages 25 and over had on the average 3.6 years of schooling compared with 3.0

years for men. For women the average years of school completed increased by almost one year in the last decade, while for men the rise was not quite one half year, according to Bureau of the Census data.

Every state in the union shared in the improvement, but the largest gains were made in the West, which widened its lead over other sections of the country. Washington showed the outstanding gain in the country, the average years of school completed among those at ages 25 and over increasing at two years since 1940 to an average of 11.2 year in 1950.

Although persons aged 25 and over in the population increased by about 12,800,000 during the

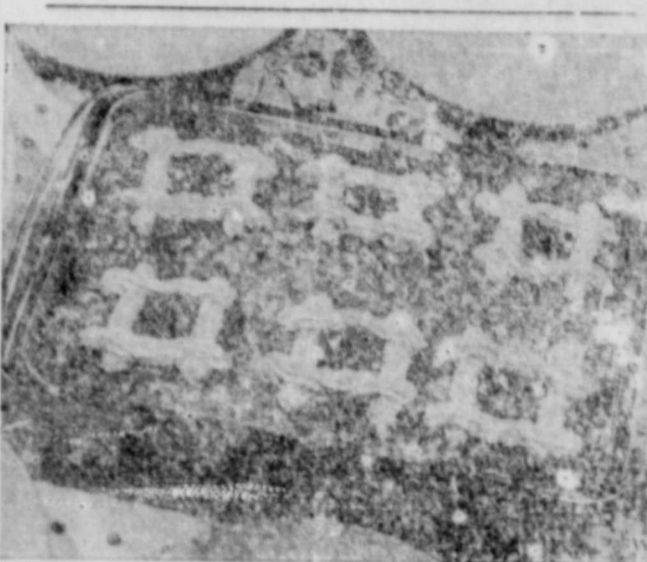

1 tablespoon water

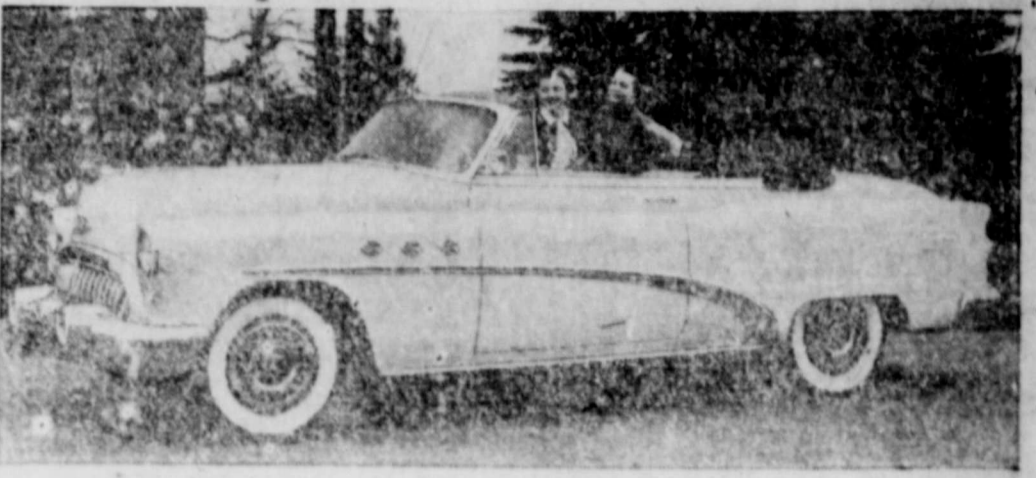
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon water

Measure rhubarb, cut in 1/2-inch lengths, into 10x6x2-inch baking dish. Mix sugar, flour, cinnamon and salt. Pour over rhubarb in pan, mixing well. Sprinkle water over all. Spread Topping evenly over rhubarb. Pressing down lightly. Bake in moderate oven (350 F.) 40 to 45 minutes.

6 tablespoons flour
1/2 cup brown sugar
