Persons wishing advice or assistance in connection with their social security accounts are invited to call at that time. The next scheduled visit will be at the same hour on May 27.

Applications are still being received for payments to children of World War II veterans who were killed in action, or who died after discharge, according to a statement made today by Ralph T. Fisher, manager of the Ahlens office. In any case where such surviving children are eligible for benefits, and where application has not yet been filed, substantial amounts are being lost by the delay in checking on their rights.

1950 amendments provide for "crediting World War II military or naval service to the social security account; the 1952 amendments extend this to include service after World War II and through the year 1953.

J. D. Faircloth Passes Today; Rites Pending

Pending the arrival of children, funeral arrangements were yet incomplete at noon today for Jeff D. Faircloth, 91-year-old retired farmer and ranchman, who died at his home on Stephens Avenue in Ranger today at 9:45 a.m.

Mr. Faircloth had been in ill health for some time, relatives said. His body is at Morris Funeral Home in Ranger.

Mr. Faircloth, a member of the Baptist Church, was born in Georgia on Nov. 27, 1861. He had been a longtime resident of Texas and prior to moving to Ranger he had been making his home at Kasa, Texas.

He and the former Miss Leona Jane Hand were united in marriage on March 1, 1891. She survives him.

Other survivors include three sons, Vance Faircloth of Texarkana, J. D. Faircloth of Refugio, and three daughters, Ernestine Martin of Refugio; Ida Mae Hunt of Kasa, and Anna Belle Brown of Kansas.

Funeral arrangements were expected to be completed late today.

DOG POISONINGS TAKE TOLL OF 10 CANINES IN RESIDENTIAL AREA; CITIZENS ANGERED

Scores of Ranger citizens are aroused over a recent wave of dog poisonings within the city limits. About 10 dogs died of poisoning last week, a tabulation revealed this morning.

Among those reporting their pets killed by poisoning were Frances Fryor, 900 Young; G. A. Townsen, 817 Pershing; Joe Daskewich, 712 Young; E. T. Gore, 809 Young and Kathryn Gibson, 800 block, Spring Road.

Analysis of one of the stricken animals by Dr. Dick Hodges, veterinarian, showed that the canine had been killed with strychnine.

Dr. Hodges said the poison was deadly and especially dangerous for careless use as a method of exterminating dogs since it is fatal to humans.

The poisoners, according to dog owners, have been flagrant in their distribution of poison in that section of the city, threatening not only the lives of scores of licensed pets, but also menacing small children.

Due to the fact that youngsters pick up objects and put them in their mouths, eat dirt, etc., on occasions, the unknown poisoners have aroused a great deal of anger among citizens in that section of the city.

Two dead dogs, both poison victims, also were found on the grounds of the Young school.

The poison, according to residents in that section of the city, was put out Wednesday and Thursday nights.

Dr. Hodges said that dogs poisoned by strychnine die quickly. They hackle violently and then stiffen out.

The only chance to save the dog's life is through a shot which will force the animal to empty its stomach of the deadly poison.

Dog owners may supply an antidote—if the poisoning is detected soon enough—by giving their dogs grease or mustard to make them vomit.

However, a dose of the deadly poison, is usually fatal, unless it is immediately treated.

Dog poisoning is a menace to the public, especially to little children. Death of a child as a result of distribution of the strychnine or any other fatal poison could result in a murder charge against the person or persons responsible.

Shivers Signs Bill For BRA Organization

A stronger Brazos River Authority was created in a law signed by Gov. Allan Shivers.

The act, by Rep. Mack Allison of Mineral Wells and others changed the name of the old Brazos River Conservation and Reclamation District to Brazos River Authority.

The reorganized agency is expected to issue bonds, also permitted under the new law, for \$33,000,000 worth of new dams at Turkey Creek and Inspiration Point in Palo Pinto County and at De Cordova Bend in Hood County. The authority already operates dams at Possum Kingdom and Whitney and is building one at the Leon River near Temple.

