Brazos Group Plans To Raise Big PK Dam

D. T. Bowles, lawyer, and Eugene Thompson of Breckenridge, attended a meeting of the Rotary Club in Graham and heard from R. D. Collins, manager of the Brazos River Authority some of he plans for raising Possum King-dom dam.

The plan is to raise the dam fifteen feet. In order to do this, more land must be acquired, Colins explained. The Authority now was enough for a 10-foot raise but will need to acquire land for the other five feet. This, it was thought, would amount to about 2,000 acres.

Collins estimated it would take bout 90 days to complete a survey to determine the exact amount of land that would be needed and he estimated cost.

The Brazos River Authority then plans to sell enough bonds o pay for construction, the bonds o be retired by revenue from power sales. It was explained the bonds would be incorporated into bond ssues for the three proposed dams below Possum Kingdom, two in Palo Pinto county and one Hood County.
