Slightly Cooler Over Weekend— Rain? Maybe!

The weather man said Eastland Counties would have cooler weather over the week end.

But—
Don't get excited. Because "cooler" will be only about five degrees of relief from the 100-or-better sizzling temperatures that have been registered in the Eastland County vicinity for two straight weeks.

Clear to partly cloudy and not quite so warm Saturday and Sunday is what the U. S. Weather Bureau forecast for the two-day week end stretch.

Strong southeast winds were due

Saturday. And widely scattered afternoon and evening thundershowers also were predicted for the area.

The high for both Saturday and Sunday—from 95 degrees upward. The low for Saturday night was due to be between 70 and 75 degrees.

Partly cloudy weather was forecast for North Central Texas Friday and Saturday. Local thundershowers in North Saturday. Not much change in temperature.

The West Texas outlook: Generally fair Saturday and Sunday. Not much change in temperature.

Walter Jetton of Fort Worth

Qualified voters of the Ranger Junior College District will go to the polls next Tuesday, June 23, to cast ballots in an election to determine whether or not the RIC tax rate should be raised from 20 cents to 50 cents per \$1,000 valuation.

Eligible to vote in the Tuesday referendum are citizens residing within the confines of the district who own property and who have paid their poll taxes or are exempt according to laws.

The election was ordered by the Board of Regents of the college, a municipally-owned school founded here back in 1926, after the governing body had been petitioned by 327 Ranger citizens.

Supporters of the measure point out that the college ranks lowest in the entire state in the amount of local revenue provided for its operation and that recent slashes in Veterans Administration veterans' training funds have whittled the annual income of the school about 50 per cent.

Ballots will be cast at the City Hall in downtown Ranger Tuesday between the hours of 8 a. m. and 7 p. m.

Other members of the American Legion district league, in addition to Ranger, Cisco and Mineral Wells, are Goldthwaite, Stephenville and Breckenridge. The Stephenville Blue Jays are currently holding down the top spot in loop standings.

Donald Brown Is Denied New Murder Trial

Donald Hawkins Brown, under death penalty for the bizarre gut-ter punch slaying of the late Edwin Joe Campbell, Dallas finance company collector, formerly of Ranger, made a sensational bid for a new trial in Dallas this week, but lost.

His attorney immediately gave notice that he would appeal the red-haired defendant's death penalty.

The red trial motion was accorded by Criminal District Judge Henry King after a day-long hearing Thursday.

Brown is under the death penalty for the murder of Campbell, finance company collector who was shot three times in the head last New Year's Eve and dumped into his car, which was doused with gasoline and set afire. He had been looking for Brown that day to collect an overdue automobile note.

Nobody has come forth who says he saw the shooting. However, Brown was convicted on overwhelming circumstantial evidence.

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Here's Inside Dope On Average U.S. Father

Wipe that smug Father's Day grin off your face, Pappy. It's time for a little dope about the facts of life. Your life.

For in spite of that "great guy" baskin' your family with ebullience you all day Sunday, you're only a drop in the bucket of 27,000,000 American fathers, including slightly more than 6,000 proud papas right here in Eastland County. And that makes you a decimal point, a statistic, or the Average American Papa.

That new wallet the kids give you probably will hold the Average Income. Beneath your new belt will burgeon a Median Waistline. And under your non-changeable necktie will bob an Average American Adam's Apple.

One Average Father, for example, never knew that statistics had set his shirt size at 15-34. And he used to complain that his collar was too tight until his wife pointed out that he's been putting his head through the button hole.

Don't underestimate such facts and figures. They make you what you are. And what are you?

To begin with, you're five-foot, 10-inches tall. You weigh 165 pounds. You wear a size 40-shoe, a 7 1/2 hat, a 9D shoe and you'd better watch your weight.

After all, you're an average 32.2 years old, and it won't be long before you tip the scales at 170.

But that's easily explained. Married life agrees with you. And you can afford an Average Chuckle at thinking back to your durgstore days when you told the boys:

"Me? Get married now? I'm going to wait till I'm 25. Or maybe 27."

But statistics show that you were 22.6 when you sold out. And your bride was 20.8. However,

if you had been married in 1890, you would have been three years older and your wife would have been 22.8.

THUS, statisticians can safely say that (a) Men have been marrying younger, and (b) Women have been lying about their age for at least 60 years.

At any rate, you were married by a clergyman and the whole business has been successful. But you probably will never undertake a second marriage.

It's between 16 and 14 Average Years now since your wedding day. You own your home and car. And you have 1.2 healthy, happy children. The first—statistics say it was either a boy or a girl—was born two years after you were married. The other two-tenths children came a couple of years later.

Of course, these statistics are only an adding machine average. Even Average People don't have 1.2 children running about the house. In real life, Average City People have 1.05 kiddies; Average Farm Folks have 1.60.

One trend, however, is clear. The more training and education you and your wife have had, the fewer children you have. In America, the highest birthrate seems to be among the uneducated. But no reliable authority would draw the obvious conclusion: if you want a good job, don't have too many children.

YOUR own education stopped before you finished high school. If your wife entered high school, it's a better than even bet she was graduated. And that's as it should be, according to one statistician.