Mrs. Ed A. Hill Dies In Arizona; Eastland Rites

Mrs. Ed A. Hill, long time resident of Eastland, died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. A. L. Edwards, in Miami, Ariz., Thursday, May 21, and will be buried in Eastland, Thursday, May 28.

The body is being moved to Eastland and will lay in state at the Hammer Funeral Home until the funeral. While funeral arrangements are not complete, it is known that Rev. J. Morris Bailey, Methodist pastor, will have charge of the services.

Mrs. Hill was born in Redding, Pa., but came to Texas, at the age of six years. She was a daughter of the late W. H. Parvin, early-day banker in Eastland. Mrs. Hill spent most of her girlhood days here, and was a sister of the late George Parvin.

In 1902 she married E. A. Hill, and the couple made their home here until his death in 1927. Since that time she has made her home with an only child, Mrs. A. L. Edwards in Arizona.

Mrs. Hill was an active member in the Methodist Church and in club work. At one time she served as organist in the Methodist church.

The body is in route to Eastland at this time, but should arrive here Wednesday, May 27. She will be buried at the side of her husband, Judge E. A. Hill, who for a number of years was County Judge here.

Among survivors are her daughter, Mrs. Edwards of Miami, Ariz., a sister, Mrs. Homer Breisford, Sr. of Fort Worth, and four grandchildren.

Memorial Day Rites Are Set By Aux Group

The Auxiliary women will make 125 corsages which will be placed before the white Memorial crosses in the Evergreen Cemetery.

All members of the group are urged to attend the Friday night meeting, and all citizens of Ranger are urged to pay homage to our war dead by attending the Memorial Day ceremonies Sunday afternoon, Mrs. Greer said.

NEW TEST IS LOCATED IN CISCO AREA

Location of a new test for Eastland County was announced over the week end.

Oil Associates, Inc., of Fort Worth have staked their No. 2 J. R. Bacon, a 3,600-footer, seven miles south of Cisco.

The venture will be a southeast diagonal offset to Oil Associates' No. 1 Bacon, discovery for the Bacon Ellenberger Field, which is producing from the vicinity of 3,750 feet.

Location of the project is 1,125 feet from North and 612 feet from east lines of southeast line of Section 50, Block 3, H&TC Survey.

One completion and a new location were announced Monday by Palo Pinto Oil & Gas Corp. at Strawn in Palo Pinto County.

The firm has completed its No. 15 William Sanders, 11 miles north of Strawn, for a daily pumping gauge of 20 barrels of 38 gravity oil from open hole at 1,275-95 feet.

The new well is in Section 43, Block 2, T&P Survey.

PP&GC has staked the No. 17 Sanders 2,950 feet from north and 890 feet from east line of Section 43, Block 2, T&P Survey.

The venture is scheduled for a depth of 1,300 feet.

