## Funeral Rites Thursday For Clarence Cole

Funeral services for Clarence Cole, 70, of Morton Valley and former long-time resident of Strawn, will be held in Strawn Thursday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock. Killingsworth Funeral Home, Ranger, will be in charge of arrangements, and interment will be in Mount Marion Cemetery, Strawn.

Mr. Cole, a retired truck driver who had been employed by the Strawn Merchandise Company for 25 years, died suddenly at his home early this morning. He had been a resident of Morton Valley for the past three years and prior to moving to Eastland County he had made his home at Strawn for a period of 35 years.

Mr. Cole had been a resident of this section of Texas all of his life, having been born at nearby Lingville in Erath County on Aug. 2, 1882.

He was united in marriage with the former Miss Lydia Gertrude Rogers at Strawn on Jan. 16, 1917. She preceded her husband in death on Jan. 21, 1929.

Mr. Cole's survivors include three sons, Jess W. Cole of Ranger, Clarence C. Cole Jr. of Morton Valley, and Raymond H. Cole of Hico; one daughter, Mrs. A. R. Mayers of Tulsa, Tex.; one brother, C. C. Cole of Strawn; one sister, Mrs. J. A. Purison of Pampa; his step-mother, Mrs. Willie Cole of Strawn; seven grandchildren; and one niece and two nephews.

## Korean Conflict Costs U. S. Army About 15 Billion

Secretary of the Army Stevens told senators in Washington Tuesday that the first three years of the Korean War have cost the Army "about \$15,000,000,000." Stevens offered this estimate to a Senate appropriations subcommittee. He said the Army's request for \$13,671,000,000 for the new fiscal year beginning July 1 includes \$2,500,000,000 to continue the war for another 12 months past July 1.

## Commissioners Hire Pound Man During Session

A coming crackdown by the city on loose livestock and unlicensed dogs within the city limits of Ranger was planned Tuesday night during the regular weekly meeting of the City Commission, Lester Crossley, city manager, said this morning.

Mayor Calvin W. Harris and the four members of the city governing body voted during the session to hire a pound man and dog catcher to enforce local city ordinance governing loose livestock and canines within the city limits.

A Ranger man was hired for the post and is scheduled to assume the duties on June 10.

Present for the commission's Tuesday night meeting were Mayor Harris, Commissioners A. G. Koenig, Lem Rushing, O. L. (Lee) Cantrell and Frank Penn, and City Manager Crossley.

## Cisco May Buy Gas Company; Deal Studied

The City of Cisco had under advisement today an offer to purchase the Cisco Gas Corporation, Mayor G. C. Rosenthal reported. The offer to sell the gas company was made at a special meeting of the commission.

Mr. Rosenthal said that the Pure Oil Company, which bought the gas company along with other oil and gas holdings of the Hickok company in this area last fall, has been negotiating to sell the gas properties.

A prospective purchaser of the gas properties, including the distribution system of the Cisco Gas Corporation, approached the city with the offer to sell, Mr. Rosenthal said.

Mr. Rosenthal added that a committee has been appointed to study the proposition and to make a recommendation to the commission. He said that the proposition would be submitted to the voters in a special election before any obligations are incurred.

## New Producers Are Reported In Stephens Area

There were no new developments to report on the Eastland County oil front Wednesday morning, but two new producers have been added in the oil fields over in adjoining Stephens County.

Completed for a three-hour gauge of 127 barrels of 41 gravity oil was G. B. Butterfield, Olney, No. 4 Strawn, Section 27, Block 6, T&P Survey. It is located five miles south of Caddo in the regular field.

Flow was through a 20-64 inch choke with 300 pounds casing and 150 pounds tubing pressure from four perforations at 2,256 - 70 feet. Operator set the casing at 2,280 feet while the hole is bottomed at 2,283 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 410-1.

The other oiler is located six miles south of Caddo in the Jackson - Strawn Field. It is G. J. Scholl, et al, of Wichita Falls No. 1-A F. Pierce, Section 75, Block 4, T&P Survey.

No. 1-A Pierce had a daily potential of 47.74 barrels of 40 gravity oil. It is pumping from an open hole at 1,790 - 1,802 feet, say sections topped at 1,791 feet. The well was treated with 28 quarts of nitro.

## TEXAS DEMOCRATS LAUNCH DRIVE TO REGAIN CONTROL OF STATE'S PARTY OFFICES

Return of the Democratic Party to Democrats by taking control of the party offices out of the hands of Dixiecrats and Republicans was announced as the goal of the Texas Democratic Organizing Committee at a meeting of the new organization's officers in Austin.