He claims that family success seems to depend in part on how much education the wife brings with her.

It's a pretty good chance that

your wife worked during the first year of your Average Marriage. But for the remaining 42 Average Years that you two will live as man and wife, she will stay in your Average Home, mending your Average Socks, playing Average Bridge, and cooking better-than-average meals.

And that, too, is as it should be. For during your married life you are going to earn \$120,000. And nearly one-third of it will be spent on food.

By way of contrast, you will spend only one-fourth of your wages on housing; one-eighth for clothes; and about seven per cent for medical and recreational expenses. But you and your family will eat \$40,000 worth of food.

Yes, Dad, the statisticians really have your number. But they also have the number of your bachelor pals of yesteryear, and that's one figure you can well do without.

Here's good news, Father: You are going to live longer than your pals who never left the drug store for the vine-covered cottage. And you can tell them—when they razz you on your dishpan hands—that between the ages of 25 and 44, when your responsibilities are the heaviest, is bachelor mortality rates.

And you've got an answer for the younger bachelors who are already saying: "Me? Get married!"

Let them profit by your Average Life. Tell them to pick an educated girl, marry young and quit eating.

Bag Worms Are Easy to Kill, Says Co. Agent

Bag worms excel in the art of camouflaging. Usually confined to Arbovite and other similar cedar like trees and shrubs they sometimes attack broad leaved plants according to word from the County Agents office.

According to information now is the time to destroy the bag worms. When first hatched the worms are so well covered it is difficult to see them. They spin a cone shape water proof, silk cover and conceal the bag with bark and bits of green leaves. As they grow the worms stick only their head out to feed as they move up and down the limb. Both the worm and the bag grow until by August the bag is from three to four inches long.

A lead arsenate spray composed of three tablespoonfuls per gallon of water will kill the bag worms. Usually two sprays, a week apart.

are sufficient to give excellent control it is said. The pests die slowly sometimes taking ten to twelve days after having received a lethal dose. When dead the bags will continue to cling to the limbs for several months. The lead arsenate is a deadly poison and should be handled with care if it was warned.

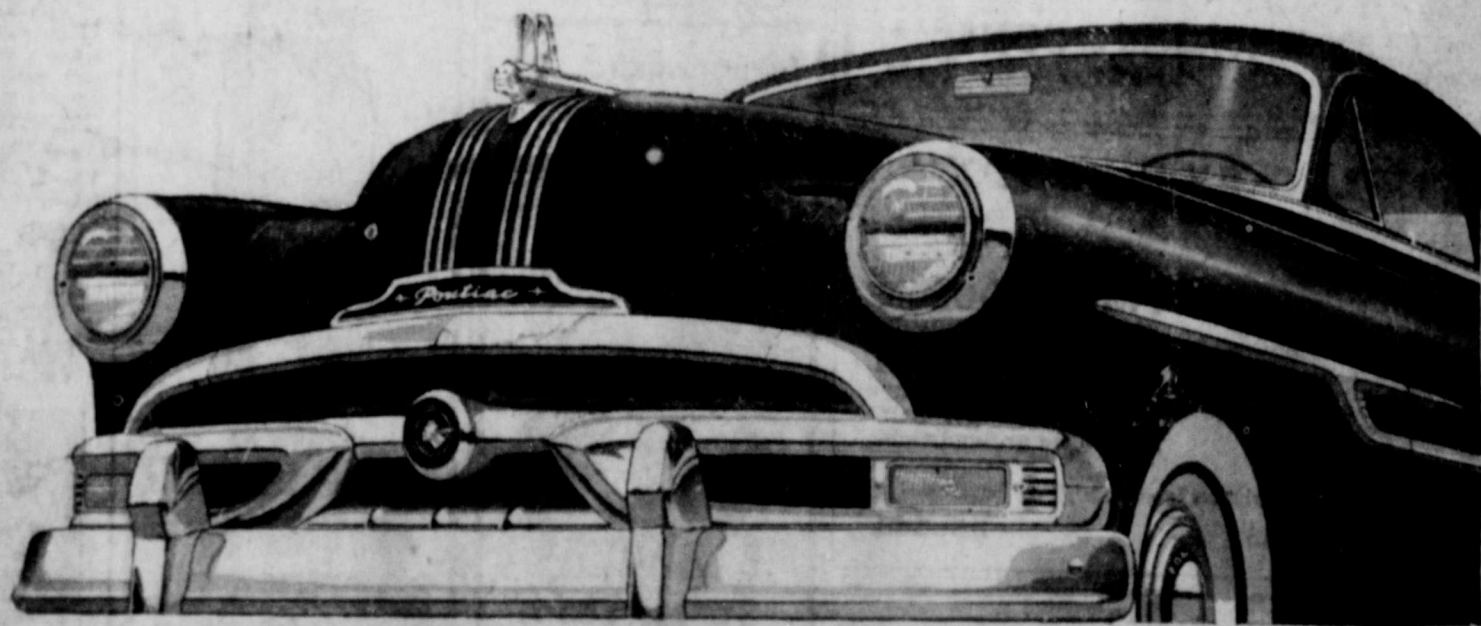
