Christian Science Lesson-Sermon

"Whoso putteth his trust in the Lord shall be safe." This rousing statement from Proverbs (29:25) is the Golden Text of the Christian Science Lesson-Sermon titled "God the Preserver of Man", to be read in Christian Science churches Sunday.