Byron Skelton, Temple attorney who is chairman; Mrs. Lillian Collier, Mumford, vice-chairman, and Creekmore Fath, Austin attorney, secretary-treasurer, explained following the meeting that the Texas Democratic Organizing Committee was created at a state-wide meeting of Democrats held at Lake Buchanan May 16-17. They said that 296 Democrats from 76 counties were present at the meeting.

Headquarters for the committee have been set up in Austin with a mailing address of Box 198, Austin.

In a statement issued after the meeting of the officers, Skelton emphasized the fact that the organization was inviting all Democrats to participate. He cited the following resolution adopted at the Buchanan meeting as the guiding policy.

"Be it resolved that we, Democrats of Texas, convened at Buchanan Dam on May 16-17, extend our greetings, solicitations and congratulations to the 970,128 Democrats in Texas who voted for Adlai Stevenson and John Sparkman in 1952 and call upon their renewed endeavor and support in our task for 1954 to restore the official control of the Party to the Democrats of Texas.

"We invite and call upon all the citizens of Texas to join us in this movement in support of the great Democratic principles of our Party, however they may have voted in the past.

"We commend and endorse the Democratic leadership of our Party in both Houses of Congress, and in particular the able leadership of our two stalwart Democratic minority leaders.

"We repudiate the leadership of the Democratic Party in Texas of those official party leaders who have betrayed our Party to its enemies, and particularly those persons holding positions of trust as members of the State Executive Committee, and we call for and dedicate ourselves to their removal from Party office."

"We intend," Skelton added, "to return the Democratic Party to the Democrats. The so-called 'Democrats' who are on the State Democratic Executive Committee supported the Republican Party and its nominees. Our task is to mobilize the Democrats so that they will have the opportunity to get representation on the State Executive Committee next year at the Democratic State Convention."

In accordance with instructions at the meeting, a five-dollar annual certificate plan will be used to finance the organization work, along the same lines as that used in the Stevenson-Sparkman campaign.

## Cisco Geologist Returns Home—

# Sees Bright Future For Australia Holdings

Opportunity, like oil, is where you find it. And Robert Kamon, young Cisco geologist, today was contemplating the opportunities for oil he found during a recent trip of some five months to Australia.

Kamon who was awarded a geology degree at the University of Texas five years ago, came home from Australia with a concession to 3,400,000 acres of land. The concession gives Kamon five years to explore for oil with an option for renewal for an additional ten years.

Since his recent return trip home, Kamon has conferred with oil men in Dallas, Tulsa and Houston. His immediate concern is to work out a development program for his concession.

Under the concession agreement with the Mines Department of Queensland in Australia, Kamon must do a specific amount of development annually. In that country, the government owns all minerals under the land and the concession calls for the government to receive ten percent of any oil found as royalty.

During several months in the country, Kamon made a careful study of the surface geology, preparing extensive maps of his concession. This with geophysical work convinced him that his holdings contain outstanding oil possibilities. Some of his geological logs indicate possible pay zones of nearly 2,000 feet.

"The source beds for the oil are obviously under the Pacific Ocean," Kamon said in a geological report prepared for his family's Lucky Strike Drilling Company. "Minor continental faulting brought these marine source beds in contact with the permeable and porous sands of the Triassic and Jurassic age—those supplying the oil from the unlimited marine source beds to fill excellent porous and permeable sands.

Mr. Burnett, 80 years of age, died at his home at 420 Pecan St. Tuesday night at 7 o'clock. He had been in failing health for several years.

Born at Paris, Texas on Sept. 11, 1872, Mr. Burnett was a longtime resident of this area having moved to Ranger back in 1909.

A member of the Church of Christ since 1932, he and the former Miss Sarah E. McElthorn were united in marriage in Greenville on Nov. 2, 1893.

Survivors include the widow of the home address; two daughters, Mrs. J. A. Pritchard of Phoenix, Ariz., and Mrs. R. G. Reid of Springdale, Ark.; two sons, L. J. Burnett of Ranger and L. I. Burnett of Ft. Worth; 21 grandchildren and 14 great-grandchildren.

Funeral services at the funeral Thursday afternoon will be Jack Mace, Virge Johnson, Reed Campbell, Monroe Blackwell, Tommy L. Fox, Harlan Gordenkre, Jerd Hale and Ed Monroe.