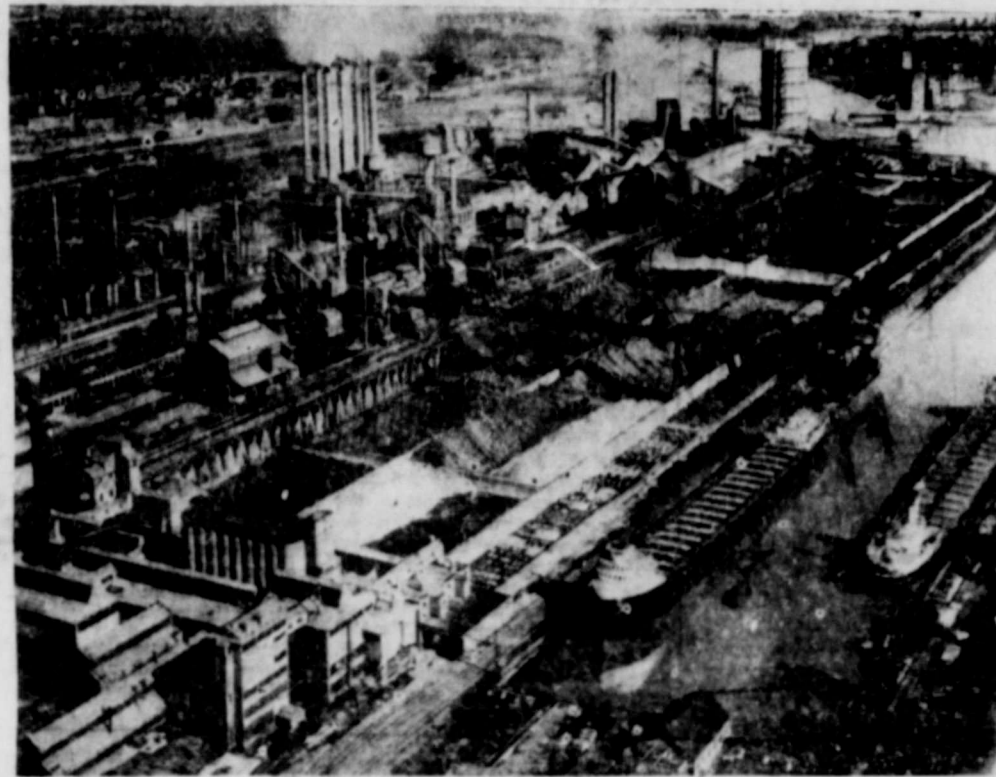

Farm Production Up—Income Is Down For First Quarter of 1953

The total amount of money received from farm marketings in the first quarter of 1953 was 6.9 billion dollars, down 2 per cent from last year, according to a report by the Bureau of Agricultural Economics, of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. An increase of 6 per cent in the volume of commodities market was more than offset by the lower prices received. In Texas farmers received a total of \$229,588,000 from marketings in January and February of this year, as compared with \$260,548,000 received in the same period last year.

In general, prices received by farmers are expected to continue at a lower level this year than in 1952, but production costs will remain almost as high as a year ago. This points to a drop in net farm income this year. The Bureau of Agricultural Economics estimates a reduction of about a billion dollars in net income from last year's total of 14.3 billion, but still approximately a billion dollars above the post World War II low of 12.3 billion dollars received in 1950. Any material change in present production prospects would change this outlook.

Individual farmers' expenses and cash returns always vary by a large margin, the Bureau points out. These differences are influenced by the location of the farm and the type of operation. A reduction in expenditures can be expected this year on those farms that make large purchases of feed and livestock, and reductions in cash returns will be greatest on farms whose products have dropped farthest in price since 1952, such as beef cattle.

Couples Using Smaller Gems, Survey Shows

With American women still economy-minded, the average diamond solitaire sold in 1953 will be one-quarter of a carat or smaller, according to results of a poll of U. S. jewelry manufacturers.

This is considerably smaller than the size of the "rock" generally worn in engagement rings 15 and 20 years ago. In those days a gem weighing between one-half to one full-carat was the average, and was considered modest.

During the past five years, however, the average diamond weight dropped to 33 points of a carat, one carat equalling 100 points, and is now leveling off at approximately 25 points. This attributed entirely to the effects of inflation, since the diamond remains the "queen of gems" and "a girl's best friend," jewelers point out.

As compensation to brides, designers have come up with a bit of jewelry magic that is making a big hit. The emphasis is now on what is called the illusion-type setting, made of the white precious metal, palladium, in order to give the gem the appearance of being larger than it actually is. Newest of the precious jewelry metals, palladium has the same whiteness as its sister-metal platinum, but costs about the same as gold.

The illusion setting consists of four high prongs set in a highly-polished metal base and joined on top by a metal rim. The metal base acts as a mirror, reflecting light onto the diamond to increase its natural fire and thus make it look larger. Since the beauty of a gem is enhanced more in a white metal mounting, it is estimated that a diamond seems twice its actual size in a palladium or platinum illusion setting.

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Big 3 Program 4-H Club Work Accepted Here

The Big 3 of the National 4-H Awards Program—Achievement, Citizenship and Leadership—offering 18 college scholarships valued at \$5,100, have been accepted by the State Extension Service for the current year.