## Warn Against Dangers During Bike Season

There are detergents advertised on today's market for practically any cleaning job — from cutting stubborn grease on a mechanic's hands, to discouraging fleas on the family poodle.

They work too, in most instances, but State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox has this word of warning:

"Make sure you follow the directions to the letter." Otherwise you could end up with a disconcerting case of "housewife eczema."

These so-called "soapless" products have found wide favor with housewives for washing clothes and dishes. No doubt a good bit of their popularity is due to high powered advertising, including the decorative boxes featuring happy ladies hanging the washing or putting up dishes which the product has cleaned all by itself.

Dr. Cox identifies the active ingredients of these products as chemical compounds which act to lower surface tension of water, making it more penetrating and able to get through grease and dirt to break it up and keep it from resettling.

Many brands contain special purpose ingredients, such as ammonium salt, which make the compound bactericidal.

A duck is supposed to sink like a rock in water containing some of these detergents, probably because the "wetter" water gets through the oil in the duck's feathers —

which is the reason a duck is ordinarily water proof and able to float. It stands to reason, Dr. Cox points out, that if these compounds will cut through grease and film,

and there is no doubt that some of them will—they will also penetrate the natural oils of the skin and cause irritation and discomfort if the condition is neglected.

## Trap Rain And Increase Yield

Trap that rain! Hike that yield! These phrases may wax heavy with the refrains of the familiar spiritual, "Ole' Man River," but they carry more expression for the experienced winter wheat grower.

Growers who started to farm in the last 10 years, have known the lush years when it was easy to make a crop, says Capper's Farmer. But it takes a lot more skill to get the job done when rains are less favorably spaced and smaller in total.

Wheat farmers who have been at it a quarter of a century know that in years with less rain the best yields come from land that has been managed to trap water from all big rains that fall before wheat is sowed.

They say you can trap rain by keeping four or five inches of topsoil loose and cloddy, ready to grab an inch of rain that pours

down in 30 minutes. Only the water you trap does you any good. And the old time way of stabling is one of your best helpers. Keep it on top. It will break the force of driving rain-drops; keep them from running soil particles together.

Don't discount wind. Air in the plains country is dry, ready to take up any moisture it touches. So stubble is needed to stop air movement on the ground.

Stubble also makes shade. That reduces the number of weeds that sprout and keeps the soil cool. Hot soil turns water into vapor, so it can pass off into the atmosphere. All the moisture that can possibly be trapped in fallow is needed to make the following year's wheat crop.

Keeping the Skin Clear

Perhaps beauty is only skin deep but the teen-ager knows that if her face is marred by unsightly blemishes, no amount of adult consolation will soothe her. Today, however, skin specialists indicate that boys and girls may not have to go through the pimple-and-blackhead-stage. The teen-ager may find a way around it with the help of antibiotics, hormones, and sulfas—which have been used with success against acne, as these blemishes are termed.

of adolescence speeds up the activity of these oil glands, particularly those of the face and upper portion of the body, there is more lubricant than the skin can normally dispose of. The tiny skin outlet becomes blocked with fatty material, and the lubricant piling up underneath it forces the skin to balloon out into a pimple. Working on the theory that an infection is involved in the process, doctors report clearing up biotchy skins with antibiotics, particularly terramycin. In one series of 384 cases, antibiotics and sulfas, used with hormones, brought improvement in 94 per cent of the patients. Many of these cases had not responded to the older x-ray treatment.

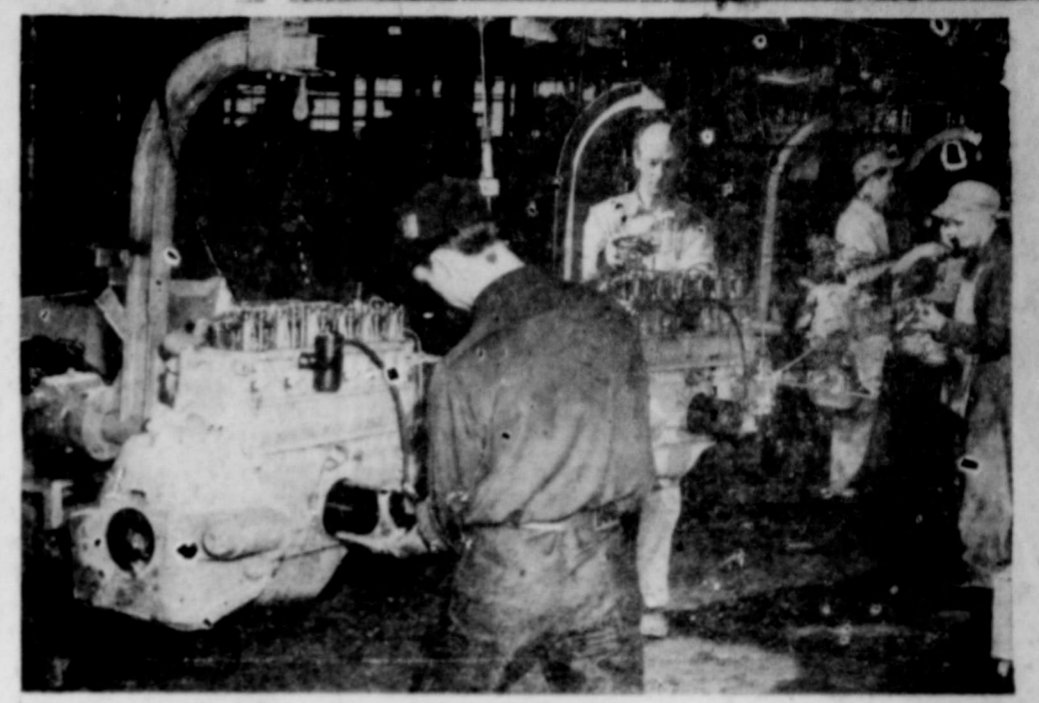
Prayer Cards Grace Tables

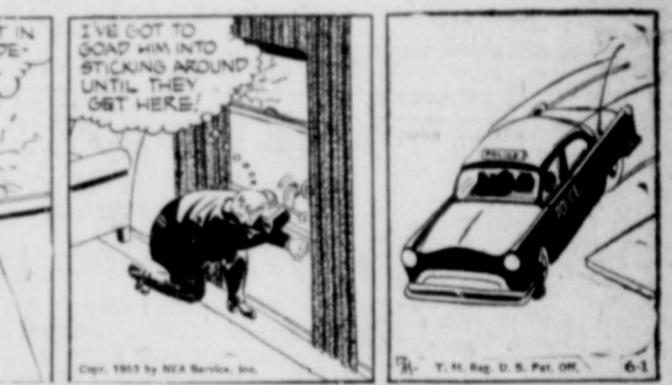

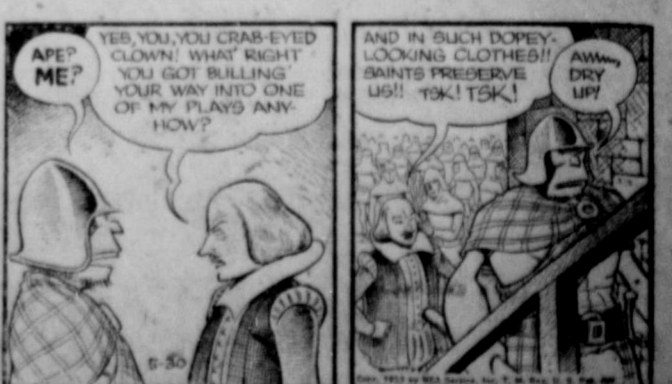

PRODUCER BASE MILK PRICE \$6.20 PER HUNDREDWEIGHT

Producers delivering base milk to the Central West Texas Marketing Area will receive \$6.20 per hundredweight for 4.0 per cent milk (subject to location adjustments) for the month of April 1953, Byford W. Bain, Market Administrator, announced today.

Average daily producer deliveries for April were 289,794 pounds as compared with 286,751 pounds in March and 267,427 pounds in February. This is an increase of 1.02 per cent over March and 8.33 per cent over February. Of the 8,691,106 pounds of producer milk received by handlers during April, 79 per cent was classified as Class I (fluid milk, skim milk, buttermilk, flavored milk, and cream) and 21 per cent classified as Class II, or milk used in manufactured products.

Handlers received 1,231,834 pounds of milk, skim milk, cream and other products from sources other than producers in April as compared with 1,389,238 pounds in March and 1,085,883 pounds in February. Of the total receipts of other source milk in April 678,310 pounds were utilized in Class I products and 553,521 pounds were utilized in Class II products.

The average daily Class I sale in April decreased 1.39 per cent from March and 3.44 per cent from February.