In each program the highest rating boy and girl are also awarded all-expense trips to both the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago in November, 1953, and to Washington, D. C., for National 4-H Club Week in March, 1954.

The award donors are Achievement, Ford Motor Co.; Citizenship, in honor of Thos. E. Wilson, and Leadership, Edward Foss Wilson. The six Washington trips are provided by the Conrad Hilton Hotel, Chicago.

Other incentives for all-around Achievement in 4-H activities are 16 trips to the Chicago Congress, miniature statuettes for two State winners and four medals for county winners. The Leadership program provides 8 trips to the Congress, gold watches to two State winners and two medals for county winners.

With his food, cover, and water effort extended to the once prolific quail areas, the Assistant Director said the quail very likely will comeback in good time. "It is surprising," he said, "how the necessary brood stock will be found available and adequate when conditions become favorable again for reproduction."

Quail Comeback Seen Probable

Officials of the Texas Game and Fish Commission, noting exceptional interest in Texas' depressed quail population at the annual game warden schools, assured the field men that public cooperation definitely can expedite rallying the bobwhites.

Warden concern over the quail problem, which became acute during the prolonged drought which apparently reached its peak last year, highlighted the annual classroom routine held in two periods at Bastrop State Park.

Commission authorities, particularly the Assistant Director of Wildlife Restoration (Ernest G. Marsh) emphasized that while there are mysterious cycle angles involved, quail propagation is controlled to a great extent by man-made conditions.

"The answer rests squarely upon proper conditions, which means food, cover and water," said the Assistant Director of Wildlife Restoration. "These may be provided by nature or they may be provided by the very civilization which has created so many hardships for quail as well as all species of wildlife."

It was concluded that the warden, many of whom have distinguished themselves for conservation and restoration efforts, can do a good job working directly with the populace. They may help encourage joint movements by hunters and landowners to provide a favorable habitat for the fleet little birds which have long been a favorite in the annual fall shoot-

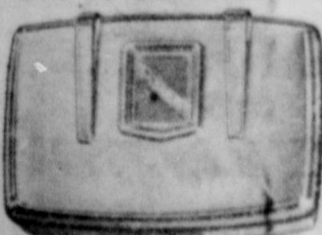

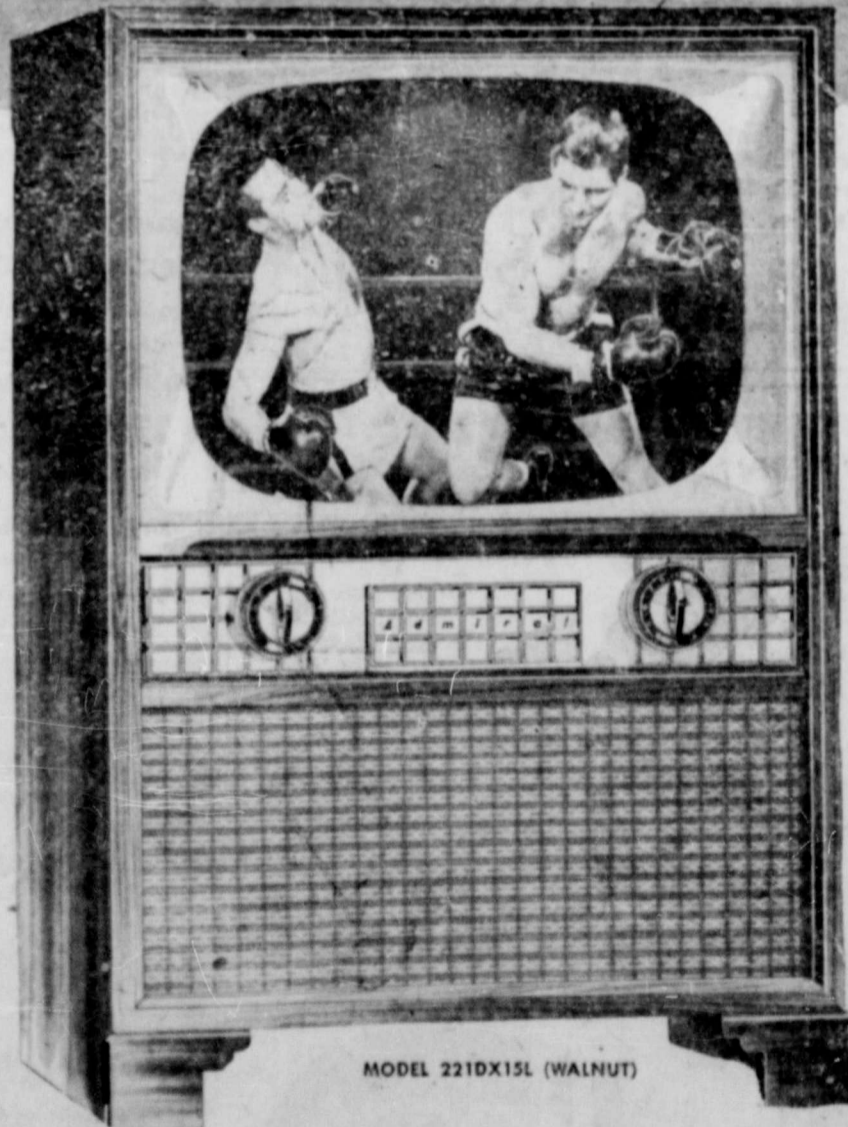

Miss Daniels Demonstrates One Dish Meal To HDC Leaders

"Our grandmothers gave their families sassafras tea, sulphur and molasses, or store bought tonic to tone up the blood each spring, but today this is done year around with a good diet," stated Miss Mildred Daniel, County Home Demonstration Agent, at a leader training meeting in Eastland, Monday.

During her demonstration to leaders from eight of the eleven H.D. Clubs in the county, she served a vegetable platter and whole-wheat muffins. The vegetable platter, based on the Texas Food Standard, consisted of boiled cauliflower, whole steamed carrots, and baked Irish potatoes. These vegetables were arranged on a large dish, garnished with parsley, and served with a tangy lemon butter sauce. It was pointed out that the one-dish method of serving saves dish washing, besides making a colorful dish. The principles of cooking vegetables to retain minerals and vitamins were stressed in the demonstration.

For variety and to fulfill the requirement for a whole grain product each day, it was suggested that hot whole-wheat muffins be cake squares were served. Many useful and beautiful gifts were received and displayed. About seventy guests called during the hours seven til 10 p.m.

For the nation as a whole, \$510,442,000 was paid as death claims under 411,654 policies in the first quarter of 1953, compared with \$472,780,000 under 402,362 policies in the corresponding period of last year. Of this year's first quarter payments \$335,237,000 was under 122,261 ordinary policies; \$109,298,000 was under 18,547 group policies; and \$65,907,000 was under 240,846 industrial policies.

For the nation as a whole, the quarter's death benefit payments were 8 per cent larger than a year ago. The payments to living policyholders were \$642,769,000 in the first quarter compared with \$612,784,000 in the corresponding period in 1952.

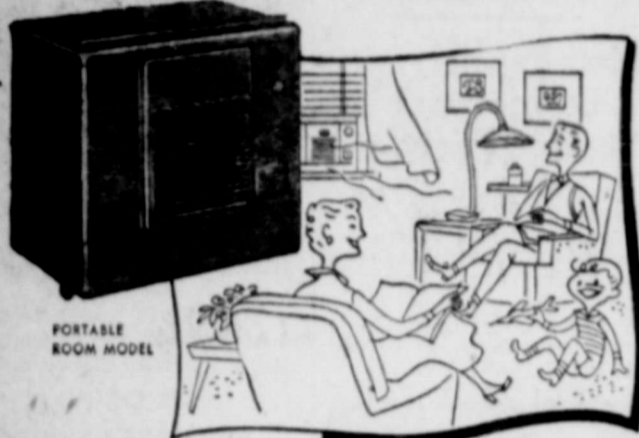
